# NAME SUBJECT

John Marshall Lee 30 Beacon Street Bridgeport, CT 06605 Fiscal Governance.

Mr. Lee came forward and read the following document into the record:

Free the Port Authority!!! Review All of the Documents...

The Seal of the City prominently shows a three masted sailing vessel and the water and bridges emblematic of our port, one of only three deep water ports in CT. Let's look at the "port" of Bridgeport rather than "bridge history" for a change and see what has been happening behind the scenes. Actually the State of CT owns the "port" because the land under the water is technically the "port" while the land above water's edge is Bridgeport property and owned by whoever has title to the property. In 1992 the City of Bridgeport created the first Port Authority (PA), a separate and distinct body from the City itself under State law and sponsored a Commission that has State conferred powers. The Mayor appoints members (3) in addition to (2) automatic City department heads from OPED and Harbormaster.

Everyone has heard the economic advice: "buy low" and "sell high" as a path to success. Unfortunately, the minutes of the Port Authority have not been accompanied by financial records along with minutes for the past decade during which "back office financials" have been taken over by City officials. I attended an August 2016 PA meeting with a written critique of this practice, included in those Minutes after reading minutes of that time. At the meeting I asked Tom Gill whether he, as a former banker and corporate board member, found it unusual for a body to have no financial records available for such a long historical period at each meeting? Millions at risk? Millions borrowed? Waterfront property?

At the most recent PA meeting, January 2019, Ken Flatto, City Finance Director included a financial summary report that was not included with the minutes when the board voted to adjourn. Allegedly, the Summary purported to be the record of the Port Authority from (1) a time when the Carpenter/Derecktor property was acquired by the PA, continuing through a period (2) when other funds were granted to the PA and spent by the PA to remediate, enhance and develop the site, and to the point (3) where most of the PA property has been sold. Without footnotes, backup documents and more fully explained comments the Summary fails to provide a comprehensive and accurate public accounting, in my opinion.

Period 1. PA was attempting to purchase Carpenter Tech for \$2.5 Million with the power of Eminent Domain. Ganim1 stepped up to ask if the deal could be settled by adding \$6.8 Million to the offer for a total of \$9.25 Million. (Where did the money to close the deal come from fully accounted for in a Funding Agreement as was the initial \$2.5 Million? Where are appraisal documents at each step of purchase or sale? What do documents from that time to Ganim say as to professional advice?

Period 2. An additional \$6.4 Million was spent for improvements between the Ganim1 offer and title closings in 2017 and late 2018 increasing the "base" for accounting purposes to more than \$15 Million.

Period 3. The City of Bridgeport sold all of the remaining PA land during 2017 and near the close of 2018 except where the Water Street office sits for the sum of \$10.7 Million. Do you view this as an example of "buy high" and "sell low"? Or is it a loss of more than \$5 Million? How does Ganim2 financial and operational management of our port and property look today?

Why hasn't the voice of the PA, with independent legal and accounting representation for the PA itself, been heard including a formal audit for the PA? Ganim2 when he came into office in 2016 did not question the OPED payoff of a \$930,000 note to Titan Capital. Why not? If the funds came from bonded funds that the City Council gets no regular reporting on and which is targeted per each bond indenture to specific use? And today, the 2017 and 2018 closings under Ganim2 seem to complete yet another lousy deal for the City taxpayer? Where are the appraisals? Where are the closing documents? Legal expenses paid should show all opinions at each step of the way? Shouldn't actions receiving informed approval by unconflicted and independently appointed PA members with full financial representations available to them and included in Authority minutes and records be the order of the day? Time will tell.

Ms. Spell came forward and said that there were 20 members of the Council that represent the 10 districts of the City. She said that she had come to the Council and said that if the Council could not give the schools more money, could they help out with manpower. She said that there should be a way to have a City electrician help out with school electrical issues.

