John Marshall Lee 30 Beacon Street Bridgeport, CT 06605 City Finances.

Mr. Lee came forward and read the following statement into the record:

Playground Learning: Bridgeport Legacy

Status quo is a reference to the way things exist today, what folks expect to happen, or a current operating system that can be commonly observed. Sometimes the status quo models the statutes, ordinances, and laws of a community and other times the current structure and elected representatives indicate a variance.

When Joe Ganim entered his first sand box, he brought his own shovel and sand bucket as a privileged youngster. Did he learn to share with friends? When there were fights, was he a mediating voice for peace or was he found at the root of the dispute? Did he encourage diversity of playmates, or limit participants to those who can be managed? Are compensation and benefit rewards paid by taxes meant to purchase loyalty?

When Ganim left the sand box learning experience, he considered the seesaw and observed that if you load enough weight on one seat of the teeter totter, you could eliminate the weight of others by keeping them in the air and their feet off solid ground. No motion. One person in control. It was good. Can you see how the lesson of unbalancing this beam and keeping it unbalanced has served him well? The Council is called to speak up for the interests of all the people, without supporting cast. Mayor unchecked. Unbalanced.

But shockingly, authorities saw the corrupt behavior of Ganim1 and awarded him a profoundly serious time out. Time to think about life? Consider course changes? Members of the bar did not renew the right to practice. Instead, some folks of faith who trust in second chances as part of life offered mercy. Likely, they looked to him for different behavior that provides equal and open governance, accountable and regular oversight, transparency of fact and structure so that people can see the honest values, rather than suspect a conspiracy against fairness. (Why does the City web site continue to show that the City offers a FAIR RENT and FAIR HOUSING board when each of them expired for want of timely appointments by a series of mayors? What is FAIR about these eliminations of good governance?)

Why does the Mayor not encourage all employees, unionized and political appointees to be purposeful in their daily efforts for which they receive pay and large benefits? What theory of municipal management leave oversight of priorities and personnel to the winds? That which Tom McCarthy took away at one time from City Council use, permanent competent staffing, why is it so threatening to Ganim2? Will the TV cameras be on next Monday when the City Council next meets archiving the ongoing drama? Time will tell.

Helen Olga Losak 304 Bradley Street Bridgeport, CT 06610 Noise Ordinance that applies to daytime hours and no annoyance to neighbors.

Ms. Losak came forward and stated she lives in the 138th District. She stated that it was National Be Kind to Your Neighbor Day.

Ms. Losak went on to inform the Council Members that there was a Daytime Noise Ordinance, which has been in effect for several years. She said that she had called the police last week about a neighbor who was yelling and screaming at his children. She confronted the neighbor, who then claimed Ms. Losak was harassing him.

When the police officer arrived, the officer who had been on the force for five years, was unaware of the daytime noise ordinance. She was astonished by his lack of knowledge. She said the Council should make sure all the police officers are aware of this ordinance and obey it to make Bridgeport a better place for its residents. There needs to be a City-wide campaign against noise.

Maria Pereira 206 Bradley Street Bridgeport, CT 06610 In-person meetings & 2023 Budget Fiasco.

Council Member Pereira said that the State statute that allows the Council to have the virtual meetings has been extended past May 1st by the legislature. She noted that the Council has to vote as a body to have virtual meetings. By not doing this, the Council is in violation of State statute. People have the right to see their legislators and she added they were denying people a fundamental principle of democracy.

Council Member Pereira said that the Council had become complacent. The Mayor is not at fault since the City Charter indicates that any three Council Members can submit a request to the Mayor for a Special Meeting. She said that they have to be strategic.

The Council needs to ask what they had done incorrectly and what they could do better. She suggested that they amend the ordinance for regular meetings since the calendar has to be submitted to the State by January 31st. The Council should schedule regular meetings for the last three days which can then be canceled if they are not needed. The City Council was played by the Mayor. Touché.

The Council needs to be more strategic when handling the City's budget.

Karen Jackson Street 213 Bunnell Street Bridgeport, CT 06607 Sweeping, permanent parking on city streets, lack of police follow through of the noise ordinance, etc.

Ms. Jackson came forward and said she was having a problem with the Police Officers when she has called them. They refuse to take a report because she was not providing them with her I.D. One only needs to provide I.D. if one has committed a crime, but she had not committed a crime.

When she requested Police records, they will not release them without a driver's license. This was not noted on the records.

She added that there was an issue with noise pollution due to an impromptu social club. When she calls the police, nothing happens, until last week. One individual parked his car on the street for the last five and a half months without moving it. It was finally moved last week when the owner found out she was coming to the Council about this. She gave the details of the situation and claimed that the individual was selling drugs and has created a hostile environment by parking his vehicle directly in front of her residence. Now she has to cross the street to get to her car.

Ms. Jackson said that when she comes to City Hall, which is a public building, she has to tell the receptionist where she is going. She said that this was wrong.

Ms. Carmen Lopez was the next speaker signed up. She was not present.

Mr. Terry Sullivan came forward and said that he lives on Beacon Street. He said that he had filled out applications for the Boards and Commissions but had never received any response. He asked how to submit an application so that he will know that the administration had received it. He also asked how to find out which Boards and Commissions had vacancies.

Council President Nieves asked if he had the application with him. Mr. Sullivan said that he did not. Council President Nieves said she would meet Mr. Sullivan at City Hall the next day to get his application.

Mr. Christopher Caruso was the next speaker signed up. He was not present.

Ms. Callie Heilmann came forward and said that she lives on Grovers Avenue. She added that she was the co-director of Bridgeport Now. She said that she was present to thank the Council for standing up to the Mayor, who has repeatedly shown his desire to hold power over the Council, which is a duly elected legislative branch. This ignores the Charter and the will of the people. There is only one budget, not the Mayor's Budget or the Council's budget – it's just the City's budget.

