also said that he could not understand how the Council Members could go to church while continuing to judge people by the color of their skin.

Mr. Bob Keeley came forward to address the Council. He thanked the Council for the opportunity to come to speak with the Council. He said that he hoped the Council Members health numbers did not increase their health screening numbers after he was finished speaking.

Mr. Keeley said that he was present to speak about the public and private partnerships where the City and a private sector organization match funds. He said that he would like to see Bridgeport receive the benefit of this type of arrangement.

He then spoke about the various NRZs and said that those in the East Side and East End should unite to get not only the Congress Street Bridge replaced, but also the Pleasure Beach Bridge. By uniting together, the NRZs could make East Bridgeport great by having a forum and working together.

Mr. Lee came forward and read the following statement into the record:

Good evening members of the Bridgeport City Council. This is the second meeting of the year and the fourth of the session that began in December. One year ago information was leaking out of City Hall about the dire financial situation in the City. As the incoming Council with a "second chance" Mayor newly installed it may have been a confusing time. It should have been a time to prioritize our problems and summon all of our resources.

Six months later, you faced angry taxpayers and voters because of the budget you passed simultaneous with a revaluation that lowered owner values in most of the City. Anger over increase in taxes? Frustration over property values dropping below mortgage balances? Many folks plainly disturbed that the school budget request for \$15 Million was not dealt with. The new administration scoured City cupboards for funds of all kinds. Perhaps that is why your Budget & Appropriations Committee was able to view two different reports last week.....one regarding grants that fund certain City activities and may still have power even though they may be 10 years old, and another that identifies capital projects by department and provides multi year accounting never seen routinely by the Council.

Governance is a shared responsibility. The Council cannot be accountable when they do not receive information. But they are responsible when they do not request, multiple times if necessary, vital information regarding City finances in order to be skilled watchdogs. I have observed that you of

City of Bridgeport City Council Regular Meeting January 17, 2017 necessity are fiscal watchdogs because as the State's largest City we are without a bi-partisan Board of Finance, who based on education, experience, and integrity, can be a competent and sensible first line of check and balance with any administration.

Our time is limited so take the Police Department as an example. You approved a budget for \$102 Million and before we were many months into the fall that budget increased more than 5 %. Did it tell you where the PD would be if 100 new recruits were hired (something impossible within the Fiscal Year)? Or did it say something else that perhaps you know but that the public does not?

We have an Acting Police Chief, a former Police Chief as a consultant, and former Chief Gaudett at EOS. Personally I don't know whether he was acting or a complete chief. However, what I continue to see is a PD budget that is nearing \$110 Million with total overtime, internal and external. seemingly out of control. But there is a struggle to look good in the press. One of the ten divisions of the Police Department budget called Police Administration, has no full time employees!! So where are Police Administrators hiding? Or at least where can they be identified? And what is the current number of personnel in each section today, and next month, and three months from now? Where are those numbers? And where is the listing of City employees showing the top 150 earners for 2016? And what would a list of the most recent 150 retirees from the Police Department reveal in terms of the last contract signed by the City with the Police Union? Did we ever hear that the movement of City pensions to the CT MERS plan would allow retirement income to be paid on overtime earning in as few as three years of the 25 for normal retirement? Did we learn that the City is prohibited any increase in charges to outside contractors currently to cover the new and added required pension contributions...so that the taxpayers must foot all of the increased pension payments?

Are there other surprises in the changes for the 2012-16 period that we have not learned yet? What is the City position on new contract negotiations at this time? Is it a Mayoral priority? Where are such issues discussed in your committee system?

Do you require more info? Ask for it, please. Folks in my neighborhood, some who are expert in finance, personnel management, and system change last August volunteered their time as a practical short term task force to help the Mayor with such matters. The Mayor and his advisors discussed but ultimately ignored this valuable offer without response to those taxpayers and voters. The Mayor's veto did not get a single line in the newspaper but it was yet another sign that the City is not serious about dealing with the difficulties of the status quo. Is it time to bring back the red boots? I will wait for the CAFR that should be out in days. Then we can all study what happened last year through the eyes of the auditors. Time will tell.

### State Sen. Marilyn Moore

Senator Moore came forward to address the Council Member and said that she had spoken with Mr. Young earlier. She said that she had watched a series on Dr. Martin Luther King and felt that it was wrong that the Mayor was disrespecting the very people who elected him. Senator Moore also questioned whether the Mayor was really going to the Inauguration to speak with President Elect Trump as he had flaunted this on the TV. She said that she would not forget this if Mayor Ganim goes to the Inauguration and encouraged the Council Members to speak to Mayor Ganim about this.

Clyde Nicholson

Mr. Nicholson said that there was an on-going situation in Bridgeport with two murders and a third person shot in the back. Mr. Nicholson said that he hoped the shooting victim would pull through. He then mentioned the JFK assassination, the RFK assassination, and the MLK assassination and asked how much gun violence was enough. There is no time to play games.