As the president of the Classical Studies Parents, she pointed out that Classical Studies has two buildings and there is no security at the school annex. She gave a shout out to one of the Bridgeport Police Officers who gave of his time to help provide some security for the Academy Each student in Connecticut get allocated \$13,000, but an inmate is allocated \$50,000. Is it better to allocate funding for inmates rather than students? How long has Bridgeport received \$13,000 per students. The school to prison pipeline will continue to exist until changes are made.

Cecil Young

Cover-up of City Officials.

99 Carroll Avenue Bridgeport, CT 06607

Mr. Young came forward and said that he had been coming before the Council for the last 10 or 12 years because he had not received the documentation that justified his termination. He thanked Council Member Newton for attempting to address that issue. He went on to speak about Mayor Ganim and how Mayor Ganim doesn't talk to people. As a young man in his twenties, he ran for Mayor not because he wanted to be mayor but because he wanted the issues to be brought forward. He said that it would be important to respect their rights to vote, to be treated as a first-class citizen and they have the rights just like everyone else.

Mr. Young spoke about his request to the Mayor to be appointed as a liaison for the community, which the Mayor has not responded to. Now as he approaches his 69th birthday, he wants to speak power to justice. As a black African American, he said that they had put this Mayor in office and Mr. Young was asking for the documentation involving his termination. He does not want Ms. Hawkin's opinion, he wants the documentation. This is not over. Part II is yet to come.

Juan & Maria Martinez 51 Hill Street Bridgeport, CT 06606 Hostile and threatening environment due to motorcycle gang and illegal tattoo shop.

Mr. and Mrs. Martinez and another family member came forward and read the following statement into the record:

We are writing to you in great distress and urgency in dealing with a matter that has affected our family very deeply and negatively, since the beginning of the year 2017. This is an ongoing problem and has prevented us from enjoying the property that we have worked so hard to maintain and cherish. This problem and all problems arising from this has affected our whole family both physically and mentally, and unfortunately, we feel danger just being home. My wife, Maria, has even been hospitalized from problems arising from this whole fiasco. Earlier in 2017, the commercial building next-door to our resident was rented out to a motorcycle club (gang). From the very start, the owner of the building located at 35 Hill St. in Bridgeport, sent about 8 to 10 of the would-be tenants in a very threatening, encroaching, and menacing manner to introduce or coerce us into agreeing with their presence and renting of a "room" in the commercial building. One of the statements used by one of the gang of men that arrived was "we are all registered gun permit holders and know one is going to mess with us or the street".

After more than one member saying this to our family and from our understanding, everyone was armed in the game and everyone had a gun. No hours of operation were given, and no explanation was given to us from the owners of the building or the gang as to what the room was being rented out for and to whom and why. After the first night of their presence, the gang arrived with about 30 people on motorcycles and everyone was revving their engines as loud as they possibly could, awakening us and ruining our night. This was only the beginning of the nightmare that we have had to indoor up to this point in time. It turned out that the commercial building locale was turned into a club type then you rented out by the F.L.N.Y Ryderz motorcycle gang, where a bar for alcohol was built in a residential area with no existing liquor license; rampant, volatile, and reckless parties are thrown with no permission from the building's owner; and the safety and well-being of our family and business are in jeopardy. It is impossible for the owner of the building to not know that this F.L.N.Y. Ryderz gang throws parties with reckless abandon starting from 7 PM to 7 AM; sells liquor with no permit; sells liquor to underage subjects without checking I. D's; throws garbage over our fence threatens us and targets us as a whole family.

In fact when we went to complain to the owner of the building or his representative about how the game completely breaks the noise ordinance level with their hoots, hollers, and motorcycles being revved all night and early morning parentheses (between 11 PM to 6 AM), and our fears for safety he happened to inform our family that he "did not give a S\*\*T". Since that moment the F.L.N.Y. Gang has appeared on our street, our enjoyment of the property has dwindled to nothing along with our privacy. In fact the family business is based on the installation and furnishing of fenced building, in being so versed -we've had to install our very own 8 foot tall vinyl private type fence to try and increase our lost privacy and try in the slightest to block out some of the noise, but to no avail.