The Committee worked hard to increase and decrease the budget and held public hearings to hear from the people. She said that the Council was supposed to vote on the Budget on May 9th. She said that the Mayor had cancelled the meeting because he did not like the budget and failed to schedule the meeting for May 10th. The Mayor has a line-item veto. He is not a good faith actor. She encouraged the Council to use the State statute to vote to amend the budget. The people of Bridgeport stand with the Council.

She was surprised that this was not advertised because it could help businesses. People need to know what is available from the government and how to qualify for it.

Council Member Pereira requested a roll call on this item.

Council Member Pereira said that the item was not properly noticed and said that it was not an urgent matter as it has to do with having legal counsel in the future. She said that she was opposed to this and would be filing a complaint with the FOIA if it passes because it is a flagrant violation of the FOIA.

Council Member Newton asked his fellow Council Members to support this item.

Council Member Burns said that the it was clear that the Council Members were asking for an independent legal opinion.

Council Member Cruz said that he would be supporting the resolution. After this past week, the Council needs their own attorney to help them. He felt that the administration had been disrespectful to the Council and treated them like a little child. Council Member Cruz said that he was present to represent his District and the City Attorney's Office had acted disgracefully towards the Council. He said that he had wanted to thank the Council Members for their hard

work. He will continue to speak his mind about the disrespectful manner in which the Council Members were treated.

Council Member Mack said that he was disappointed with how this came out and was sorry that the residents saw how this played out. The City Attorney is supposed to be impartial. He said that the legislative and administrative branches were equal parts and he would support this item.

Council Member Herron said that they have been trying to get their own independent attorney because the community needs this. They have been trying to get this done for years. They need to have guidance on the statute so they will know what to do.

Council Member Lyons asked Atty. Anastasi to give an explanation about Agenda Item 83-21 - Resolution presented by Council President Nieves and Councilmember(s): Mack, Burns, Newton, McCarthy & Herron re: Proposed Resolution for obtaining an Independent Legal Opinion for the City Council.

Atty. Anastasi said that there was a certain amount of specificity in the wording. He said that the Council would have to justify what the urgency was for immediate consideration and include it on the record.

Atty. Anastasi said that Council President Nieves had referred to having three attorneys interviewed. He reviewed the process and noted that the final step was having the City Attorney sign off on it. This needs to be done according to the Charter. He repeated that the urgency for immediate consideration needed to be included in the record.

Council Member Lyons said that she would like to see this referred to Committee because she believes that they need an attorney for all the issues.

Atty. Anastasi said that when there is a conflict the charter says that the City Attorney would assign an outside counsel.

Council Member Burns said that regarding the timing of the request, there was nothing that states it has to be an emergency. He said that the Council could request outside counsel at any time for any reason.

Council Member McCarthy said that he agreed that the Council needs outside counsel and there should be an investigation into the City Attorney's office to identify the leak. He said that there should be a vote. The Council spent hours and hours and in the end were disrespected because the Council should have the right to vote. He said that the Finance staff sat with the Committee through all those hours, too.

Council Member McBride-Lee said that she did not want to wake up and see a Connecticut Post or Channel 12 article about the Council. Council Member McBride-Lee said that she had voted

against the budget because right is right and wrong is wrong. The whole Council needs to make the decision and it needs to be done right.

Council Member Pereira asked what part of the vote they were on. She wished to clarify this vote was on suspending the rules for immediate consideration. Council Member Pereira said that this was about getting a one-time legal opinion, not selecting legal counsel for the Council. She read a portion of Section 5 of the rules about taking a vote on immediate consideration.

They need a roll call vote for immediate consideration.

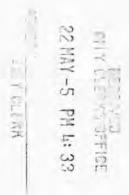

A Resolution by the Bridgeport City Council

Regarding the

MPH Fieldwork Education Agreement with University of Bridgeport/Goodwin University

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport Department of Health and Human Services seeks to serve as a Fieldwork Education Center for University of Bridgeport/Goodwin University's Master of Public Health (MPH) Program; and

WHEREAS, supervised Fieldwork Education is an integral part of the academic process and professional preparation as it compliments academic preparation by providing opportunities to apply knowledge and practice skills and allows students to begin to be able to demonstrate professional competence; and

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport is committed to establishing mutually beneficial community partnerships; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable and in the public interest that the City partner with University of Bridgeport/Goodwin College to serve as a Fieldwork Education Center by offering professional internship opportunities to University of Bridgeport/Goodwin University MPH students at no cost to the City.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL:

- That it hereby authorizes the City to participate in the Fieldwork Education Program at University of Bridgeport/Goodwin University, and
- That it hereby authorizes, directs and empowers the Mayor or his designee, the Director of Health and Social Services, to execute all documents necessary to effectuate the City's participation in the Fieldwork Education Program.

EDUCATIONAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF BRIDGEPORT AND UNIVERSITY OF BRIDGEPORT/ GOODWIN UNIVERSITY

For Internship Assignments at the City of Bridgeport Department of Health & Social Services.

This AFFILIATION AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") is made by and between the UNIVERSITY OF BRIDGEPORT/GOODWIN UNIVERSITY (the "University"), located at 124 Park Avenue, Bridgeport, Connecticut 06604, and the City of Bridgeport Department of Health & Social Services (the "Field Site"), located at 999 Broad Street, Bridgeport, CT 06604.

WHEREAS, the University desires to establish an internship experience as part of its education of students (whether one or more, hereinafter called the "Students") enrolled in its undergraduate and graduate programs; and

WHEREAS, the Field Site, in the interest of furthering the educational objectives of the University, desires to have its Department of Health serve as a site for the internship program;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements set forth below, the parties agree as follows:

I. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY:

It is agreed the University shall:

- Accept responsibility for the student's academic preparation for this internship placement and to assign only those students who have an interest in public health and have satisfactorily completed the required course of study including Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA) training.
- 2. Perform Student background checks and require that each Student provide a copy of government issued identification and documentation of updated health and immunization status to minimize risk of infection to clients, patients, and department personnel prior to internship at Field Site. The University shall maintain documentation and provide a copy of such documentation to Field Site before a Student is allowed to participate in an internship. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Filed Site, at its sole discretion, may conduct its own background check of each Student and the University shall inform each Student that refusal to authorize such a check shall be grounds for removal from the Field Site and the internship program.
- 3. Educate Student regarding his/her role at Field Site and of the following requirements, expectations and responsibilities that will be placed upon him/her:
- 4. The Student shall not participate in any direct patient assessment or treatment. The student shall not perform clinic treatment setup or breakdown procedures, disinfection or instrument sterilization procedures.