President-elect Trump is talking about sending the Muslims back to their home countries, but if that is the way that immigrants will be treated, we should all go back to the countries that we came from. If President-elect Trump took an intelligence test, he would be graded as a fool. Trump will not bring jobs to Bridgeport. He disrespected John Lewis.



The purpose of this amendment is to strongly encourage contractors to ensure that their projects are safe and up to code by the first or second inspection by the Building Department, and to discourage further re-inspections that cost the city money and cause backlogs within the Building Department.

We fully believe that this amendment, which was the result of conversations with contractors working in our city, is fair and consistent with our efforts to improve our Building Department's operations so as to foster economic development throughout the City of Bridgeport.

We look forward to the City Council's ideas and questions on this matter. We respectfully ask that this amendment be referred to the Ordinance Committee for its consideration.

### **Building Permit Re-inspection Fee**

Whereas the Building Department of the City of Bridgeport is responsible for conducting inspections to ensure that structures in the city are safe and meet federal, state, and local building codes;

Whereas projects that need to be inspected often fail on the first or second inspections, and sometimes fail several inspections thereafter;

Whereas the City of Bridgeport has had to dedicate a great amount of resources in order to conduct re-inspections because contractors or homeowners fail to appear for the inspection or because the work was not completed up to code;

And, whereas re-inspections have contributed to backlogs in the Building Department that further delay important improvements and economic development projects throughout the City of Bridgeport;

### Now Therefore:

**Be it hereby ordained** that Section 15.08.010 (*Building permit and related fees*) of the Bridgeport Municipal Code of Ordinances be amended such that a fee of \$150.00 shall be applied to each re-inspection after the second failed inspection conducted by the Building Department.

### 15.08.010 - Building permit and related fees.

- A. Generally, Chapter 1, Fees, of the State Building Code shall be complied with. Except as set forth in subsections (F), (G), (H), (I) and (J) of this section relating to pending school building projects, building permit fees as set forth in subsections (A), (B), and (C) of this section shall be applicable to all permits issued by the building department. Fees shall not apply to permits issued for municipal work performed by municipal employees or for Class I renewable energy projects as defined in Section 16-1(a)(26) of the Connecticut General Statutes, as the same may be amended from time to time. Only those items of construction, such as but not limited to footings and foundations, necessary to support the Class I renewable energy project, but not the renewable energy features and equipment of the Class I project, shall be subject to building permit fees.
  - 1. Where the value of work does not exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) a fee of thirty-five dollars (\$35.00); where the value of work exceeds five hundred dollars (\$500.00) but does not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), a fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00); plus an additional twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or fraction thereof in excess of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00).

- B. Replacement of Hot Water Heaters.
  - Gas, Electric and Oil-Fired. A flat fee of thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) for a permit to replace hot water heaters will be charged.
  - 2. Electric and Oil-Fired, Wiring. A flat fee of thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) for a permit for electrical wiring of all electric and oil-fired hot water heaters will be charged.
- C. Certificate of Occupancy. A fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) will be charged for a certificate of occupancy, and a fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) will be charged for a duplicate certificate of occupancy.
- D. ICC Regulations. The building department shall apply the International Code Council (ICC) "permit valuation tables", published biannually, when computing the value of construction work within the city. Also, any additional costs to the building department of the city necessary to satisfy state statutes shall be borne by the owner/applicant prior to the issuance of a building permit.
- E. Penalty. To prevent unlawful construction, or to prevent the illegal use of occupancy of a building or structure, any company or owner found in violation will be fined two times the normal building fee as a penalty.
- F. Generally, Chapter 1, Fees, of the State Building Code shall be complied with. Building permit fees as set forth in subsections F, G and H of this section shall be applicable to all permits issued by the building department for the fees relating to the construction and replacement projects of the West End School, North End School, South End School, Barnum School, Waltersville School, Newfield School and McKinley School. Fees shall not apply to permits issued for municipal work performed by municipal employees.
  - 1. Where the value of work does not exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) a fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00); where the value of work exceeds five hundred dollars (\$500.00) but does not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), a fee of thirty-two dollars (\$32.00); plus an additional sixteen dollars (\$16.00) for each one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or fraction thereof in excess of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00).