To date our house has been losing value, if we were to try and sell the property, we would end up losing a great sum of money, and even so are considering leaving Bridgeport for good. We as a family have lived in our residence for over 15 years and in Bridgeport for 27 years, as a family operated and owned small business established and located in Bridgeport and are seeking asylum in another township or city to rid ourselves of the vexation that has inflicted these damages to our family and business as a whole. If we were to stay here in the presence of such danger and menace, we would fear for the life of one of our family members or friends. We have contacted the Zoning Board, we have spoken to Maria Viggiano, Alfred Castillo, Chief of Police A. J. Perez, and ultimately no one want to do anything at all. This has been an ongoing problem for the past year and our cries have fallen on deaf ears.

We have a lawyer representing us because it seems that we need legal counsel and presents. We are disappointed, scared, tired, discontented, dissatisfied, and exasperated because of these circumstances and feel we have nowhere to turn in no one to help us in our time of dire need.

The change of Yaremich Drive to a one-way street without any community input.

Dr. Williams came forward and said that he was a family physician in Bridgeport. He said that there were negative consequences from the recent change of Yaremich Drive into a one-way street. He said that it was clear that people did not care about the residents.

He displayed a photo of the property which is where the North End Clinic was Located on Yaremich Drive which he purchased in 2006. He spoke about how many of his patients were from the Trumbull Gardens complex.

Dr. Williams then said that the Police Commissioner had approved changing Yaremich Drive to a one-way Street, but the Engineering Department had strong concerns about the change. Now his patients park on Reservoir Drive. His patients need access to his parking lot. There have been three major accidents on Soundview Avenue in the last two months.

Dr. Williams said he was told that the Council was able to change the street back to a two-way street. He then asked the Council Members to request that the Police Commission to reconsider their decision. This is about the safety of the patients.

### Project MOTHER, Inc.

Gloria Barksdale Project MOTHER, Inc. 2612 North Ave., #B12 Bridgeport, CT 06604

Ms. Barksdale came forward and said that she had been a resident for six months. She moved to Bridgeport from Fairfax County, Virginia. She said that she was the key person for a non-profit group called Project MOTHER (Millennium Opportunity To Heal, Educate & Rehabilitate) which helps women become economically empowered. She then gave a brief overview of the information sheet she had distributed to the Council Members (See attached).

Ms. Barksdale said that 42% of women were unemployed and about 23% had less than a high school education. This program assists women to break the glass ceiling. She began as a school teacher and has kept up with the information technology in order to assist and empower women.

### ITEM FOR IMMEDIATE CONSIDERATION:

\*\* COUNCIL MEMBER BROWN MOVED FOR IMMEDIATE CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA ITEM 25-18.

\*\* COUNCIL MEMBER HERRON SECONDED.

Council Member Spain said that while he was in favor of this but wanted to ask about the emergency nature of the request. He said that Council Member Brown's request was submitted on the 24th and the shut-down ended on the 25th. He asked if they had heard from their constituents.

Council Member Herron said that she agreed with Council Member Brown and noted that the government may shut down on the 15th again. It is time to be pro-active.

Council Member Langan said that he agreed but pointed out that the taxes were due on February 1st, which has already passed. He asked Council Member Brown how this would work.

Council Member Brown then read the following statement in to the record:

HB 5765 allows municipalities to differ the local taxes of all those affected by the shutdown beginning on December 22, 2018 and gives them sixty (60) day deferment of payment without risk of interest or penalty. Although the Federal government shutdown was ended on January 25, 2019 due to a temporary deal between Congress and the President, delaying local tax payment is still helpful to the affected employees because many of them went without pay for many weeks at a time, making it difficult for many of them to pay their bills in a timely manner. The intent of the state legislation was to give these affected taxpayers additional time (60 days) to make their payments to local government without being penalized. After 60 days expires, full payment is due to the City.

