Ms. Matthews-Connor came forward and said that she was speaking to the Council for the first time. She said that she wanted to know when her street would be repaired. She said that the streets were in poor condition and that there were more police needed on the street.

Council Member Taylor-Moye called Mr. Lee. There was no response. She called a second time. There was no response.

Council Member Halstead joined the meeting at 6:36 p.m.

Clyde Nicholson

Council Member Lyons joined the meeting at 6:37 p.m.

Mr. Nicholson came forward to speak about the high cost of living in Bridgeport and said that he was praying that Bass Pro Shop project would be completed soon.

Council Members Brannelly, Swain, McBride-Lee, and Feliciano joined the meeting at 6:38 p.m.

Mr. Nicholson then spoke about the fact he had been paying taxes for 40 years but his street was still not in good condition. He listed several things that were wrong with the City and asked why the Council was letting the Mayor get away with various actions. He announced to everyone that there was a group forming that would be addressing these concerns.

Joseph P. Ganim 80 Cartright Street Bridgeport, CT 06604 Thirty Five (35) Year Tax Abatement –

Crescent Crossing.

Mr. Joseph P. Ganim, a former Mayor of the City, came forward to speak about the Crescent Crossing development. He said that the proposed resolution was one of the most generous tax abatements not only the City but also the country. The Bridgeport residents are some of the highest taxpayers in the country with some of the poorest residents in the State.

Council Member Salter joined the meeting at 6:42 p.m.

Mr. Ganim said that granting the tax abatement would result in loss of tens of thousands of dollars in textbooks for the schools, police protections and various other services. Giving this away is wrong and the residents should remember that this is about taxes. The Council has a responsibility to think about the taxpayers. It's about serving the residents of Bridgeport and their taxes.

Tyisha Toms

138 Clifford Street, Disposition of City-Owned property.

96 Beachview Avenue Bridgeport, CT 06605

Ms. Tyisha Toms came forward to speak about the property at 138 Clifford Street. She said that she was an attorney and a realtor in the City. She said that in some instances, there were

abandoned properties that had such high taxes that they became disincentives for developers. She said that many people did not know what would happen with the re-evaluation. She said that she was involved with marketing of 140 Clifford Street and had a difficult time marketing the property because it was across the street from 138 Clifford, which was a blighted property. She also pointed out that 138 had been owned by a company and they quit claimed the property back to the City. The property then deteriorated even further and then Ms. Toms said she contacted Council Member Lydia Martinez about cleaning up the property. When someone loses their house, the City loses the taxes on it. Often squatters move into the houses that are in foreclosure, destroy the property and it has to be torn down.

Nick Villacis 2470 Fairfield Avenue Bridgeport, CT 06605 AmeriCorps Summer Youth Program MYO.

Nick Villacis came forward to speak about the Americorp Summer program. He said that he was a sophomore at a local college. He then spoke about the RYSAP program and how the program helps the teens learn job skills. He encouraged everyone to support the program for the youth in the City. He said that there were flyers and cards for those who wanted more information.

Council Member Taylor-Moye called Mr. Lee to come forward to address the Council Members.

John Marshall Lee 30 Beacon Street Bridgeport, CT 06605 City Fiscal Matters - Oversight.

Address to City Council August 3, 2015 (Public session 06:50 PM)

Council members, thank you for your patience in calling my name a second time to speak. I just arrived in the City from a couple days away. My comments are brief.

Like many people who talk with you, I care about the City of Bridgeport. It has been my home for 28 years, the longest period I have resided anywhere. Many folks say they love the City and I understand that when I consider the many types of values Bridgeport represents for me, physical location in the State and region and natural beauty; certainly financial with my home investment; and cultural in the diversity of the people who call Bridgeport home and whom I continue to meet.

You know that I have talked more than once about Open, Accountable and Transparent governance and continue that mission tonight. In general when I use the word Open I suggest that we open all of the City financial records including the very lengthy and confusing report you receive monthly. It does not let you focus on what you approved and what happens during the year. It does not tell you anything about grants to the City, unfortunately and does not tell how many are employed City side while the Board of Education fiscal report does so.

I ask you to open your meetings and make citizens welcome. You are doing public service for them. Your rules, that can be changed, keep most meetings limited to speakers from the Council. Recently when you opened the meetings on "booting of vehicles" new info not heard from any source previously was made available by a former vendor. Very helpful.

And while you are opening governance, perhaps you would keep the taxpayers involved and informed on the Capital budget annually. The Charter calls for it by using different language than that for the operating budget. Will you leave some trace of the details of what you are funding to the extent of over \$40 Million so that this background can be understood next year and beyond? Where is there solid info on where projects funded over the past five years stand today? Are they complete? Were any terminated? Where was surplus money directed? Where is this capital financial balance sheet reporting to the people and why not use electronic communications?

Essentially I am asking you to assure voters that the taxpayers are informed of all funds spent in a year. I believe that the operating budget is not aggressively reviewed during the year and the City presenters provide no "independent" insight or voice to decision making. The Capital budget once approved is not heard about again and no specific information is available to the public when they attend such a meeting. Unfortunately that is true of the minutes of many meetings where exhibits are logged in during a meeting but are not part of the electronic record. And why is there no attempt to provide info on Grants received by the City to provide necessary services?

Council Member Lydia Martinez joined the meeting at 6:55 p.m.

There is little transparency in City governance. You cannot see what you are getting easily. The people are asked to or expected to trust the elected while taxes increase and services are not clearly helping them, but how do we verify our trust when so many bits of City evidence are not posted conveniently? For instance, why are system indicators of department performance only updated once per year at budget time rather than monthly or quarterly on the City site? And where is the Net Taxable Grand List where people can see who are the 100% taxpayers in the City?

Where you have things of value, you protect them, you monitor them and you perform systematic and frequent reviews. You pay attention to all City business as you would expect a good watchdog to do. If the Council as elected representatives of the people is not performing this function, who will do this for us? Who are the public watchdogs? Time will tell.

This agreement is between the City of Bridgeport (hereinafter the "City"), and NAGE Local R1-200 (hereinafter the "Union")

The parties above hereby agree to the following:

- 1.) Upon full execution of this agreement, the job classification of Mini Computer Operator and its associated job description shall be eliminated and no longer used by the City. It shall be replaced with the classification 'Data Analyst' and the job description attached to this agreement as Exhibit 1.
- 2.) The wage scale and steps for Data Analyst shall be the same as those used for Mini Computer Operator on the date this agreement is signed.
- 3.) All employees currently holding the classification of Mini Computer Operator shall be reclassified as Data Analysts and will be grandfathered as to meeting the required qualifications and experience necessary to hold the Data Analyst classification. (See Exhibit 2) These employees will also maintain (continue) their seniority, and it (seniority) will not be negatively impacted by this title change.
- 4.) This agreement shall not constitute a practice or precedent under the collective bargaining agreement between the City and the Union. The Union will not cite or otherwise utilize this agreement or any of the substantive terms, in any grievance, arbitration (either grievance or binding interest) or any proceeding except for such proceeding to enforce the terms and conditions of this agreement.

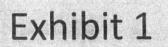

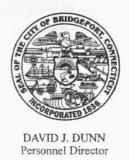

15.12.270 - Rooming houses and hotels—License requirements.

No person shall, subsequent to the effective date of the ordinance codified in this chapter, operate a room house, class I, rooming house, class II, or hotel, as defined in this chapter, within the city unless a rooming house, class I, rooming house, class II, or hotel license shall be issued to him as provided in this chapter. Applications for such licenses shall be made in writing to the housing code enforcement officer upon such forms as may be prescribed by him. Such application, whether original or for renewal of a license already issued, shall contain in addition to such other information as may be required by the housing code enforcement officer, the applicant's name, address, the address at which he proposes to operate a rooming house, class I, a rooming house, class II, or a hotel, the number of rooms, roomers and beds to be for hire Add to: or not for hire, the number of beds and roomers in each room, and the name of the individual or individuals who will be charged with the control, management and maintenance of said rooming house, class I, rooming house, class II, or hotel. Application for the renewal of a license already issued shall be made to the housing code enforcement officer not later than one month prior to the date of expiration of the existing license.

