PUBLIC COMMENTS OF ETHAN BOOK
BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRIDGEPORT
April 1, 2013

Mr. Council President, Members of the City Council and public. I am Ethan Book temporarily residing in Bridgeport for eight years I operate a small limousine service business New England Limousine Service of Fairfield and for matters related to some long term unaddressed matters in state public works I am a candidate for the U.S. Senate 2010. As brief explanation the primary focus of my active candidacy is a federal court challenge of portions of the 2010 statewide election process.

In the late1980's as a specialized bank officer I appeared before this Council regarding issues of activities of the Connecticut Resources Recovery Authority CRRA including of the curious program by which the City of Bridgeport hosts the 300 million Greater Bridgeport Resource Recovery Project which is located on Howard Avenue next to Long Island Sound.

Without those issues being reasonably resolved more than two years ago, I began again to appear before this Council to speak about matters which appear to be curious state and local government reactions to my role in seeking to have resolved the unaddressed CRRA issues. It seems that these unaddressed issues of major public significance repeatedly merge with other issues of great public importance.

With the December horrific mass shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown CT, there has been a great outcry and response of concern from the general public, the media and local, state and federal public officials. While reasoned responses are justified and necessary, there has been something missing from most of the public pronouncements.

Shortly after the December tragedy there was news reporting of a New Haven attorney who was planning to sue the state for negligence in that incident. However Attorney General George Jepsen made a public statement indicating that he saw no legal basis for such a suit against the State. On January 2nd I sent Attorney General Jepsen a letter in which I expressed that there are, in fact, legal bases for liability against the State.

For about fifty years the State of Connecticut has passively acquiesced to the US Supreme Court issuing decisions to attempt to take God out of our public schools (This process is explained more fully in the article "The Secularization of Government" which I wrote last year and which accompanies the hard copy of the public comments which I gave to you on March 18th). In addition in recent years the State of Connecticut has taken the initiative to pursue extreme liberal social policies.

To this, I would add that I have received reports that Newtown CT has been a focus of the occult, that is, of witchcraft. Further, it is known that Newtown is the residence of the author of Hunger Games a story in which child sacrifice is made into entertainment.

In my letter to Attorney General Jepsen (of which a copy accompanies the hard copy of these comments), I cite an important quote from George Mason the Father of our Bill of Rights:

As nations cannot be rewarded or punished in the next world, so they must be in this. By an inevitable chain of causes and effects, Providence punishes sins by national calamities.

Also, I cite an important portion of scripture Proverbs 29:2:

When the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice; but when the wicked beareth rule, the people mourn.

The members of this Council is likely aware that I am a political conservative. Please understand also that as a political conservative, I do not oppose reasonable adjustments to gun regulations. However, the predominant public discourse and official attention to gun regulation should not dwarf the much more important issue, which is the systematic removal of morality and religious values from our schools and other public functions.

Further, I must point out to this Council, the media and the public present this evening that a far bigger threat to the security of our families, our children and our homes is not the recent incidents of gun violence which we have experienced in our nation, but rather the very real threat which accompanies the burgeoning and mushrooming government debts.

Think about it!

May God bless the City of Bridgeport, the State of Connecticut and our great nation!

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Comments to City Council April 1, 2013 (Pre-Budget Delivery)

Council President McCarthy, Council members, neighbors and friends in the Chamber and those viewing this session at a later date, thank you for your presence and attention to my comments.

Would everyone reflect for a moment on the members of our City Council? Twenty adult persons who have run for office in the largest City in the State, who are attempting to carry both the representation responsibilities and the legislative and oversight duties for our City. It is a difficult job, especially since it is a part time job and you have no staff to assist you. The issues you face are complicated. Often you are faced with concerns that demand immediate decisions. In the absence of your own staff, you have to rely instead on City officials who are not independent of the Administration you are supposed to monitor and oversee as a fundamental part of systematic checks and balance. That's a big problem because as Council members you have been elected to represent the taxpayers and be independent of the Mayor and his or her Administration.

The Budget for 2013-2014 will be presented to you this evening right before the Charter deadline. You must review it in Special Hearings over 4-5 weeks along with at least one public meeting. This timeline is not appropriate or fair to you.

Is the Administration treating you with respect and understanding? Is it providing you with enough information and adequate time to perform this annual duty? Or do you feel an intense pressure from the short time frame the absence of staff support, and the lack of adequate information?

Mayor Finch is Chief Executive Officer of the City. He has all of the information available at a snap of his fingers and the greatest authority to make it available in any way and timing he chooses. When he ran for election he promised that he would "hold the line on taxes". Last year he broke that promise and you were complicit in accepting a tax increase. Yes, you reduced it lower than the Mayor asked, but your approval included at least \$4 Million of "ghost expenses" (vacant positions that were funded last May by your vote), as well as a significant pay raise for the Mayor and a number of City managers. In September, 2012 the Administration removed \$3.6 Million of those ghost positions with no comment to the public or the press. What happened to that money? Where is it being spent? Are you receiving information in a variance narrative monthly?