This item is being submitted for immediate consideration because tax payments were due January 31, 2019. The only way for this resolution to have a real impact on affected taxpayers is for the tax collector to implement this program immediately. Sending this resolution to the committee will unnecessarily delay the relief that HB 5765 and this resolution seeks to provide to affected taxpayers.

Council Member Zambrano Viggiano said that she had concerns about how many taxpayers were affected. She said that she didn't know if there were any government workers living in Bridgeport. She also said it would be hard to justify those who might have been laid off or furloughed. This is admirable, but she felt it was not fair.

Council Member Brown said that the resolution was only made for Federal workers who were still employed but not allowed to work. There are over thousands of Federal employees in Connecticut and it would be unrealistic to think that there aren't any in Bridgeport.

Council Member Newton said that he was going to side with Council Member Brown because this is the job of the Council to step up to the plate and help those who can't help themselves. If the Council can provide relief for the residents, then they should do it. What would have any Council Member done if their job had been stalled like this and they couldn't pay their mortgage.

Council President Nieves said that she agreed with this resolution and Council Member Brown asked about the immediate consideration because it impacts families that live in Bridgeport. There are families who live paycheck to paycheck -- and they should be supported by the Council. This is not something that happens all the time and the taxes were due on the 31st. This will prevent them from accruing interest.

Council Member Lyons said that she normally doesn't advocate for immediate consideration but sending it to Committee, but that would delay it another month. This is not City money, and the people still have to pay their taxes. This is a temporary program for people to pay their bills. This is about individual families, not the City.

Council Member Zambrano Viggiano said that she had acknowledged the national crisis but wanted to know how the Tax Collector would handle this. She repeated her earlier concerns about supporting one category of workers over another.

Mr. Gaudett said that if the item passes, a document will be sent to the Council Members on how the process will be handled.

Council Member Langan said that this was well intentioned but took the point that there were no Interest loans available but pointed out that the companies that were contracted to the Federal government were the ones that would be affected the most.

Council Member Newton asked if the legislation could be amended to include the third-party vendors. Mr. Gaudett said the third-party vendors were not covered by the State legislation.

Mr. Gaudett reminded everyone that 11 votes would be needed to approve the item for immediate consideration.

# FOR IMMEDIATE CONSIDERATION

Whereas, the CT General Assembly passed and Governor Lamont signed <u>HB 5765</u> establishing a loan program and a municipal option provision to establish a program to defer the due date of specific property taxes owed by federal employees affected by the government shutdown; and,

Whereas, the bill authorizes municipalities to establish a program to defer the due dates for an affected employee's real and personal property or motor vehicles taxes. The municipality's legislative body may vote to establish the program; and,

Whereas, municipalities establishing the program must not charge or collect interest on an affected individual's taxes or any portion thereof, that became due during the period in which the individual met the eligibility criteria; and,

Whereas, once the individual is no longer eligible for the program, he or she must pay the deferred amounts within 60 days, without interest or penalty; after 60 days, any unpaid amount is subject to interest and penalties applied retroactively to the tax payment's original due date.

Now therefore be it resolved by City Council of the City of Bridgeport that, pursuant to and in accordance with HB 5765, the Tax Collector of the City of Bridgeport hereby authorized, empowered, and directed not charge or collect interest on any tax or part thereof that is payable by a Federal employee affected by the Federal government shutdown which started at midnight on December 22, 2018 and which became due during the period when such individual was an affected employee; and,

Be it further resolved that each tax deferred under this program shall be due and payable without interest or penalty not later than sixty days after the date on which an individual is no longer an affected employee. Thereafter, any portion of the tax or installment or portion thereof which remains unpaid and all interest and penalties otherwise provided by law shall apply retroactively to the original due date for the tax or portion thereof. All provisions of the general statutes relating to continuing, recording and releasing property tax liens and the precedence and enforcement of taxes shall remain applicable to any deferred tax or installment or portion thereof; and,

Be it further resolved that the Tax Collector of the City of Bridgeport is hereby authorized and empowered to determine the eligibility of such affected Federal employees under this program pursuant to and in accordance with HB 5765; and,

Be it further resolved that nothing in this section shall affect interest or penalties on, or lien rights or collection of any tax due before December 22, 2018, or after the date on which an individual is no longer an affected employee.