- 5. Designate an education coordinator to work in conjunction with the supervisor designated by Field Site in the preparation prior to sending Students to Field Site, e.g., determining the appropriate period of the internship assignment, and identifying the goals and objectives for the experience should be met through the planned internship.
- 6. Provide to Field Site at least six weeks' notice in the event cancellation of internship assignment is necessary.
- 7. Affirm and warrant upon request that it does not discriminate against any person or group of persons in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or of the State of Connecticut.
- 8. Upon request, provide an up-to-date written description of the curriculum and syllabus governing the non-clinical assignment, in collaboration with input from Field Site.
- Request and maintain documentation that participating Faculty maintain in good standing all licenses, certifications, permits and other approvals necessary to perform the obligations under this Agreement.
- 10. If appropriate and necessary, remove a Student from the Field Site at the Field Site's request, or if the University determines the Student is unsuitable to continue in the nonclinical assignment.
- 11. The University shall provide general liability insurance to the students and or instructors with policy limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate per year General requirements. All policies shall include the following provisions:
 - 11.1 Cancellation notice—The City shall be entitled to receive from the insurance carriers BY POLICY ENDORSEMENT not less than 30 days' written notice of cancellation or non-renewal or reduction in coverage on all policies except for nonpayment or for Workers' Compensation to be given to the CITY at: Purchasing Agent, City of Bridgeport, Margaret E. Morton Government Center, 999 Broad Street, Bridgeport, Connecticut 06604.
 - 11.2 Proof of Insurance —All policies will be evidenced by an original certificate of insurance, declarations page and applicable policy endorsement(s) delivered to the City and authorized and executed by the insurer or a properly-authorized agent or representative reflecting all coverage required, all such documents required to be delivered to the City prior to any work or other activity commencing under this agreement.
 - Additional insured—GVS will arrange with its insurance agents or brokers to name the City, its elected officials, officers, department heads, employees and agents on all liability policies of primary and excess insurance coverages as additional insured parties BY POLICY ENDORSEMENT and as loss payee with respect to any damage to property of the City, as its interest may appear. The undersigned shall submit to the City upon commencement of this agreement and periodically thereafter, but in no event less than once during each year of this agreement,

evidence of the existence of such insurance coverages in the form of original Certificates of Insurance. Such certificates shall designate the City in the following form and manner:

"City of Bridgeport, its elected officials, officers, department heads, employees, agents, servants, successors and assigns ATIMA Margaret E. Morton Government Center 999 Broad Street, 2nd Floor Bridgeport, Connecticut 06604"

II. RESPONSIBILITIES OF FIELD SITE: It is agreed Field Site shall:

- Provide for the Students, insofar as possible, selected internship experiences designed to focus
 on and correlate with the theory and concepts acquired in their academic education in accordance
 with the terms of this Agreement. Field Site retains at all times the authority and responsibility for
 the delivery of patient care.
- 2. Provide the Student with necessary orientation, administrative guidelines, procedures, and other information deemed appropriate to the conduct of the non-clinical assignment.
- 3. Maintain administrative and professional supervision/responsibility of Students insofar as their presence affects the operation of Field Site and/or the direct or indirect care of patients.
- 4. Communicate with the University when and if the student is not meeting the expectations of the internship assignment.
- 5. Plan and implement internship assignments, as required by and in consultation with representatives of the University and evaluate the performance of the Student in accordance with the criteria established by University, and in consultation with Faculty.
- 6. Provide to the University at least six weeks written notice prior to the internship assignment if cancellation is necessary.
- 7. Designate a Field Education Coordinator (the "Field Education Coordinator") who will act as a liaison with the University's education coordinator to prepare in advance of placing Students at the Field Site, e.g., determining the appropriate period of the internship assignment, and striving to meet the goals and objectives for the experience.
- 8. Promptly notify University if a student's performance is not meeting expectations or if there are any other problems.
- 9. Affirm and warrant upon request that it does not discriminate against any person or group of persons in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or of the State of Connecticut.
- The Field Site will provide proof that it maintains liability insurance or self-insurance in an amount that is commercially reasonable.

III. ADDITIONAL TERMS OF THE AGREEMENT:

- 1. Term: This Agreement shall be effective upon the date of last execution and shall continue in full force and effect for up to one (1) year therefrom ("Term"). Either party may renew this agreement annually, for up to three years, by providing the other party with notice within ninety days of the Term, unless either party terminates in writing at least ninety (90) days in advance of the Term.
- 2. Termination: If at any time either party wishes to terminate this Agreement without cause, a written notice must be submitted to the other party at least ninety (90) days prior to the date of the desired termination. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time for cause by giving seven (7) days written notice to the party in breach of the Agreement. The Field Site may request in writing that a Student or Faculty member be immediately removed if it believes that that his or her participation under this Agreement may be putting the health and safety of Field Site's staff and participants at risk.
- Modification: This Agreement may be revised or modified by written amendment signed by both parties.
- 4. Confidentiality: During and after the term of affiliation with Field Site, the University, including without limitation its Students and Faculty, will not directly or indirectly disclose or make available to any person, firm, corporation, association or other entity for any reason or purpose whatsoever, or use or cause to be used in any manner adverse to the interests of Field Site, any medical, financial, administrative or other confidential business or patient information, including both open and closed patient records, except as required by law and to the extent such information is patient-identifiable, University may only use or disclose such information to the extent Field Site is permitted to do so.
- 5. Reasonable Accommodations: In the event that a student meets the requirements applicable to students set forth in the "responsibilities of the University" section of this Agreement, but nevertheless requires reasonable accommodation, the Field Site will assist the University in providing such reasonable accommodation provided that (i) it does not interrupt Field Site operations, (ii) there is no safety threat to patients, staff and other students, (iii) the University assumes any special costs associated with the accommodation, and (iv) the University provides and pays for any personnel who must accompany the student or provide transportation.
- 6. Relationship of the Student and Faculty to the Field Site: The Students and Faculty participating in the non-clinical assignment at Field Site shall not be considered employees or agents of Field Site. The Students shall not be eligible for any employee benefits of Field Site. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Students, when engaged at the Field Site as part of this non-clinical experience, shall be considered members of the Field Site's workforce (as 45 CFR 160.103 defines a workforce) solely for the purpose of defining the Student's role in relation to using and disclosing the Field Site's protected health information in compliance with HIPAA.