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- H. Certificate of Occupancy. A fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) will be charged for a certificate of occupancy, and a fee of five dollars (\$5.00) will be charged for a duplicate certificate of occupancy.
- I. BOCA Regulations. The building department shall apply the building officials and code administrators (BOCA) "permit fee schedule," published biannually, when computing the value of construction work within the city. Also, any additional costs to the building department of the city necessary to satisfy state statutes shall be borne by the owner/applicant prior to the issuance of a building permit.
- J. Penalty. To prevent unlawful construction, or to prevent the illegal use of occupancy of a building or structure, any company or owner found in violation will be fined two times the normal building fee as a penalty.
- K. Anti-Blight Violations. A property with an active building permit must be kept in such a condition that it does not violate the Anti Blight Program, as set forth in Chapter 8.76 of the Bridgeport code of ordinances. If the issuance of a building permit would result in construction debris/waste that would be considered blight, it will be required that a dumpster be placed on site upon at commencement of construction. The dumpster shall be large enough to contain all of the construction debris/waste that would be generated from said building project. The owner or contractor who may be applying for the building permit shall maintain the ability to remove the construction debris/waste by other means so long as it does not cause the property to become blighted. If the owner or contractor has no other means for debris/ waste removal or has failed to remove such on a continuous basis, then the building official (or his designee) may issue a stop work order and construction shall not resume until a dumpster is placed on site for continuous disposal. If a property is deemed to be in violation of the city's blight regulations, the property shall be imposed penalties as described in Section 8.76.050(B)(1).
- L. Suspension/Abandonment of Work. In accordance with CGS 105.5 Expiration of Permits, every permit issued shall become invalid unless the work authorized by such permit is commenced within one hundred eighty (180) [days] of such issuance, or if the work authorized by such permit is suspended or abandoned for a period of one hundred eighty (180) [days] after the time the work has commenced. Abandonment of work shall mean the complete stoppage of the work authorized by such permit. Suspension of work shall mean that a reasonable amount of time (greater than one hundred eighty (180) days) has passed and there has been an extreme delay or very little progress

of the work authorized by such permit. The reasonable amount of time shall be determined by the building official or his/her designee and shall be considerate of the size and value of work.



## UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION (FHWA) EARMARK, CT 115, CONSTRUCTION OF INTERMODAL TRANSPORTATION FACILITY IN BRIDGEPORT

WHEREAS, Public law 109–59 109th Congress, August 2005, is an act to authorize funds for federal-aid highways, highway safety programs, and transit programs, and for other purposes; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA") allocates federal funds to urban areas for the purpose of implementing various transportation improvement projects; and

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport is authorized to receive approximately \$4.5 million in FHWA earmark funds ("Grant") to be administered by either the CT DOT through the FHWA or the FTA, in a manner subject to a final determination; and

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport was awarded the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) grant, CT-04-0030-01 - ITC Intermodal Transit Garage & Connectivity and successfully completed the new bus facility, garage expansion, and elevated pedestrian corridors linking these facility components to one another and to the train station and ferry terminal; and

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport is using the remaining FTA grant funds to design and build the first phase of the complete street component of the ITC; and

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport is proposing to use the FHWA funds to design and build the second phase of the complete street component of the ITC in a way that complements the City's investment in the Downtown area; and

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport will be responsible for a match of twenty percent; and

WHEREAS, the City of Bridgeport has investigated the feasibility of constructing the proposed improvements; and

WHEREAS, the Greater Bridgeport Regional Council, Greater Bridgeport Transit, Downtown Services District, FHWA, CT DOT and FTA have been included in discussions of the proposed improvements

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED** that the *Mayor*, or his duly authorized designee, is hereby authorized to accept the Grant and to execute any and all related documentation required to complete the proposed project with the Grant, subject to the approval of the Office of the City Attorney.

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

And whereas such information is regularly provided on the site of comparable CT municipalities for all to see as an honest requirement for public servants to show respect for open, accountable, transparent and honest reporting.....

Therefore, be it resolved that all municipal elected officials including the Mayor, City Council members, as well as Board and Commission members appointed by the Bridgeport Mayor provide their current residence street address of record to the Town Clerk's office by January 31, 2017. In the future, notice of such current residence address shall be provided to the Town Clerk's office within 30 days of such change or at least affirmed or changed annually before the end of January while such public service is pursued.



WHEREAS, there is a limited availability of on-street parking in the Broad Street area that restrictions the access of the general public to government services at the Margaret Morton Government Center, the Bridgeport Public Library, the Famers Market and other events regularly held at McLevy Green Plaza; and

WHEREAS, this scarcity of on-street parking contributes to creating an unwelcoming and sometimes hazardous environment for the general public, especially those who are elderly and handicapped; and

WHEREAS, that portion of Bank Street that runs between Main Street and Broad Street is currently posted "No Parking" although frequently citizens trying to access government services at the Margaret Morton Government Center risk a ticket by parking there after circling the block endlessly looking for an open on-street parking spot; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the City Council requests that the Board of Police Commissioners enhance the availability of on-street parking and increase access to the Margaret Morton Government Center and other services by removing the on-street parking bans along that portion of Bank Street that runs between Main Street and Broad Street and authorize the posting of suitable signage or installation of meters along Bank Street to create more on-street parking spaces.