(Prior code § 16-37)

15.12.280 - Rooming houses and hotels—License applications—Display.

- Upon receipt of each application for the licensing of a rooming house, class I, rooming house, class II, or a hotel, either original or renewal, the housing code enforcement officer, chief of police, director of health, building officer and fire marshal of the fire department shall within seven days cause the premises to be inspected. He shall also transmit a copy of such application to the offices of planning and zoning. No license shall be issued until and unless the zoning enforcement officer has certified within seven days that the proposed use of the premises is a permitted use under the zoning regulations of the city. If the chief of police, zoning officer, director of health, building officer and fire marshal shall certify to the housing code enforcement officer that such premises comply with the terms thereof and other relevant ordinances, statutes and rules of the department of police, fire, health and zoning, the house code enforcement officer shall, upon the payment of fifty dollars (\$50.00) Replace with: seventy five dollars (\$75.00) per structure plus five dollars (\$5.00) Replace with: ten dollars (\$10) per room for rooming house, class I and rooming house, class II, and one hundred dollars (\$100.00) Replace with: one hundred and twenty five dollars (\$125.00) per structure plus five dollars (\$5.00) Replace with: ten dollars (\$10) per room for a hotel, issue a license to the applicant within fifteen (15) days after such certification. If either the chief of police, fire marshal, director of health, building officer and zoning officer certify to the housing code enforcement officer that the premises do not qualify for a license under this chapter, the application shall be denied. Each license shall expire one year from the date of its issuance unless sooner revoked in the manner herein provided.
- B. Display of License. Each rooming house, class I, rooming house, class II, and hotel operator shall be responsible for plainly displaying the license granted to him under this chapter in a prominent place within such premises.

15.12.320 - Rooming houses and hotels—General powers of the housing code enforcement officer.

In addition to the specific terms of this chapter, the housing code enforcement officer shall have the power to order the rectification of any condition or situation in any rooming house, class I, rooming house, class II, and hotel licensed under this chapter, which, in his opinion, is detrimental or dangerous to life and public safety. Add to: Housing code enforcement officer may set a schedule of fees, not to exceed twice the fees provided in Section 15.12.280, which are to be paid prior to the issuance or re-issuance of rooming house class II, or a hotel required by this section.

(Prior code § 16-42)

15.12.250 Rental Conditions-Certificate of Apartment Occupancy

- A. No owner or other person shall rent to another, or permit the occupation by another, of any vacant dwelling unit unless it and the premises are clean, sanitary and fit for human occupancy, and comply with all applicable legal requirements of the state of Connecticut and the city.
- B. Replace with: Any dwelling unit, apartment, condominium, duplex, single or multiple family house residence, other than owner of record living in residence, shall not be An apartment or dwelling unit in any structure containing three or more housing units shall not be occupied for human habitation, after a vacancy, until a certificate of occupancy has been issued by the authorized representative, certifying that such apartment or dwelling unit conforms to the requirements of Section 16-11 et seq. of the housing and commercial code of the city and Title 47a, Chapter 833a of the Connecticut General Statutes. No provision of this section shall apply to any structure occupied by the owner thereof and containing three or less housing units. No provision of this section shall be construed to prohibit human occupancy of such apartment or dwelling unit during the pendency of an application for such certificate.
- C. A certificate of occupancy shall be valid for a minimum of six months, and following this six-month period until the apartment or dwelling unit is vacated.
- D. Any person aggrieved by the refusal of a certificate of occupancy may appeal to the housing session at Bridgeport of the superior court for the judicial district of Fairfield. Such appeal shall be privileged.
- E. The owner or lessor of such structure shall not recover, receive or collect rent or use occupancy payments for the occupancy of any apartment or dwelling unit for which a certificate of occupancy has not been obtained prior to the rental thereof in violation of subsection B of this section.
- F. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any structure which has been constructed or substantially reconstructed within the ten-year period immediately before the date such certificate of occupancy would otherwise be required under this section. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any apartment house owned by a housing authority organized under the provisions of Title 8, Chapter 128 of the Connecticut General Statutes, which has been constructed or altered pursuant to a contract with the federal government or the state providing for annual contributions or other financial assistance. Notwithstanding the aforesaid, this section is not intended to include, nor shall it be construed to apply to: (1) buildings containing dwelling units as defined and created under Title 47, Chapter 825 of the Connecticut General Statutes, wherein seventy five (75) percent of such units are in individual ownership other than by the declarant; nor (2) dwelling units in a single ownership and owned and leased under the cooperative form of ownership.
- G. Housing code enforcement officer may set a reasonable schedule of fees which are to be paid prior to the issuance of the certificate of occupancy required by this section. Add to: Such fee shall not exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per dwelling unit.
- H. No person filing an application for a certificate of occupancy shall knowingly make any false statement as to the names, ages, relationship or number of persons who will occupy a dwelling unit. Any person who violates any of the aforesaid provisions shall be subject to the penalty provided for violations of the provisions of the housing and commercial code.
- I. The certificate of apartment occupancy for any apartment or dwelling unit shall be immediately revoked upon the failure of the owner to comply with an order of abatement issued pursuant to Section 15.12.080 or 15.12.150(H) or (I) of this chapter or to be otherwise in violation of the provisions of this chapter prohibiting the presence of lead-based paint. No apartment or dwelling unit shall be issued a certificate of apartment occupancy if it is in violation of Sections 15.12.080 or 15.12.150(H) or (I), or is otherwise in violation of the provisions of this chapter prohibiting the presence of lead-based paint. (Ordinance dated 4/1/91 (part); prior code § 16-35)
- J. Add to: The provisions of this section shall apply to all structures regardless of date of construction or reconstruction.

APPROVAL OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS -To Fund Certain Capital Improvement Project

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Bridgeport (the "City") has previously added the capital plan authorizations in the amount of \$13,000,000 for the capital projects more particularly listed on Exhibit A attached hereto (the "Library Capital Projects") to the City's Five Year Capital Plan for Fiscal Year 2016-2020 (the "2016-2020 Capital Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the Charter of the City requires that authorization to borrow against said 2016-2020 Capital Plan be approved by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined it to be in the best interest of the City to approve borrowing authorization for the Library Capital Projects in the amount of \$13,000,000 (the "Project") as more particularly listed on Exhibit A attached hereto; and now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That having received the recommendation of the Mayor of the City with respect to the action authorized herein, the City Council hereby approves the appropriation of the amounts necessary to: (i) additionally fund the Project in a principal amount not to exceed \$13,000,000 and the issuance of general obligation bonds secured by the City's full faith and credit (the "Bonds"), in a principal amount not to exceed \$13,000,000 (exclusive of Financing Costs, as hereinafter defined) for the purposes of funding the Project; and (ii) finance such

additional costs and expenses, in an amount not to exceed \$130,000 as the Mayor, the Finance Director, and the Treasurer (collectively, the "Officials") shall approve for the funding of necessary and appropriate financing and/or issuance costs including, but not limited to legal, advisory, credit enhancement, trustee, underwriters' discount, printing and administrative expenses, as well as the cost of the establishment and maintenance of any reserve pursuant to Chapter 109, Chapter 117 and other chapters of the Connecticut General Statutes (the "Financing Costs"); and be it further