- 7. Compliance with Law: Both parties shall perform their obligations under this Agreement in accordance with all applicable state, federal, and local laws, regulations, and ordinances, including the Family Educational Right to Privacy Act ("FERPA"). To the extent that the Field Site obtains or creates educational records of the Students, the Field Site shall comply with FERPA in handling such records. The University shall direct Students to comply with the policies and procedures of the Field Site, including HIPAA. The Field Site shall retain sole responsibility for HIPAA training, compliance, and supervision, insofar as Students' direct and indirect care implicates administrative and professional HIPAA requirements.
- 8. Non-Assignment: This Agreement may not be assigned without the prior written consent of both parties.
- 9. Governing Law: This Agreement shall be governed, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Connecticut and any applicable Federal laws.
- 10. Notice: Notices given under this Agreement must be in writing and hand-delivered, sent by U.S. mail or overnight courier service to the following address: I

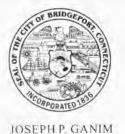
- 11. No Waiver: The waiver or breach of this Agreement shall not be considered a continuing waiver or a waiver of any subsequent breach of either the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 12. Indemnification for Negligent or Wrongful Acts or Omissions. In the event that the negligent or wrongful act or omission is caused by the University, its officers, agents, employees, representatives or students (collectively "the University parties"), the University shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City of Bridgeport, and its officers, employees and agents, from any and all claims of (a) loss and damage to property, and (b) injury or death to persons, including costs, expenses and reasonable attorneys' fees.
- 13. Severability: If any term of this Agreement is found to be unenforceable or contrary to law, it shall be modified to the least extent to render it enforceable, and the remaining terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

- 14. Electronic Signatures. A facsimile or scanned signature copy of this Agreement and its Exhibits, notices and documents prepared under this Agreement shall be considered an original. The Parties agree that any document in electronic format or any document reproduced from an electronic format shall not be denied legal effect, validity, or enforceability, and shall meet any requirement to provide an original or hard copy.
- 15. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in any number of identical counterparts, each of which shall be deemed a duplicate original.
- 16. Entire Agreement: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior agreements.

Resolution Authorizing the Amendment of Bridgeport Code of Ordinances Chapter 12.16.245 In Relation to the Shared Mobility Program

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2019, the City Council of Bridgeport adopted Resolution 125-18, authorizing the City's Office of Planning and Economic Development ("OPED") to administer a Shared Mobility Pilot Program (the "Pilot") of shared bicycles, electric bicycles, and electric scooters until November 30, 2020 in furtherance of <u>Plan Bridgeport</u> Goal 1.1, which requires that the City work to "improve usage of transit and alternative modes of transportation;" and

WHEREAS, in establishing the Pilot, the Council authorized certain amendments to the *Bridgeport Code* of *Ordinances Chapter 12.16 – Street and Sidewalk Regulations*, per Item 123-18, approved September 16, 2019, and Item 194-19, approved December 7, 2020; and

WHEREAS, through a combination of feedback mechanisms, OPED has found that the Pilot, taking place between September 16, 2019, and December 31, 2021, indeed furthers *Plan Bridgeport* Goal 1.1 by providing a quality alternative mobility option and increasing quality of life for Bridgeport residents; and

WHEREAS, equitable access led to 86,000 individual rides during the two-year Pilot, with one quarter of riders using the scooters to commute to work or school, and 9 out of 10 riders satisfied with the program; and

WHEREAS, the Council authorized certain amendments to the *Bridgeport Code of Ordinances*, *Chapter* 12.16 – STREET AND SIDEWALK USE REGULATIONS, per item 36-21, approved April 18, 2022 to make permanent and ongoing the Shared Mobility Program; and

WHEREAS, the Council adopted a resolution on April 18, 2022, per item 35-21, which authorized the Office of Planning and Economic Development (OPED) to administer the ongoing Shared Mobility Program; and

WHEREAS, the Bridgeport Code of Ordinances is the most appropriate location to authorize OPED to administer the Shared Mobility Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRIDGEPORT: Chapter 12.16 of the Municipal Code of Ordinances – Street and Sidewalk Use Regulations – is hereby amended as per the attached Exhibit A, with such amendment to be effective immediately.

Chapter 12.16 STREET AND SIDEWALK USE REGULATIONS¹

12.16.010 Street and highway grading requirements.

- A. All grades of highways shall be made and mapped in reference to some fixed point or base in the city.
- B. No street shall be laid out by the city unless at the same time a grade of such proposed street shall be duly established by the common council.
- C. No street shall be accepted by the city until the same has been brought to a grade duly approved by the common council, which grading shall be certified to by the city engineer.

12.16.020 Use by animals.

No person shall cause or permit any animal or vehicle to stand upon or across any sidewalk so as to hinder or impede travel thereon nor upon any crosswalk; nor leave unattended any animal used for riding or driving, whether attached to any vehicle or not, unless such animal shall be securely fastened; nor fasten any animal to any tree or leave it so that it injures any street; nor ride or drive any animal on any street at a greater rate of speed than seven miles an hour. (Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.030 Playing in streets.

Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, no person shall ride any vehicle propelled by the feet, or any cart or wheelbarrow upon or along any sidewalk. No person shall coast, slide, fly kites or play ball or any other game in any street. (Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.040 Obstructing travel on public ways.

No person shall loiter or idle upon any highway, sidewalk or bridge, or upon any fence or structure adjacent thereto, so as to hinder travel thereon. (Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.050 Fences.

A. No hedge, shrubbery or full board fence shall be permitted at a height of more than four feet on any corner lot within a distance of twenty-five (25) feet from the corner point of the fence line on the street sides of such lot.

B. Every owner of any lot of land which abuts upon any street shall, when ordered to do so by the common council, cause to be erected and maintained on the line of such lot adjoining the street a suitable and sufficient fence of rails, boards or other materials; and the director of public facilities is authorized to erect such a fence at the expense of the parties interested, when the owner shall neglect to provide the same within the time limited in such order.

12.16.060 Maintenance of stands on streets and sidewalks.

Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, no person shall place or maintain and no person shall permit or suffer the placing or maintenance on or along any street or sidewalk of any cart, wagon, vehicle, box, stand, container, sign or any other article or thing for the purpose of selling, offering for sale, displaying or advertising any article of food, or any goods, wares or merchandise, or advertising any business or amusement or place of such business or amusement.

12.16.070 Selling from sidewalks.

No person occupying or using any premises adjoining any sidewalk shall use, and no person occupying or using any such premises shall permit or suffer anyone to use, any part of any sidewalk for the purpose of selling or offering for sale, or inducing the sale of any article of food, or any goods, wares or merchandise displayed or maintained on the premises occupied or used by such person.

12.16.080 Selling to persons on sidewalks.

No person occupying or using any premises adjoining any sidewalk shall sell or offer to sell, from such premises or any part thereof to any person on the sidewalk adjoining such premises, any article of food, or any goods, wares or merchandise or any other thing maintained, displayed or advertised for sale on such premises; nor shall any person occupying or using such premises suffer or permit any other person to do so.

12.16.090 Use of street or sidewalk in making delivery of goods.

No person in making delivery to any place of any article of food, or of any goods, wares or merchandise or of any other thing, shall deposit and permit any such article to remain upon any street or sidewalk; and no person receiving any such delivery shall permit or suffer any such article to remain upon any street or sidewalk.

(Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.100 Sidewalk stands—Exceptions to chapter.

Nothing in this chapter shall apply to or forbid the maintenance of any sidewalk stand for the sale of newspapers under any license therefor now or hereafter issued by the chief of police pursuant to the provisions of Sections 12.08.010, 12.08.020 and 12.16.170; nor to any stand in any city-owned park maintained by or the maintenance of which is licensed by the city; nor to any receptacle for the deposit of refuse or rubbish maintained

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for the use of the public by or with the permission of the city; nor to refuse or garbage deposited for collection by the director of public facilities, provided such refuse or garbage is deposited in such manner and form, in such receptacles and at such places as are approved by the director of public facilities; nor to lawful picketing in any bona fide labor dispute.

12.16.110 Awnings.

No awning, which is designed to be attached to any permanently erected frame extending over any part of the sidewalk or to any pole or post set in the sidewalk or street, shall be placed over or across any public sidewalk unless a permit for the erection and maintenance of such awning shall be procured from the common council. No part of any awning, when extended over any sidewalk, shall be less than seven feet above the level of the sidewalk.

12.16.120 Parades.

All street parades and processions bearing banners, or other conspicuous devices, or accompanied with music or any disturbing sounds, except the national guard, the police and fire departments and funeral processions engaged in the burial of the dead, are prohibited, unless permission therefor shall be first obtained from the chief of police. The chief of police may furnish a police escort for any such parade or procession if deemed by him necessary or proper.

12.16.130 Restrictions on moving buildings through the streets.

- A. Every application for a license to remove a building under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 7(g) of the Charter and Related Laws compilation found on file shall state the name of the owner of the building to be moved, the name of the person who is to move the same, the precise location from and to which the building is to be moved, the distance from the proposed front line of such building to the line of the street, the street or streets through which it is to be conveyed, the dimensions of the building and the nature of the materials of which it is constructed. The director of public facilities, in his discretion, may approve or deny the application for a license.
- B. Every application under this section shall be carefully filed and preserved.
- C. No person receiving permission to remove a building, as provided for in this section, shall be deemed to have permission to remove the same through or upon any street not designated in his application or permit. No such license shall be granted until the applicant has filed a bond, with good and sufficient surety in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00), payable to the city for its benefit and for the benefit of any person who may be specially injured thereby, which bond shall be approved by the city attorney.
- D. Every such license shall have limited therein a certain date before which time such moving is to be completed.
- E. If such building remains upon any street after such date, the director of public facilities in his discretion shall either complete the moving of the same, or, if in his judgment such building as a whole cannot reasonably be moved to its destination, he shall have the power to separate the building into parts, so that he can reasonably remove it from the street. The licensee shall be liable under such bond for any expense, cost, loss

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and damage sustained by the city. The city shall not be liable to the owner of such building for any damage that may be done by the director of public facilities in removing the building from the street.

12.16.140 Removal of sod, turf, etc.

No person shall cut or dig up any sod or turf in any street or public square with the intent to remove or carry away the same, or remove or carry away any earth, gravel or street dirt from any street without permission of the director of public facilities.

(Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.150 Removal of obstructions, snow and ice from sidewalks.