# Item #25-18 Resolution Implementing a Tax Deferment Program for Federal Employees Affected by the Government Shutdown Pursuant to HB 5765

Statement of Emergency, in accordance with the Charter of the City of Bridgeport:

HB 5765 allows municipalities to defer the local taxes of all those affected by the shutdown beginning on December 22, 2018 and gives them a sixty (60) day deferment of payment without risk of interest or penalties. Although the federal government shutdown was ended on January 25, 2019 due to a temporary deal between Congress and the President, delaying local tax payments is still helpful to the affected employees because many of them went without pay for many weeks at a time, making it difficult for many of them to pay their bills in a timely manner. The intent of the state legislation was to give these affected taxpayers additional time (sixty days) to make their payments to local government without being penalized. After the sixty day period expires, full payment is due to the city.

This item is being submitted for **immediate consideration** because tax payments were due January 31, 2019. The only way for this resolution to have a real impact on affected taxpayers is for the Tax Collector to implement this program immediately. Sending this resolution to committee will unnecessarily delay the relief that HB 5765 and this resolution seek to provide to affected taxpayers.

Any person, firm or such corporation who pays any property tax in excess of the principal of such tax as entered in the rate book of the tax collector and covered by his warrant therein, or in excess of the legal interest, penalty or fees pertaining to such tax, or who pays a tax from which the payer is by statute exempt and entitled to an abatement, or who, by reason of a clerical error on the part of the assessor or board of tax review, pays a tax in excess of that which should have been assessed against his property, or who is entitled to a refund because of the issuance of a certificate of correction may make application in writing to the collector of taxes for the refund of such amount. Such application shall be made not later than three years from the date such tax was due and shall contain a recital of the facts and shall state the amount of the refund request.



### SACRED HEART UNIVERSITY

Fieldwork Education Agreement

This agreement is entered into this \_\_\_ day of February, 2019 by and between SACRED HEART UNIVERSITY, INC., a Connecticut non-stock corporation with a principal address of 5151 Park Avenue, Fairfield, Connecticut 06825, hereafter referred to as UNIVERSITY and The City of Bridgeport, a municipal corporation, acting through its Department of Health and Social Services, with a principal address at 45 Lyon Terrace, Bridgeport, CT 06604, hereafter referred to as FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER.

Whereas, the parties agree that, for the mutual benefit of each, formal affiliation should be entered into and carried out in accordance with certain procedures and standards for establishing a fieldwork education program, and

Whereas, certain legal rights and obligations will attach to such affiliations when established,

Therefore, it is hereby agreed by and between the parties as follows:

- 1. This agreement will begin on the date specified above and will continue until terminated in writing, with sixty (60) days notice, by one of the parties.
- 2. The UNIVERSITY agrees:
  - A. to assign qualified students to participate in the fieldwork education program. Such qualified students as it deems appropriate shall be assigned for a period of time as agreed upon by and between the parties. In the event that the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER deems it necessary to cancel a reserved space, due to circumstances beyond its reasonable control, it agrees to notify the UNIVERSITY at least 60 days in advance of the commencement date of the student affiliation.
  - B. that the academic preparation of the students it assigns shall be in keeping with the objectives and requirements of the fieldwork education program.
  - C. that it shall designate one person who shall be responsible for coordination of all aspects of this affiliation and its associated academic components.
  - D. that the students it assigns shall adhere to all reasonable policies and procedures of the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER.
  - E. to require students to provide to the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER evidence of physical examination and immunizations as may be reasonably required by the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER.
  - F. to provide students with such mandatory education as is deemed appropriate by the UNIVERSITY, including, but not limited to OSHA standards regarding blood borne pathogens and universal precautions.
  - G. that students shall not be deemed employees of the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER, and are therefore not entitled to worker's compensation benefits or any other employmentrelated benefits.