RESOLVED, The Officials are further authorized on behalf of the City to make temporary borrowings as authorized by the Connecticut General Statutes and to issue temporary notes of the City in anticipation of the receipt of proceeds from the sale of the Bonds to be issued pursuant to this resolution and such notes shall be issued and renewed at such time and with such maturities, requirements and limitations as provided by statute; notes evidencing such borrowings shall be executed in the same manner as if they were bonds and the officials shall determine the date, maturity, interest rates, form and manner of sale, including negotiated sale, and other details of said notes consistent with the provisions of this resolution and the Connecticut General Statutes and shall have all powers and authority as in connection with the issuance of bonds; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the City Council authorizes and approves that the Bonds be secured by the City's property taxes, including interest, penalties and related charges, pursuant to Chapter 117 and other chapters of the Connecticut General Statutes, and, if deemed necessary or appropriate by the Officials and in the City's best interest, hereby authorizes the Officials: (i) to establish a property tax intercept procedure and a debt service payment fund pursuant to Chapter 117 of the Connecticut General Statutes, §7-560 et seq., and other Chapters of the Connecticut

General Statutes, on such terms as the Officials deem necessary or appropriate, and (ii) all further actions which the Officials deem necessary or appropriate to so secure the Bonds or which are contemplated by law; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Officials, if they determine it to be advisable, necessary or appropriate, hereby are authorized, on behalf of the City, to enter into an indenture of trust and/or a supplemental indenture of trust to the City's existing indenture (collectively, the "Indenture") with a bank or trust company located within or without the State of Connecticut (the "Trustee"), and to covenant: (i) if the Bonds are issued pursuant to such Indenture that all or a portion of the City's property taxes shall be paid to the Trustee and be held in trust for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds as provided in Chapter 117 and other Chapters of the Connecticut General Statutes, and (ii) the terms on which any payments or reserves securing the payment of the Bonds will be paid, and the terms of any reserve or other fund for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds; and, in any event, to amend or supplement the Indenture containing such terms and conditions as the Officials shall determine to be necessary or advisable and in the best interest of the City, the execution thereof to be conclusive evidence of such determination; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the City Council hereby authorizes the Officials, if the Officials determine it is in the City's best interest, to acquire, on behalf of the City, bond insurance or other forms of credit enhancement guaranteeing the Bonds on such terms as the Officials determine to be appropriate, such terms to include, but not be limited to, those relating to fees, premiums and other costs and expenses incurred in connection with such credit enhancement, the terms of payment of such expenses and costs and such other undertakings as the issuer of the credit enhancement shall require; and the Officials, if they determine that it is appropriate, are authorized, on the City's behalf, to grant security to the issuer of the credit enhancement to

secure the City's obligations arising under the credit enhancement, including the establishment of a reserve from proceeds of the Bonds; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the City Council hereby authorizes the Officials to determine the date, maturity, prices, interest rates whether fixed or floating, form, manner of sale (whether by negotiation or public sale) or other terms and conditions of the Bonds, including the terms of any reserve that might be established as authorized herein, whether any of the Bonds issued will be issued as taxable bonds and whether the Bonds will be issued in one or more series on the same or one or more separate dates, all in such a manner as the Officials shall determine to be in the best interest of the City, and to take such actions and to execute such documents, or to designate other officials or employees of the City to take such actions and to execute such documents, as deemed to be necessary or advisable and in the best interests of the City by the Officials in order to issue, sell and deliver the Bonds; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the City Council hereby authorizes the Officials in connection with the issuance of the Bonds to execute and deliver on behalf of the City such reimbursement agreements, remarketing agreements, standby bond purchase agreements, interest rate swap agreements, and other agreements for the purpose of managing the interest rate fluctuations and risks and any other appropriate agreements the Officials deem necessary, appropriate or desirable to the issuance of the Bonds and the Officials are hereby authorized on behalf of the City to secure the payment of such agreements with the full faith and credit of the City, if they deem it necessary, appropriate or desirable; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the principal and interest on the Bonds or any temporary notes issued for the Library Capital Projects shall be repaid to the City by the Board of the Bridgeport Public Library and Reading Room (the "Library Board") from funds in the Library Board's operating

budget and/or reserve accounts and any other funds available to the Library Board, including, but not limited to, taxes levied and collected for the benefit of the Library Board and moneys set aside in the Library Fund or both and that the City Council hereby authorizes the Officials to take such actions, and execute such repayment agreements, memoranda of understanding, instruments and documents with the Library Board, on behalf of the City, that they deem necessary, appropriate or desirable to consummate the intendment of this resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Bonds shall be signed by the Mayor, the Treasurer and the Finance Director provided that such signatures of any two of such officers of the City affixed to the Bonds may be by facsimiles of such signatures printed on the Bonds, and each of such Officers and any designee of any of them is authorized to take such actions, and execute such agreements, instruments and documents, on behalf of the City, that they deem necessary, appropriate or desirable to consummate the intendment of this and the foregoing resolutions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the City Council hereby authorizes the Officials in connection with the issuance of the Bonds to allocate any unused bond proceeds to other City projects authorized for bonding, consistent with the applicable tax and other laws, as deemed to be necessary or advisable and in the best interests of the City by the Officials; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Officials are hereby authorized to apply for and accept any available State or Federal grant in aid of the financing of the Project, and to take all action necessary or proper in connection therewith.

Amendment to Chapter 3.28.050

"Fixing and deferral of assessment on real property within the enterprise zone and the rehabilitation areas"

to

provide increased tax incentives for the redevelopment of vacant and blighted residential properties by Bridgeport-based developers of owner-occupied housing

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 585 of the Connecticut General Statutes, the City has enacted Chapter 3.28. of the Bridgeport Municipal Code, "Urban Enterprise Zone," to allow for the fixing and deferral of assessment on real property within the enterprise zone;

WHEREAS, Chapter 3.28.050(A)(4) establishes that the "municipality may provide any additional tax abatements or deferrals, as it deems necessary for any property located in such an enterprise zone";

WHEREAS, the City wishes to encourage in particular the rehabilitation of blighted residential structures and the redevelopment of vacant lots within the enterprise zone;

WHEREAS, the City wishes to provide more development opportunities for Bridgeport-based development companies and Bridgeport-based contractors;

WHEREAS, the City wishes to combat blight and to encourage home-ownership:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Bridgeport that Chapter 3.28.050 of the Bridgeport Municipal shall be amended to include a new subsection (A)(7) to read as follows:

7. In lieu of providing the benefit of the assessment fixing and deferral schedule described more particularly in Chapter 3.28.050(A), the City shall provide a distinct assessment fixing and deferral benefit with respect to properties being rehabilitated or redeveloped under this subsection as per the following criteria:

- 1) The property must be within the enterprise zone and must be vacant or deemed blighted per Chapter 8.76.020 of the Bridgeport Municipal Code;
- 2) <u>The developer/contractor must be Bridgeport-based and current on</u> its tax obligations to the City;
- 3) The developer/contractor must inhabit the improved property as owner-occupant or must sell the property to an owner-occupant;

- 4) All rehabilitation, redevelopment work must be done in a timely fashion, without interruption or delay, and pursuant to a building permit;
- 5) The property must be a one-family, two-family, or three-family structure;

Provided these qualifying criteria are met, and per specific administrative procedures to be developed and published by the City's Office of Planning and Economic Development, properties rehabilitated or redeveloped under this section shall benefit from the fixing and deferral of their assessment per the following schedule:

Year 1:	Assessment Fixed at Zero, Provided Construction Underway
Year 2:	Assessment Fixed at Zero, Provided Construction is Completed
Year 3:	Assessment Fixed at Zero, Provided Owner Occupancy
Year 4:	Assessment Fixed at Zero, Provided Owner Occupancy
Year 5:	Assessment at 25% of Value, Provided Owner Occupancy
Year 6:	Assessment at 50% of Value, Provided Owner Occupancy
Year 7:	Assessment at 75% of Value, Provided Owner Occupancy
Year 8:	Full Assessment

3.28.050 - Fixing and deferral of assessment on real property within the enterprise zone and the rehabilitation areas.