- A. Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, every person owning any land upon or adjacent to which there is a sidewalk, paved, concreted or worked, shall keep such sidewalk at all times in a safe and convenient condition for the use of the public, and shall forthwith repair all defects and remove all obstructions in any way endangering the public travel upon the same.
- B. Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, every owner or occupant of any land or building, or the owner or lessee of any unoccupied land or building adjoining any sidewalk, shall, before sunset, remove any wood, coal, box, barrel, can or any other thing by which such sidewalk shall be in whole or in part obstructed or rendered unsafe or inconvenient to public travel.
- C. Every owner or occupant of any land or building, or the owner or lessee of any unoccupied land or building, shall keep and maintain any sidewalk adjoining such land and building free from snow, ice or sleet, by which such sidewalk shall be obstructed or rendered unsafe. Whenever such sidewalk shall be permitted to remain covered with snow, ice or sleet for more than six hours after the same shall have been deposited or formed thereon, the director of public facilities may remove such snow, ice or sleet from sidewalk and report the expenses of such removal to the city attorney, who shall immediately collect the same by any proper action against the owner or occupant of the land or building, or the owner or lessee of any unoccupied land or building, adjoining such sidewalk. This section shall not be so construed as to conflict with Section 19-310 of the General Statutes.

12.16.160 Liability for ice and snow on public sidewalks.

- A. The provisions of Connecticut General Statutes Section 7-163a are adopted, and are set forth in subsections B and C of this section.
- B. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 13a-149 of the General Statutes or any other general statute or special act, the city shall not be liable to any person injured in person or property caused by the presence of ice or snow on a public sidewalk unless the city is the owner or person in possession and control of land abutting such sidewalk, other than land used as a highway or street, provided the city shall be liable for its affirmative acts with respect to such sidewalk.
- C. The owner or person in possession and control of land abutting a public sidewalk shall have the same duty of care with respect to the presence of ice or snow on such sidewalk toward the portion of the sidewalk abutting his property as the municipality had prior to the effective date of the ordinance codified in this

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section adopted pursuant to the provisions of Connecticut General Statutes Section 7-163a and shall be liable to persons injured in person or property where a breach of duty is the proximate cause of injury.

 No action to recover damages for injury to the person or to property caused by the presence of ice or snow on a public sidewalk against a person who owns or is in possession and control of land abutting a public sidewalk shall be brought but within two years from the date when the injury is first sustained.

12.16.170 Duty to clean gutters.

In case the gutter opposite any dwelling house, store or other building, or opposite any lot of ground, shall at any time become obstructed with snow, ice, dirt or anything whatsoever, the owner, occupant or person having charge thereof shall cause such gutter to be cleaned out so that the water may run freely along the same.

12.16.180 Marking of private streets.

Whenever any street shall be laid out over and across private land by the owner thereof, and until the same shall be accepted by the common council, the person making such layout and the owner of such private street shall maintain at either entrance to such street, and at the intersection of such street with any other street, a suitable sign or notice approved by the director of public facilities and containing thereon the words "private street."

(Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.190 Prohibitions as to advertising matter.

No person who by virtue of a license granted under this chapter shall occupy a portion of any street with building materials, or by virtue of such license shall erect a fence of any description in any portion of a city street, shall place or cause or suffer to be placed thereon any poster, bill, placard or other printed, written or painted material by way of notice, announcement or advertisement of any event, thing, business or other matter except such as may be required by law. The violation of this section, in addition to any other penalty provided by law, shall be a sufficient reason for the revocation of such license by the director of public facilities without notice.

12.16.200 Maintenance and repair of motor vehicles on public streets and highways and/or on city-owned or leased property.

- A. No person shall make any repairs on any motor vehicle on the public streets or highways of the city except for changing of bulbs and lenses, changing of windshield wipers, installation of air filters, minor repair of electrical wires, changing or replacing of a battery, minor repair and/or maintenance of the interior of a vehicle, the changing of a flat tire, or other repairs of a similar minor nature, provided such minor repairs are performed in an expeditious manner and do not, in any manner, interfere or obstruct access of vehicles on such streets or highways.
- B. No person shall make any repairs on any motor vehicle on any city-owned or leased premises within the city unless having first received permission from the police department.

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- C. Any emergency repairs performed by a licensed mechanic, service station or auto repair shop shall be permitted and not be considered a violation of this section, if performed expeditiously.
- D. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be subject to having the motor vehicle he is making repairs on immediately towed from its location by order of the police department at his expense.
- E. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the first offense. Any persons violating the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for a second offense. Any person violating the provisions of this section for a third and any subsequent times, shall be liable for a fine of not less than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and/or up to thirty (30) days in jail.

12.16.210 Permit to occupy portion of street—Issuance authorized.

- A. Every person intending to erect or repair any building upon any land abutting on any street must receive from the director of public facilities a permit to occupy a portion of such street with building materials or to fence off a portion of the sidewalk in the protection of the public; provided, however, that no such permit shall be granted authorizing or permitting any person to occupy or close more than one-half of the width of the sidewalk upon such land abuts.
- B. Every person intending to use any portion of any street or sidewalk for an entertainment event or block party must receive from the director of public facilities a permit to occupy such street and/or sidewalk for a limited time. No permit shall be granted denying access to any pedestrian sidewalk but the street may be closed to vehicular travel. If such a permit is granted, the police chief and emergency operations officer must be given written notice of said permit a minimum of seven business days prior to said event.

12.16.220 Permit to occupy portion of street—Fee.

A fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) shall be paid to the director of public facilities for the use of the city for each month or part thereof that any street or sidewalk shall be occupied or closed pursuant to the permit authorized by Section 12.16.210.

12.16.230 Permit to occupy portion of street—Duty of permittee to provide safe passage around obstruction.

Any person duly permitted to occupy any part of any street pursuant to a permit issued as authorized by Section 12.16.210, while erecting or repairing any building, opening any sewer or making any excavation in any street for any purpose, shall provide safe and convenient passage around or over the same for public travel, and shall be responsible to the city for any damage occasioned by any neglect to do so.

12.16.240 Permit to occupy portion of street-Display.

Any person occupying any portion of any street under a permit issued under Section 12.16.210 shall, when requested by the director of public facilities or any police officer, exhibit his permit for such occupation.

(Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.245 Permit to Use City Streets and Sidewalks for the Shared Mobility Program.