It should be clear that there should be NO TAX INCREASE this year for already highly taxed City taxpayers. Rather you should insist upon some budget discipline. This starts with you. I respectfully suggest that you DEMAND from

this administration, if it is not originally provided later this evening an ALTERNATIVE BUDGET; with reasonable assumptions as to Federal and State revenues; that holds the line on all operating expenses, so total spending remains level; that identifies the cuts that have to be made so that you understand CEO priorities and then can see how they stack up next to your own priorities as representatives; and finally that does not borrow to cover operating costs; and DOES NOT RAISE TAXES. Ask for it, insist on it, if you must, but get it and review it. Then you will be prepared to discuss it with the public in the public hearing you will schedule.

If one or more of the budgets presented does not meet the above criteria, several things will be obvious:

- The Mayor will be breaking his campaign promise once again.
- Raising taxes will further reduce property values as well as attractiveness of our City as a place to live and to do business.
- The operation of the City Council for fiscal oversight will again be called into serious question as will the role of each person sitting on the Council.

Last year I heard a statement from one of the Council members that suggesting NO TAX INCREASE to the Mayor could not be done because: "The Mayor won't like it." Did you hear that? The Mayor won't like it." What about my neighbor, an 80 year old widow who is being taxed out of her home because the Mayor ignores important Charter duties and does not adequately control City spending? There are lots of people who vote who do not like the current tax levels much less higher ones.

Please handle your responsibilities with the strength of a functioning legislature that has a critically important oversight responsibility and check and balance role. Whether you enjoy doing it or not, that is an important part of your job as a Council member. In fairness to all of you and the taxpayers, you need to make the Administration do the number crunching and prioritizing first. That is where your review should begin. And NO TAX INCREASE is where the budget discussion should begin and end. Time will tell.

Tax Increases

Mr. Walker mentioned the city charter. He spoke about the necessity for a single budget option, proposed spending levels and state and federal aid that he said would cause tax increases that will be totally inappropriate. He stated that Bridgeport is already a highly taxed city and any increase would have an effect on Bridgeport in many ways, which could result in an undesirable place to live. He suggested that the city council ask the Mayor about a single budget proposal with regard to state and federal aid and to restrain spending. He was adamant that property taxes shouldn't be raised.

Mark DelMonico

Tax Increases

Mr. DelMonico stated that he was the founder and CEO of Come Back America located at 211 State St. He stated he was there to speak about the upcoming budget process. He stated that he and others had been opposed to pay raises for city employees during the last fiscal year. He expressed his issue with the city council that has voted for pay raises for friends and relatives that work for the city. He relayed that in his opinion, 99% of Bridgeport residents are opposed to the pay raises. He mentioned that his taxes have drastically increased over the last couple of years, in addition to trying to maintain college expenses for his children. He asked the council to consider the hardship on residents when they vote on the budget.

- Joel Kent formerly worked for the Economic Development Office and he passed away last week.

Mayor Finch expressed that both persons would be missed.

Other business:

Mayor Finch gave a brief overview of the budget. He stated that the budget was prudent and sustainable and it has been discussed with the co-chairs of the Budget & Appropriations Committee.

He highlighted that the proposed tax increase would depend on three factors:

- The city's budget was based on the Governor's budget.
- Out of 1,313 positions, they are only increasing city positions by four (4).
- Cuts are being made in police overtime.

He went on to review the \$11 million cuts from the state. He stated that it was important not to jeopardize public safety. He noted that there has been a 1.6% increase from state cuts and another 1.6% from three other areas. He noted there have been significant costs in health care and because employees will incur a 25% contribution, the city will see a savings.

He said they will be asking for \$1.6 million in union concessions that will be consumed in the budget. Overall, he felt the budget was prudent.

Council President McCarthy stated that Mayor Finch was only presenting **one** budget to the city council; based on the governor's budget.

Mayor Finch read some statistics related to the average tax amounts that Bridgeport homeowners pay for: motor vehicle and personal property and equipment.

Council member Brantley commented on behalf of homeowners and herself, she asked that the Mayor be as prudent as possible when it comes to tax increases. She relayed that the residents are being hit with numerous taxes and it becomes a burden, even though initially it may seem miniscule. She made another request that they be prudent and not transfer any additional tax to the residents.

Mayor Finch stated that as always, they will try to be as prudent as possible and they will do everything they can not to strain the residents finances further. He said he understood that it's difficult times and he hoped that the legislature will help restore some funds. He emphasized that we need relief from the legislators and he urged everyone to reinforce that need.

Council President McCarthy stated that the Assistant City Clerk Frances will let them know when the budget books were available. He noted they will have to sign off in the city clerk's office to receive their book.

Mayor Finch made one last comment to clarify that Bridgeport doesn't have the highest taxes in the stated. He read the names of other municipalities that have higher taxes. He stressed that the falsehood regarding that should stop.

- Council member Brannelly relayed that numerous budget meetings were coming up, noting the importance of attendance during the next five to six weeks.