A. In accordance with provisions of Chapter 585 of the Connecticut General Statutes, the assessment on all real property in the urban enterprise zone which is improved during the period when such area is designated as an enterprise zone, shall be fixed each year in accordance with a seven-year assessment deferral schedule dating from the time of such improvements with increases in assessments attributable to such improvements deferred per the following schedule:

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The fixing of assessments shall be subject to the following conditions:

- Any fixed assessment on any residential property shall cease if: (1) for any residential property; any dwelling unit in such property is rented to any person whose income exceeds two hundred (200) percent of the median family income of the municipality; or (2) for any condominium conversion declared after the designation of the enterprise zone, any unit is sold to any person whose income exceeds two hundred (200) percent of the median family income of the municipality.
- 2. In the event of a general revaluation by any such municipality in the year in which such improvement is completed, resulting in any increase in the assessment on such property, only that portion of the increase resulting from such improvements shall be deferred. In the event of a general revaluation in any year after the year in which such improvement is completed, such deferred assessment shall be increased or decreased in proportion to the increase or decrease of the total assessment on such property as a result of such revaluations.
- 3. No improvements of any real property which qualifies as a manufacturing facility under Section 32-9p(d) of the General Statutes shall be eligible for any fixed assessment pursuant to this section.
- 4. The municipality may provide any additional tax abatements or deferrals, as it deems necessary for any property located in such an enterprise zone.

- In order to qualify for assessment deferral under this section, a project consisting of real property improvements, rehabilitation or new construction, must be undertaken pursuant to a building permit first issued for the project subsequent to date of passage of the ordinance codified in this chapter. Furthermore, in order to qualify for property tax deferral under this section, the property owner must file an application for enterprise zone assessment increase deferral on forms available from the city. This application must be filed with the city no later than the date of issuance of a certificate of occupancy for the renovated or newly constructed building. (The application must be submitted by the property owner to the city within ninety (90) days of the issuance of a building permit). The construction or rehabilitation will be determined to have been completed, and the real property assessment deferral therefore will commence, either the first full tax year following the issuance of certificate of occupancy for the newly constructed or renovated building, or at the option of the applicant upon the date of any partial assessment levied upon construction in process, prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy. In either case, however, the assessment deferral shall not be granted in more than seven assessment periods. (The building owner is responsible for obtaining a certificate of occupancy within a reasonable time period following completion of the project. Failure to obtain such certificate by October 1st following completion of the building will result in forfeiture of that year's deferral.)
- 6. Failure of a residential property owner to maintain the property in accordance with the standard of the housing code in the city shall constitute reason to cease deferral under this section. Owners of residential rental property or condominium conversions must submit to the city, an affidavit for each rental or condominium under the occupants (rental property) or owner's (condominium) full name and gross income in the previous tax year. In order to maintain eligibility, rental property owners must submit income affidavits annually before September 1st.

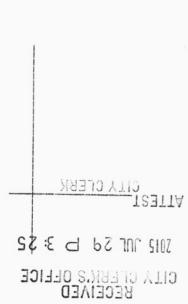

Whereas the Wakeman Board of Trustees voted at its meeting of March 18, 2015 to authorize Wakeman to move forward with Project due diligence, pursuant to the terms of this MOA; Now, therefore be it

Resolved that the Wakeman Boys and Girls Club and the City of Bridgeport do hereby agree that, contingent upon City Council approval and the further approval of the Board of Trustees of the Wakeman Memorial Association, they shall enter into a Development Agreement and a Long Term Lease that shall contain the following provisions:

- 1. The City and Wakeman shall work together to redevelop the site as a state-of the-art recreational and after school facility (the "Project") similar to Wakeman's Smilow-Burroughs Clubhouse, and geared to the needs of the school-age population in the City's North End and Hollow neighborhoods.
- 2. The Project shall provide for the redevelopment of the site through renovation, selective demolition, new construction, or a combination of these approaches as to be determined by architectural, structural, and financial analysis.
- 3. The newly redeveloped site shall contain, but not necessarily be limited to, such features as a gymnasium, a swimming pool, a game room, a kitchen, a dance studio, a teen room, a homework room, a computer center, a multi-purpose room, an art and science center, by way of illustration.
- 4. On terms to be more specifically delineated as the Project's final construction budget is formalized and agreed-upon, the City shall contribute approximately \$3.9 million in State Bond Funds and LOCIP funds ("State Funds") to the capital cost of the Project.
- 5. Pre-Development Due Diligence work related to environmental assessment, site planning, financial structuring, and architectural schematics shall be carried out administratively by Wakeman during the first six months following the execution of the MOA.

In conducting the Pre-Development Due Diligence, Wakeman shall be provided by the City with an appropriate Property Access Agreement and be allowed to make use of approximately \$250,000 of the City-administered State Funds per a specific City-approved budget and shall follow all relevant State and City procurement processes with respect to its administration of the Pre-Development work, with the understanding that all Pre-Development Diligence information and reports produced shall belong to the City.
- 7. Upon the conclusion of the Pre-Development Work, provided that the information gathered confirms the financial feasibility of the Project, Wakeman shall move forward with the redevelopment of the site, making use of the remaining State Funds as well as an additional \$4-8 million in private funding that it shall bring to the Project.
- 8. Upon the conclusion of the Pre-Development Due Diligence, Wakeman shall submit for the City's review and approval a finalized Redevelopment Program and Schedule, consistent with this MOA.
- 9. Upon review and approval, the City shall support Wakeman with all reasonable and appropriate regulatory approvals for financing and construction of the Project.
- 10. Provided the completion of Items 1-9, on terms to be more specifically negotiated, the City and Wakeman shall enter into a Development Agreement for the Project and a long term Lease for the continued operation and maintenance of the facility under which Wakeman shall pay a nominal \$1 annual rent to the City while taking on the responsibility for the ongoing operational and capital maintenance of the facility. The Lease shall expressly provide for its termination should Wakeman cease to operate the facility as a fully functional boys and girls club in accordance with the provisions as provided therein.

Whereas Sections 8-215 and Section 8-216 of Chapter 133 of the Connecticut General Statutes (the "Statute") provide that municipalities may by ordinance provide for real estate tax abatements for housing developed for low or moderate-income persons, and may enter into Agreements with the State of Connecticut, acting through its Department of Economic and Community Development, (the "State") to provide for the State's reimbursement, at the State's discretion, to the municipality of such taxes abated for this purpose; and

Whereas the Statute provides that such tax abatement shall be used for one or more of the following purposes: (1) To reduce rents below the levels which would be achieved in the absence of such abatement and to improve the quality and design of such housing; (2) to effect occupancy of such housing by persons and families of varying income levels within limits determined by the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development by regulation, or (3) to provide necessary related facilities or services in such housing; and

Whereas, consistent with the Statue, the City has established Chapter 3.24 of the Bridgeport Municipal Code, which establishes the City's "Affordable Housing Tax Incentive Development Program"; and

Whereas, Crescent Crossing Phase II, located at 252 Hallett Street (the "Property"), is the second phase in a multi-phased development for the Property, the first phase of which (for 93 units at a cost of approximately \$32 million) is fully financed (in part with a \$5mm CHAMP award from the State Department of Economic and Community Development, as well as with a \$2.9 mm Infrastructure Grant from the State Department of Housing) and is slated to begin construction in 2015; and

Whereas Crescent Crossings Phase II represents an approximately \$30 million dollar investment in the new construction of 84 units of affordable housing within a mixed-income development program that shall be for residents anticipated to be earning up to one hundred (120%) percent of the Area's Median Income (the "Project"); and

Whereas the Property, owned by Park City Communities (the "Owner") is to be devoted in part to replacement housing for Marina Village; and

Whereas, Crescent Crossings LLC (the "Developer"), an LLC directed by the JHM Financial Group of Stamford, CT has entered into a development agreement with the Owner so as to construct the Project and has also made application to the State of Connecticut for Project funding; and