- A. Permit Required. No person shall operate a Shared Mobility System, as defined by City Ordinance Chapter 10.32.010, for use in the City without first having obtaining approval from the Office of Planning and Economic Development.
- B. Filing of Application—Fee. Each applicant for approval to operate a Shared Mobility System, as defined by City Ordinance Chapter 10.32.010, shall file an application with the Director of the Office of Planning and Economic Development, subject to terms and conditions established by said Director, and pay a non-refundable fee in the amount of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) plus a Mobility Manager software maintenance fee to the City of Bridgeport upon application submission and by the first day of each subsequent calendar year. A separate fee for use of City right-of-way shall be assessed quarterly. Such applicant and usage fee revenue collected by the Office of Planning and Economic Development shall be deposited and accounted for in a City special revenue account used for Mobility Manager software costs and improving the City's bicycle infrastructure. The Office of Planning and Economic Development shall administer the Shared Mobility Program, which shall include the establishment of fees, terms, and conditions, which may be amended from time to time, and such amendments shall be reported to the City Council.
- C. Impoundment of Shared Mobility Devices. The Office of Planning and Economic Development shall create one or more shared mobility device pounds to which shared mobility devices may be removed at the direction of any police officer or parking enforcement officer for the city for caused specified below. The pounds to be created under this chapter shall be city-owned storage garages or such other appropriate cityowned places as shall be designated by the Office of Planning and Economic Development.
 - 1. Devices subject to impoundment:
 - (i) Those devices not removed by a Provider within the allotted time of a removal notice, specifically
 - In the event of extreme weather, emergencies, special events or for maintenance activities ("Event"), the owner of the device shall remove all devices from the Event area within tenhours of a notice by the Official;
 - b. When the number of devices deployed within a specific area is deemed excessive, the Provider must reduce its fleet in said area within four hours of receiving notice between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., seven days per week. Any notice received outside of these hours will count as being received at 7:00 a.m. the next day;
 - c. Devices deemed inoperable, unsafe, or otherwise failing to meet the standards identified in the application, which the Provider does not remove from the active fleet within two hours of receiving notice between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., seven days per week. Any notice outside of these hours will count as being received at 7:00 a.m. the next day;
 - Those devices parked in violation of the application parking requirements or in one location for more than three consecutive days;
 - (iii) Those devices used in violation of any applicable local, state or federal law, rule, or regulation;

2. Impounding fee. Before the owner or representative of the owner of any device taken into custody in accordance with Section 1 hereof shall be allowed to secure the release of such device, the owner or its representative shall pay to the Office of Planning and Economic Development fifty dollars (\$50.00) per device. Such revenue collected by the Office of Planning and Economic Development shall be deposited and accounted for in a City special revenue account used for the sole purpose of improving the City's bicycle infrastructure.

(Ord. dated 12/7/20, Exh. A; Ord. dated 9/16/19)

12.16.250 Miscellaneous acts prohibited.

The erecting or placing of any building, gate, fence, post, box, cask, wood, brick, stone, non-motor vehicle unattached to any animal, or any other thing upon any sidewalk or street; the placing, hanging or maintaining of any flag, banner, article of merchandise or other thing except awnings and signs over or across any sidewalk or street; the opening or making of any vault or cellar in, upon or under any street; and the kindling of any fire or bonfire in any public street are prohibited without consent of the common council; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be construed so as to prevent or hinder any person, while in the process of building or repairing any building, from placing in any street materials for such purposes under such conditions and restrictions as may be prescribed in each particular case in a permit issued therefore under this section.

A. Exemptions.

- Nothing in Section 12.16.250, above, shall prohibit the implementation committee of any neighborhood revitalization zone whose implementation plan has been approved by the city council from seeking permission from the director of public facilities to provide trash can receptacles for placement within the public right-of-way, provided the design of the trash can has been pre-approved by the director or his or her designee; the placement of said cans is done by the staff of the public facilities department following the issuance of a written approval for said placement by said director, or his or her designee, in accordance with Section 7-148(b)(H) and City Ordinance 8.68 Littering; and conditioned upon the property owner whose property fronts where the trash can shall be located, being notified in writing ten days prior to the placement of the trash can that the acceptance of the trash can at the location requires that the trash can be emptied by the property owner through private methods. The property owners shall also be given a copy of the Municipal Ordinance 8.60 Unlawful Depositing so that they are aware that if the trash can is not maintained in a manner that does not violate that ordinance, the trash can shall be removed by order of the director of public facilities and civil penalties shall be imposed in accordance with Ordinance 8.60. In addition, nothing in this chapter shall prevent the city health director under the statutory authority granted to all municipal health directors in 19a-206, from issuing orders, requesting the imposition of equitable, civil and/or criminal penalties by requesting such action from the State Housing Court at Bridgeport, if it is found that the failure to maintain the trash can also violated the Public Health Code.
- 2. Nothing in Section 12.16.250, above, shall prohibit the placement of bus station shelters within the public right-of-way by the transit authority authorized to provide bus service to the citizens of Bridgeport who are entitled to such access pursuant to Section 7-148(6)(C)(ii) and Section 7-148(7)(H)(xii) of the General Statutes of Connecticut, provided that the design and placement of said shelters has been submitted to and reviewed by the public safety and transportation committee of the city council and approved by the full council.

The request for such approval shall be submitted to the city clerk for referral to the city council by the director of public facilities, provided the plans for the placement and design of said shelters has been pre-filed with said director a minimum of thirty (30) days before the requested date for submission to

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the city council; and plans and designs for said shelters have been reviewed by an engineer assigned to the office of the city engineer, with a written recommendation or approval or disapproval provided by said engineer to said director. Following city council approval, the placement of the bus shelters shall not proceed without the issuance of an excavation permit by the public facilities department in accordance with Section 1-148(6)(C)(iii) and (iv) of the General Statutes of Connecticut and City Ordinance Chapter 12.12 Excavations.