Whereas, in support of the Project's financial structure, the Developer has requested an Affordable Housing Tax Incentive Development Agreement to establish a predictable and supportable tax payment schedule for the Project; and

Whereas the City of Bridgeport's Office of Planning and Economic Development ("OPED") finds that the public purposes of the Statute are met with respect to this Project and that the Project is consistent with the City's Master Plan and that it is in the City's interest to support the reinvestment in the Property; and

Whereas, the Developer has presented OPED with its financial models for the Project, including capital budget, sources and uses, and operating proforma; and

Whereas OPED finds that the financial model shows reasonable operating expenses, reasonable developer return and required reserves all as per industry standards, and further shows that the Project can support an annual tax payment equivalent to 7.7% of the Project's Stabilized Effective Gross Income which is anticipated to be \$850,227 ("EGI"); and

Whereas the annual tax payment derived from 7.7% of EGI is equal to \$65,520, or approximately \$780 per unit; and

Whereas, it is in the City's interest to encourage the development of high quality affordable, mixed-income housing; and

Whereas, the Developer has a solid track record in developing and managing such projects; Now, therefore be it

RESOLVED that apart from any public housing replacement units, six (6) of the most deeply affordable units in the Project (with three in Phase 1 and three in Phase 2) shall be reserved for veteran's housing; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of OPED or his designee is authorized to negotiate and execute an Affordable Housing Tax Incentive Development Agreement for which the base annual tax payment in the first year of stabilized operation shall amount to no less than \$65,520, or \$780 per unit per year, and which shall escalate at 3% per year for the duration of the deed-restricted financing period, anticipated to be up to 35 years, all as detailed in the attached Exhibit 1 – Tax Payment Schedule for Crescent Crossings II; and

A Notice by the Housing and Urban Development Department on 10/16/2014

Rebuild by Design (RBD) was a planning and design competition to increase resilience in the Sandy-affected region as part of recovery from the storm. The Department conducted the competition under the authority of § 105 of the America COMPETES Reauthorization Act of 2010 (15 U.S.C. 3719). Administered in partnership with philanthropic, academic, and nonprofit organizations, HUD solicited the best talents and ideas from around the world to seek innovative solutions for how communities rebuild and adapt in response to the damage from a disaster and future risks presented by natural hazards and climate change. More regarding the history of the competition can be found in the Federal Register at 78 FR 45551, published July 29, 2013, and 78 FR 52560, published August 23, 2013.

The competition resulted in the selection of ten interdisciplinary design teams as finalists to participate in an in-depth process. Ultimately, six proposals were announced as winning proposals in June 2014, representing an award of distinction for the respective design teams.

1. Rebuild by Design Allocations

Under this Notice, the Department is providing \$930 million in funds for use toward the implementation of proposals developed through the RBD competition. Unless otherwise provided for in the Prior Notices or in this Notice, the allocated RBD funds are subject to all applicable CDBG requirements. For example, RBD expenditures must be included in each grantee's overall benefit requirement. The specified uses and additional requirements on these allocations are outlined later in this Notice. Grantees are prohibited from spending the funds provided by this allocation for RBD on non-RBD purposes, including other disaster recovery activities.

As part of the RBD competition process, each design team worked closely with each respective grantee to ensure that design solutions within the proposals were consistent with the grantee's recovery goals and priorities.

State of Connecticut: Bridgeport

CDBG-DR funds are provided to assist in implementation of the finalist proposal titled "Resilient Bridgeport." Although the proposal for Bridgeport was not selected as a winning proposal, funds are being allocated to reduce flood risk for the most vulnerable public housing stock in the city and to leverage significant match funding from the State of Connecticut and other local funds. The Department recognizes that additional planning is required to re-assess and re-scope one or more elements of the proposal to identify a pilot project that can be implemented and that the forthcoming project may require greater deviation from the proposal as submitted relative to that of winning proposals. Funding allocated pursuant to this Notice is to be used for continued study, analysis, planning, and community engagement as well as for design, engineering, and construction of a pilot project, as yet undefined. For purposes of this allocation, this pilot project will be considered the RBD Project for this selected proposal. At a minimum, the pilot project must reduce flood risk to public housing in the City's South End/Black Rock Harbor area. In order to allow the time necessary for engagement of community stakeholders regarding selection of a pilot project, the pilot project does not need to be identified in the initial Action Plan Amendment submitted in response to this Notice; however, the grantee must describe the planning activity and certify that it will complete the pilot project in its initial Action Plan Amendment. Once the pilot project is identified, the State of Connecticut must then submit a substantial Action Plan Amendment that incorporates the pilot project in order for projectrelated funds to be obligated.

A Resolution by the Bridgeport City Council Regarding a State Grant for the P.T. Barnum Rail Station Conceptual Design (15%)

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport ("City") acquired the approximately 7.2 acre property currently or formerly known as Remgrit or Remington Arms at 812 Barnum Avenue, Bridgeport through a judgment of strict foreclosure because of non-payment of real property taxes; and

WHEREAS, the City, acting through its Office of Central Grants, on October 15, 2010 as part of a consortium of cities, counties and regional planning organizations in the New York Metropolitan Area was awarded a \$3.5 million Sustainable Initiative Communities Grant ("SCI") from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD); and

WHEREAS, the City received the SCI Grant to explore the feasibility of a new train station at the core of the East Bridgeport Development Corridor; and

WHEREAS, a central goal of the SCI is to link strategies, on a metropolitan scale, to develop mixed income housing, employment and infrastructure in locations connected by the region's commuter rail networks; and

WHEREAS, in 2000, the City signed a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") with the prior owners of the property, Sporting Goods Properties, Inc. (SGP1), whereby the owner has acknowledged its responsibility for certain environmental conditions as a result of its ownership of the property prior to 1986; and

WHERAS, the MOU contemplated mutually acceptable circumstances for the environmental investigation, remediation, assessment and redevelopment of the property; and

GENERAL GRANT CONDITIONS

Statutory Authority: Section 13b-57h of the Connecticut General Statutes, as revised

SECTION 1: Use of Grant Funds.

The Grantee agrees to expend the grant funds awarded pursuant to this agreement for allowable purposes only and to comply with all of the terms and conditions of the grant award and any related documents that set forth its obligations as Grantee. Grant funds shall not, without advance written approval by the Department of Transportation (DOT), be obligated prior to the starting date or subsequent to the end date of the grant period.

SECTION 2: Fiscal Control.

The Grantee shall maintain accounting records and establish policies and provide procedures to assure sound fiscal control, effective management, and efficient use of grant funds. The Grantee shall establish fiscal control and accounting procedures to assure proper disbursement of, and accounting for, grant funds. Accounting procedures must provide for the accurate and timely recording of receipt of funds by source, expenditures made from such funds, and unexpended balances. Controls must be adequate to insure that expenditures charged to grant activities are made for allowable purposes only.

SECTION 3: Retention of Records and Records Accessibility.

3.1 All services performed by Grantee shall be subject to the inspection and approval of DOT at all times, and Grantee shall furnish all information concerning the services.

DOT or its representatives shall have the right, at reasonable hours, to inspect or examine the part of the plant or place of business or any books, records, and other documents of Grantee or its subcontractors or subgrantees pertaining to work performed under this agreement and shall allow such representatives free access to any and all such plants, places of business, books and records. DOT or its representatives will give the Grantee or its subcontractors or subgrantees at least twenty-four (24) hours notice of such intended examination. At DOT's request, the Grantee or subcontractors or subgrantees shall provide DOT with hard copies or an electronic format of any data or information in the possession or control of the Grantee, subcontractor or subgrantee which pertains to DOT's business under this agreement.

- 3.2 The Grantee shall retain and maintain accurate records and documents relating to performance of services under this agreement for a minimum of three (3) years starting from the date of submission of the final expenditure report with the following qualifications and shall make them available for inspection and audit by DOT or its representative:
 - a. If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration date of the three-year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims or audit findings involving the records have been resolved; and
 - b. Records for the purchase of equipment (i.e., non-expendable, tangible personal property) acquired with grant funds shall be retained for three years after the final disposition of said property.
- 3.3 Any subcontractor or subgrantee under this agreement shall retain and maintain accurate records and documents relating to performance of services under this agreement for a minimum of three (3) years from the expiration of the subcontract or subgrant and shall make them available for inspection and audit by DOT or its representative.
- 3.4 The Grantee must incorporate this paragraph verbatim into any agreement it enters into with any subcontractor or subgrantee providing services under this agreement.

SECTION 4: Insurance.

The Grantee agrees that while performing any service specified in this grant, the Grantee shall maintain sufficient insurance (liability and/or other), according to the nature of the service to be performed, so as to "save harmless" DOT and the State of Connecticut from any insurable cause whatsoever. If requested, certificates of insurance shall be filed with DOT prior to the award of funding.

SECTION 5: Conflict of Interest.

No person who is an officer, employee, consultant or review board member of the Grantee shall participate in the selection, award or administration of a contract, subcontract, or subgrant or in the selection and supervision of an employee if a conflict of interest, real or apparent, would be involved. Such a conflict would arise when the officer, employee, consultant, review board member or any member of his/her immediate family, his/her partner, or an organization which employs, or is about to employ any of the above, has a financial interest in the entity or firm selected for the contract, subcontract, or subgrant or when the individual employee is related to any of the foregoing persons.

SECTION 6: Reports.

The Grantee shall submit such reports as DOT shall reasonably request and shall comply with all provisions regarding the submission of such reports. Reports shall include, but not be limited to, revised project narratives, revised budgets and budget narratives, progress reports, financial reports, cash requests, grantee affirmative action packets, and subgrantee packets and budgets. Cash requests may be withheld by DOT until complete and timely reports are received and approved.

SECTION 7: Funding Limitation.

Funding of this project in no way obligates DOT to fund the project in excess of this grant, beyond the period of this grant, or in future years.

SECTION 8: Revised Budget.

If the grant amount and/or the distribution of funds between categories of funds, as identified on the Notice of Grant Award, is different from the amount and/or the distribution in the grant application budget, the Grantee agrees to submit to DOT a revised budget and budget narrative equal to and in the same distribution as the grant award not later than thirty (30) days after signing of the grant. Cash requests will be withheld until the revision is received and approved.

SECTION 9: Audits.

- 9.1 In accordance with the following conditions, the Grantee agrees to conduct and submit to DOT two completed audit packages with management letters and corrective action plans for audits of each of the fiscal years included in the period of this grant and any amendments thereto.
- 9.2 If the Grantee meets the requirements of the State Single Audit Act, Sections 4-230 through 4-236, as amended, of the Connecticut General Statutes, the Grantee is required to submit a State Single Audit Report to DOT. Connecticut General Statutes § 4-231 requires those non-state entities which expended a total amount of State Financial Assistance equal to or in excess of \$300,000 in any fiscal year to have either a single audit or a program-specific audit conducted for such fiscal year. A program-specific audit may be conducted if the Grantee received State Financial Assistance from DOT for this grant and it is the only State Financial Assistance that the Grantee has received during this fiscal period. The State Single Audit Report should be filed with DOT no later than six months after the end of the audit period.
- 9.3 If the Grantee receives any federal funds in this grant, as identified on the Notice of Grant Award, and meets the requirements of OMB Circular A-133, Audits of State and Local Governments and Non Profit Organizations, the Grantee is required to submit an audit conducted in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and/or Generally Accepted Governmental Auditing Standards (GAGAS) issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, as well as OMB Circular A-133. This circular requires those state and local governments and non-profit organizations which expended a total amount of federal financial assistance equal to or in excess of \$500,000 in any fiscal year to have a federal single audit or a program-specific audit conducted for such fiscal year. A program-specific audit may be conducted if the Grantee receives Financial Assistance under only one federal program. For audit purposes, State or grantee match funds, as identified on the Notice of Grant Award, are subject to the same requirements as the federal monies. OMB Circular A-133 requires that the audit report be submitted by the earlier of thirty (30) days after the date of receipt of the auditor's report(s), or nine (9) months after the end of the audit period.

SECTION 10: Unexpended Funds and/or Disallowed Costs.

If project costs are less than the grant, and/or any project costs have been disallowed, the Grantee agrees to return the unexpended/disallowed funds to DOT no later than sixty (60) days following closeout of the grant.

SECTION 11: Nondiscrimination and Affirmative Action.

11.1 The Grantee agrees and warrants that in the performance of the Grant Award such Grantee will not discriminate nor permit discrimination against any person or group of persons on the grounds of race, color, religious creed, age, marital status, national origin, ancestry, sex, gender identity or expression, mental retardation, mental disability or physical disability, including, but not limited to, blindness, unless it is shown by such Grantee that such disability prevents performance of the work involved, in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or the State of Connecticut.

11.2 The Grantee agrees to take affirmative action to insure that applicants with job-related qualifications are employed and that employees are treated when employed without regard to their race, color, religious creed, age, marital status, national origin, ancestry, sex, gender identity or expression, mental retardation, mental disability or physical disability, including, but not limited to, blindness, unless it

is shown by such Grantee that such disability prevents performance of the work involved.

11.3 The Grantee agrees, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Grantee, to state that it is an "affirmative action-equal opportunity employer" in accordance

with regulations adopted by the State Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities.

11.4 The Grantee agrees and warrants that in the performance of the grant such Grantee will not discriminate or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons on the grounds of sexual orientation, in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or of the State of Connecticut, and that employees are treated when employed without regard to their sexual orientation.

11.5 The Grantee agrees to provide each labor union or representative of workers with which such Grantee has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding and each vendor with which such Grantee has a contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities advising the labor union or workers' representative of the Grantee's commitments under this section, and to post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

11.6 The Grantee agrees to comply with each provision of this section and Connecticut General Statutes §§ 46a-68e and 46a-68f and with each regulation or relevant order issued by the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes §§ 46a-56, 46a-68e and 46a-

11.7 The Grantee agrees to provide the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities with such information requested by the Commission, and permit access to pertinent books, records and accounts, concerning the employment practices and procedures of the Grantee which relate to the provisions of this section and Connecticut General Statutes § 46a-56.

11.8 If the grant is a public works contract, the Grantee agrees and warrants that the Grantee will make good faith efforts to employ minority business enterprises as subcontractors and suppliers of

materials on such public works project.

11.9 Determination of the Grantee's good faith efforts shall include but shall not be limited to the following factors: The Grantee's employment and subcontracting policies, patterns and practices; affirmative advertising, recruitment and training; technical assistance activities and such other reasonable activities or efforts as the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities may prescribe that are designed to ensure the participation of minority business enterprises in public works projects. The Grantee shall develop and maintain adequate documentation, in a manner prescribed by the Commission, of its good faith efforts. For the purposes of this paragraph, "minority business enterprise" means any small contractor or supplier of materials fifty-one per cent or more of the capital stock, if any, or assets of which is owned by a person or persons who are active in the daily affairs of the enterprise, who have the power to direct the management and policies of the enterprise and who are members of a minority, as such term is defined in subsection (a) of Connecticut General Statutes § 32-9n; "good faith" means that degree of diligence which a reasonable person would exercise in the performance of legal duties and obligations; "good faith efforts" includes, but is not limited to, those reasonable initial efforts necessary to comply with statutory or regulatory requirements and additional or substituted efforts when it is determined that such initial efforts will not be sufficient to comply with such requirements; and "public works contract" means any agreement between any individual, firm or corporation and the State or any political subdivision of the State other than a municipality for construction, rehabilitation, conversion, extension, demolition or repair of a public building, highway or other changes or improvements in real

property, or which is financed in whole or in part by the State, including, but not limited to, matching

expenditures, grants, loans, insurance or guarantees.