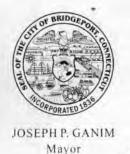
3. Nothing in Section 12.16.250, above, shall prohibit the use or placement of a Shared Mobility Device, as defined by City Ordinance Chapter 10.32.010, within and/or on the public right-of-way. Share Mobility Device users may ride Devices on city streets, off-street bicycle lanes, multi-use paths, and sidewalks; users must dismount upon encountering pedestrians. Devices, while they may be parked on the sidewalk, shall be parked in the following manner: (a) in a balanced, upright position; (b) to allow unimpeded pedestrian travel space on a sidewalk to a width of at least five feet; (c) to allow unimpeded access to entrances to public or private property; (d) to allow unimpeded access to all accessibility ramps and fire hydrants; (e) to allow unimpeded access to all bicycles and scooter parking areas, including any stationary fixture designed for the secure attachment of bicycles and scooters or any painted area designated for bicycle and scooter parking; (f) to allow adequate area for unimpeded vehicular travel and parking on public streets; and (g) in an area or location which the City may designate.

12.16.260 Emergency closure of streets.

The director of public facilities of the city of Bridgeport may close or restrict traffic over any section of any street, highway or bridge within the city for the purpose of construction, reconstruction or repair, or in case of public emergency, by posting notices at each end of such street, highway or bridge, and any person using such street, highway or bridge when such notices are so posted shall do so at his own risk.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE UPPER EAST SIDE NEIGHBORHOOD REVITALIZATION ZONE AND ITS BOUNDARIES

WHEREAS, pursuant to Connecticut General Statute, Chapter 118, Section 7-600 through Section 7-619, Neighborhood Revitalization Zones (the "Statute"), the State of Connecticut established that a municipality may, by an act of its legislature, establish a Neighborhood Revitalization Zone ("NRZ") to encourage redevelopment;

WHEREAS, the Statute establishes a model for the economic revitalization of neighborhoods where a significant number of properties are foreclosed, abandoned, blighted, substandard or pose a public safety hazard;

WHEREAS, the Statute contemplates that groups of residents, property owners, and business organizations in particularly distressed neighborhoods will develop strategic plans and work collaboratively with local, state, and federal governments to revive the area;

WHEREAS, the Statute allows the municipality to establish one or more Neighborhood Revitalization Zones and authorizes municipalities to rethink government procedures, rules, and regulations in order to build self-reliant communities;

WHEREAS, on May 6, 1996, the City Council adopted *Resolution 111-95* to establish one or more Neighborhood Revitalization Zones and expressed the City's support for their redevelopment through authorities granted to the City by State Statute;

WHEREAS, the Upper East Side neighborhood of Bridgeport is suffering from foreclosed, abandoned, vacant, and deteriorated properties;

WHEREAS, three community meetings and several stakeholder meetings were held in the Upper East Side beginning in the fall of 2014 and continuing through February of 2015 for the purposes of gathering data and community input to develop a vision for the area;

WHEREAS, as a result of these community meetings, the *Upper East Side Neighborhood Revitalization*Zone Community Vision (the "Community Vision"), attached hereto as Exhibit A, was finalized in May of 2015;

WHEREAS, the Community Vision document establishes the appropriate boundaries for the Upper East Side Neighborhood Revitalization Zone (the "Boundaries");

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City hereby establishes the Upper East Side Neighborhood Revitalization Zone with its Boundaries as per the attached Community Vision;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Planning and Economic Development will provide assistance to the Upper East Side Neighborhood Revitalization Zone in creating a Strategic Plan once a Planning Committee consisting of area residents, property owners, and businesses is organized by neighborhood leaders.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, numerous sidewalks in the City of Bridgeport {"City") are in varying states of disrepair; and

WHEREAS, the City can be held liable under certain circumstances for injuries which may occur due to disrepair of sidewalks; and

WHEREAS, the City has the right to force sidewalk repairs and recoup from the homeowner 100% of the costs of the repair; and

WHEREAS, the Administration desires to continue its efforts to make the City a safer place for its citizens and visitors to live and work; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to engage in an aggressive and proactive pilot program to have sidewalks repaired; and

WHEREAS, on May 1, 2017, the City Council passed a resolution which stated:

NOW, THEREFORE, in furtherance of public safety and the need for a City-wide program to repair these sidewalks in a progressive, fair, deliberate manner and in accordance with the available funding, it is hereby RESOLVED by the City Council, in support and approval of the pilot program, that the City proceed with sidewalk repair pilot program and to the extent the City causes participants' sidewalks to be repaired, to absorb fifty (50%) percent of the cost of the same, apply such Senior Citizen and Social Security Disability credits as may be applicable, and invoice the homeowner(s) the remaining balance. Should the invoice remain unpaid for thirty (30) days, and should the actual costs NOT exceed 110% of the estimates set forth to the Council in advance, the City Council will approve and accept the then filing of the appropriate lien(s) against the respective property (ies), providing, however, the City is not hereby authorized to pursue a foreclosure on a sidewalk repair lien, but rather should await payment from the affected owners, mortgagees, insurance companies, or through a sale of the subject parcel; and

WHEREAS, the approval of the Program was contingent on the Department of Public Facilities causing periodic lists of anticipated sidewalk repairs and estimated costs to be submitted to the Council for permission to lien those parcels in the event that the City causes said repairs to be made and should respective homeowner(s) fail to pay the remaining invoice within thirty {30} days of mailing of the invoice (the City may, prior to completing the repair, work out a payment arrangement with the homeowner as exigencies may require); and

WHEREAS, the City has compiled the third list which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the approved Sidewalk Repair Pilot Program, it is hereby

RESOLVED, BY THE CITY COUNCIL, that the City proceed with the repairs set forth in Exhibit A; and it is further

RESOLVED, that if any of the homeowners participating in the Program fail to pay their fifty (50%) percent within the allotted time and/or fail to work out and adhere to an approved payment schedule, the City Council hereby approves the filing of a lien on those respective parcels for the actual cost of repairs, but in no event more than 10% more than the estimates set forth in Exhibit A, but also NOT foreclose or sell such sidewalk repair liens as per the Program's initial approval.

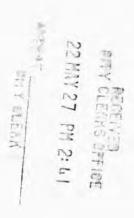

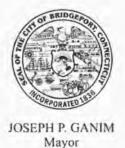