11.10 The Grantee shall include the provisions of subsections 11.1 to 11.8, inclusive, in every subcontract or purchase order entered into in order to fulfill any obligation of a grant with the State and such provisions shall be binding on a subcontractor, vendor or manufacturer unless exempted by regulations or orders of the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities. The Grantee shall take such action with respect to any such subcontract or purchase order as the Commission may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance in accordance with Connecticut General Statutes § 46a-56; provided, if such Grantee becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the Commission, the Grantee may request the State of Connecticut to enter into any such litigation or negotiation prior thereto to protect the interests of the State and the State may so enter.

11.11 For the purposes of this entire Non-Discrimination section, "Grant Award" includes any extension or modification of the Grant Award, "Grantee" includes any successors or assigns of the Grantee, "marital status" means being single, married as recognized by the state of Connecticut, widowed, separated or divorced, "mental disability" means one or more mental disorders, as defined in the most recent edition of the American Psychiatric Association's "Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders", or a record of or regarding a person as having one or more such disorders, and "gender identity or expression" means a person's gender-related identity, appearance or behavior, whether or not that gender-related identity, appearance or behavior is different from that traditionally associated with the person's physiology or assigned sex at birth, which gender-related identity can be shown by providing evidence including, but not limited to, medical history, care or treatment of the gender-related identity, consistent and uniform assertion of the gender-related identity or any other evidence that the gender-related identity is sincerely held, part of a person's core identity or not being asserted for an improper purpose. For the purposes of this section, "Grant" does not include a grant where each grantee is (1) a political subdivision of the state, including, but not limited to, a municipality, (2) a quasi-public agency, as defined in Conn. Gen. Stat. Section 1-120, (3) any other state, including but not limited to any federally recognized Indian tribal governments, as defined in Conn. Gen. Stat. Section 1-267, (4) the federal government, (5) a foreign government, or (6) an agency of a subdivision, agency, state or government described in the immediately preceding enumerated items (1), (2), (3), (4) or (5).

SECTION 12: Executive Orders.

12.1 This agreement is subject to the provisions of Executive Order No. Three of Governor Thomas J. Meskill regarding nondiscrimination promulgated June 16, 1971, and such Executive Order is incorporated herein by reference and made a part thereof. The parties agree to abide by said Executive Order and agree that the State Labor Commissioner shall have continuing jurisdiction in respect to contract performance in regard to nondiscrimination until the agreement is completed or terminated prior to completion. This agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended by the State Labor Commissioner for violation of or noncompliance with said Executive Order or any state or federal law concerning nondiscrimination, notwithstanding that the Labor Commissioner is not a party to this agreement.

12.2 This agreement is subject to the provisions of Executive Order No. Seventeen of Governor Thomas J. Meskill promulgated February 15, 1973, requiring contractors and subcontractors to list employment openings with the Connecticut State Employment Service and such Executive Order is incorporated herein by reference and made a part thereof. The parties agree to abide by said Executive Order and agree that the granting agency and the State Labor Commissioner shall have joint and several continuing jurisdiction in respect to performance in regard to listing all employment openings with the Connecticut State Employment Service. This agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended by the granting agency or the State Labor Commissioner for violation of or noncompliance with said Executive Order No. Seventeen, notwithstanding that the Labor Commissioner is not a party to this agreement.

12.3 This agreement is subject to the provisions of Executive Order No. Sixteen of Governor John G. Rowland promulgated August 4, 1999, regarding Violence in the Workforce Prevention and, such Executive Order is incorporated herein by reference and made a part thereof. This agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended by the State for violation of or noncompliance with said Executive Order No. Sixteen.

SECTION 13: Americans with Disabilities Act.

This section applies to those grantees, which are or will become responsible for compliance with the terms of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 during the grant award period. The Grantee represents that it is familiar with the terms of this Act and that it is in compliance with the law. Failure of the Grantee to satisfy this standard either now or during the period of the grant, as it may be amended, will render the grant voidable at the option of DOT upon notice to the Grantee. The Grantee warrants that it will hold DOT and the State harmless from any liability, which may be imposed upon DOT and the State as a result of any failure of the Grantee to be in compliance with this Act.

SECTION 14: Independent Contractor.

The Grantee shall act as an independent contractor in performing this agreement, maintaining complete control over its employees and all of its subcontractors. Before hiring outside consultants or entering into contractual agreements with persons, partnerships or companies, the Grantee will notify DOT of the contractor's identity.

SECTION 15: Federal Compliance and Assurances.

If the Grantee receives any federal funds in this grant, as identified on the Notice of Grant Award, the Grantee and all its subgrantees will comply with the nondiscrimination requirement of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended; and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, to the effect that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under, or denied employment in connection with any program or activity funded in whole or in part with funds made available in this grant.

SECTION 16: Non-Supplanting.

16.1 If the Grantee receives any federal funds in this grant as identified on the Notice of Grant Award, the Grantee agrees that these grant funds will be used to supplement and increase, but not supplant, the level of state, local, private and federal funds that would, otherwise, be made available for this project and to serve this target population and will in no event replace such state, local, private and federal funds.

16.2 The Grantee shall not use state funds conveyed by the grant to supplant any local funds, if a municipality, or other state funds, if a state agency, which were budgeted for purposes analogous to that of the state grant funds. DOT may waive this provision upon request and for good cause shown, when it is satisfied that the reduction in local funds or other state funds, as the case may be, is due to circumstances not related to the grant.

SECTION 17: Additional Federal Conditions.

If the Grantee receives any federal funds in this grant as identified on the Notice of Grant Award, the Grantee agrees to comply with the attached Additional Federal Conditions which have been issued by the federal grantor agency to DOT and which are, hereby, made a part of this grant award.

SECTION 18: Indemnification.

The Grantee, hereby, agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless the State of Connecticut, including, but not limited to, DOT, their respective officers, employees and agents for any breach of this agreement.

SECTION 19: Large State Contracts.

Pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes §§ 4-250 and 4-252, Contractor must present at the execution of each large state contract (having a total cost to the State of more than \$500,000 in a calendar or fiscal year) an executed gift affidavit, which Contractor shall update on an annual basis in accordance with paragraph 8 of Governor M. Jodi Rell's Executive Order No. 1. In addition, pursuant to paragraph 8 of Governor M. Jodi Rell's Executive Order No. 1, anyone who executes and files said gift affidavit shall also execute and file a campaign contribution affidavit disclosing all contributions made to campaigns of candidates for statewide public office or the General Assembly.

SECTION 20: State Contracting Standards Board.

Pursuant to paragraph 6(a) of Governor M. Jodi Rell's Executive Order No. 7C, Grantee acknowledges and accepts that, for cause, the State Contracting Standards Board may review and recommend, for DOT's consideration and final DOT determination, termination of this grant contract. "For Cause" means: (1) a violation of the State ethics laws (Chapter 10 of the Connecticut General Statutes) or Connecticut General Statutes § 4a-100 or (2) wanton or reckless disregard of any State contracting and procurement process by any person substantially involved in such contract or state contracting agency.

SECTION 21: Campaign Contribution and Solicitation Prohibitions.

For all State contracts as defined in Section 9-612 of the Connecticut General Statutes having a value in a calendar year of \$50,000 or more or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of \$100,000 or more, the authorized signatory to this agreement expressly acknowledges receipt of the State Elections Enforcement Commission's notice advising state contractors of state campaign contribution and solicitation prohibitions, and will inform its principals of the contents of the notice. See Attachment A.

SECTION 22: Non-Discrimination Certification.

Pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes §§ 4a-60(a)(1) and 4a-60a(a)(1), every Grantee is required to provide the State with a non-discrimination certificate for all State contracts regardless of type, term, cost or value. The appropriate form must be submitted to the awarding State agency prior to contract execution. Copies of "nondiscrimination certification" forms that will satisfy the statutory requirements may be found on DOT's website. The applicable certification form must be signed by an authorized signatory of the Grantee.

SECTION 23: Additional Restrictions on Use of Federal Funds.

Pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 1913 and 31 U.S.C. § 1352, Grantee understands and agrees that it cannot use any federal funds, either directly or indirectly, in support of the enactment, repeal, modification or adoption of any law, regulation or policy, at any level of government without the express prior written approval of federal government.

SECTION 24: Special Grant Conditions.

The Grantee agrees to comply with the attached Special Grant Conditions, which have been issued in connection with this specific grant award, and which are hereby made a part of this award.

ATTACHMENT A

NOTICE TO EXECUTIVE BRANCH STATE CONTRACTORS AND PROSPECTIVE STATE CONTRACTORS OF CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION AND SOLICITATION BAN

This notice is provided under the authority of Connecticut General Statutes Section 9-612(g)(2), as amended by P.A. 10-1, and is for the purpose of informing state contractors and prospective state contractors of the following law (italicized words are defined below):

Campaign Contribution and Solicitation Limitations

No state contractor, prospective state contractor, principal of a state contractor or principal of a prospective state contractor, with regard to a state contract or state contract solicitation with or from a state agency in the executive branch or a quasi-public agency or a holder, or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, State Comptroller, Secretary of the State or State Treasurer, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee (which includes town committees).

In addition, no holder or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of State senator or State representative, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee.

On and after January 1, 2011, no state contractor, prospective state contractor, principal of a state contractor or principal of a prospective state contractor, with regard to a state contract or state contract solicitation with or from a state agency in the executive branch or a quasi-public agency or a holder, or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall knowingly solicit contributions from the state contractor's or prospective state contractor's employees or from a subcontractor or principals of the subcontractor on behalf of (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, State Comptroller, Secretary of the State or State Treasurer, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee.

Duty to Inform

State contractors and prospective state contractors are required to inform their principals of the above prohibitions, as applicable, and the possible penalties and other consequences of any violation thereof.

Penalties for Violations

Contributions or solicitations of contributions made in violation of the above prohibitions may result in the following civil and criminal penalties:

<u>Civil penalties</u>—Up to \$2,000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contribution, whichever is greater, against a principal or a contractor. Any state contractor or prospective state contractor which fails to make reasonable efforts to comply with the provisions requiring notice to its principals of these prohibitions and the possible consequences of their violations may also be subject to civil penalties of up to \$2,000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contributions made by their principals.

<u>Criminal penalties</u>—Any knowing and willful violation of the prohibition is a Class D felony, which may subject the violator to imprisonment of not more than 5 years, or not more than \$5,000 in fines, or both.

Contract Consequences

In the case of a state contractor, contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions may result in the contract being voided.

In the case of a prospective state contractor, contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions shall result in the contract described in the state contract solicitation not being awarded to the prospective state contractor, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.

The State shall not award any other state contract to anyone found in violation of the above prohibitions for a period of one year after the election for which such contribution is made or solicited, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.

Definitions:

"State contractor" means a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that enters into a state contract. Such person, business entity or nonprofit organization shall be deemed to be a state contractor until December thirty-first of the year in which such contract terminates. "State contractor" does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person's capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee.

"Prospective state contractor" means a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that (i) submits a response to a state contract solicitation by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, or a proposal in response to a request for proposals by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, until the contract has been entered into, or (ii) holds a valid prequalification certificate issued by the Commissioner of Administrative Services under section 4a-100. "Prospective state contractor" does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person's capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee.

"Principal of a state contractor or prospective state contractor" means (i) any individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more in, a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of a nonprofit organization, (ii) an individual who is employed by a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, as president, treasurer or executive vice president, (iii) an individual who is the chief executive officer of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is not a business entity, or if a state contractor or prospective state contractor has no such officer, then the officer who duly possesses comparable powers and duties, (iv) an officer or an employee of any state contractor or prospective state contractor who has managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract, (v) the spouse or a dependent child who is eighteen years of age or older of an individual described in this subparagraph, or (vi) a political committee established or controlled by an individual described in this subparagraph or the business entity or nonprofit organization that is the state contractor or prospective state contractor.

"State contract" means an agreement or contract with the state or any state agency or any quasi-public agency, let through a procurement process or otherwise, having a value of fifty thousand dollars or more, or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of one hundred thousand dollars or more in a calendar year, for (i) the rendition of services, (ii) the furnishing of any goods, material, supplies, equipment or any items of any kind, (iii) the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work, (iv) the acquisition, sale or lease of any land or building, (v) a licensing arrangement, or (vi) a grant, loan or loan guarantee. "State contract" does not include any agreement or contract with the state, any state agency or any quasi-public agency that is exclusively federally funded, an education loan, a loan to an individual for other than commercial purposes or any agreement or contract between the state or

any state agency and the United States Department of Navy or the United States Department of Defense.

"State contract solicitation" means a request by a state agency or quasi-public agency, in whatever form issued, including, but not limited to, an invitation to bid, request for proposals, request for information or request for quotes, inviting bids, quotes or other types of submittals, through a competitive procurement process or another process authorized by law waiving competitive procurement.

"Managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract" means having direct, extensive and substantive responsibilities with respect to the negotiation of the state contract and not peripheral, clerical or ministerial responsibilities.

"Dependent child" means a child residing in an individual's household who may legally be claimed as a dependent on the federal income tax of such individual.

"Solicit" means (A) requesting that a contribution be made, (B) participating in any fund-raising activities for a candidate committee, exploratory committee, political committee or party committee, including, but not limited to, forwarding tickets to potential contributors, receiving contributions for transmission to any such committee or bundling contributions, (C) serving as chairperson, treasurer or deputy treasurer of any such committee, or (D) establishing a political committee for the sole purpose of soliciting or receiving contributions for any committee. Solicit does not include: (i) making a contribution that is otherwise permitted by Chapter 155 of the Connecticut General Statutes; (ii) informing any person of a position taken by a candidate for public office or a public official, (iii) notifying the person of any activities of, or contact information for, any candidate for public office; or (iv) serving as a member in any party committee or as an officer of such committee that is not otherwise prohibited in this section.

"Subcontractor" means any person, business entity or nonprofit organization that contracts to perform part or all of the obligations of a state contractor's state contract. Such person, business entity or nonprofit organization shall be deemed to be a subcontractor until December thirty first of the year in which the subcontract terminates. "Subcontractor" does not include (i) a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or (ii) an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person's capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee.

"Principal of a subcontractor" means (i) any individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more in, a subcontractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of a nonprofit organization, (ii) an individual who is employed by a subcontractor, which is a business entity, as president, treasurer or executive vice president, (iii) an individual who is the chief executive officer of a subcontractor, which is not a business entity, or if a subcontractor has no such officer, then the officer who duly possesses comparable powers and duties, (iv) an officer or an employee of any subcontractor who has managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a subcontract with a state contractor, (v) the spouse or a dependent child who is eighteen years of age or older of an individual described in this subparagraph, or (vi) a political committee established or controlled by an individual described in this subparagraph or the business entity or nonprofit organization that is the subcontractor.

Special Grant Conditions

- 1. Grantee must issue annual reports which should include the following information:
 - a. progress to date documentation:
 - b. percent (%) of tasks complete and funds expended to date;
 - electronic copies of any draft or final deliverables as outlined in the scope of work;
 - d. and a sign off by the grantee's financial officer certifying the expenses.
- Grantee must issue end of project report detailing what was accomplished with the funds granted, and include final set of all deliverables in electronic format if applicable.
- No funds shall be expended after the end date of the grant. Any funds expended after the end date shall be considered ineligible, and must be returned to the State.
- 4. The end date of the Award can be extended if requested in writing two months before the stated end date in the Notice of Grant Award.