H. to require students to carry professional liability insurance for student professionals in the amounts of \$3,000,000 per incident and \$6,000,000 in aggregate. The UNIVERSITY also maintains general liability insurance which extends to students and faculty engaged in practical and clinical training. Both the students and the UNIVERSITY shall provide proof of such insurance prior to students' participating in the fieldwork education program at the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER.

### 3. The FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER agrees:

- A. to provide a planned, supervised program of fieldwork instruction consistent with the objectives of the UNIVERSITY'S fieldwork education program, and shall provide suitable facilities and sufficient personnel necessary to carry out this program.
- B. to make available to students reasonable access to emergency medical services at the student's own expense.
- C. to designate one person as the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER'S Fieldwork Educator, who shall be responsible for the learning experience of the students, such person having met the academic and other standards established by the parties.
- D. to provide the students with an orientation to the policies and procedures of the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER in advance or at the beginning of the affiliation.
- E. to ensure that all records relating to a student's performance while with the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER shall be made available only in conformance with the Family Education rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 U.S.C. section 1232g, and other governing laws.
- F. that the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER may terminate, upon reasonable cause as determined by the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER in consultation with the UNIVERSITY, the fieldwork placement of any student due to breach of the rules and regulations of the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER, or whose work performance is unsatisfactory or whose physical and/or mental health renders the student unable to perform the essential requirements of the fieldwork education program, with reasonable accommodation. Prior to termination, the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER will provide the student and the UNIVERSITY with notice of the proposed termination and reasons therefore, and shall furnish the student and the UNIVERSITY opportunity to respond to such notice.

- Indemnification. In the event claims, losses, damages, or expenses are caused by the joint or concurrent negligence of the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER and UNIVERSITY, they shall be borne by each party in proportion to its negligence.
- It is agreed that any controversy or claim arising out of, or relating to, this Agreement, or the
  performance or interpretation thereof, shall be settled by a court of competent jurisdiction in Fairfield,
  Connecticut.
- 6. This agreement is governed by the laws of the state of Connecticut. It is further agreed that "applicable law(s)" for the purposes of this Agreement shall mean any applicable statute, law, ordinance, regulation, requirement, order or rule of any federal or state government or other governmental agency or body or of any other type of regulatory body, or any governmental or administrative interpretation of any thereof, including without limitation, (i) requirements imposed by any governmental or regulatory body which must be satisfied to qualify for Medicare, Medicaid or other health care program reimbursements, and (ii) any and all federal or state health care laws, including, without limitation, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, as amended ("HIPAA") and regulations (proposed or final) promulgated hereunder and all state statutes addressing privacy and security of healthcare information.
- 7. It is agreed that at no time shall the matter of race, religion, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or any other impermissible criterion be considered for the purpose of unlawful discrimination.
- 8. It is agreed that the UNIVERSITY shall provide the FIELDWORK EDUCATION CENTER with the necessary information, including course materials, curriculum outline, fieldwork education objectives and student performance evaluation materials to assist the parties in effecting this agreement.
- 9. It is agreed that this agreement may be modified only upon written agreement signed by both parties.

### NOW THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL:



In accordance with the Charter of the City of Bridgeport, Chapter 5, Section 11, the following resolution #27-18 was approved by the City Council of the City of Bridgeport on February 4, 2019 and does not require Mayoral signature; said approval effective as of February 26, 2019.



### To the City Council of the City of Bridgeport.

The Committee on <u>Ordinances</u> begs leave to report; and recommends for adoption the following resolution:

### Item No. \*27-17 Consent Calendar

Whereas, an individual domiciled in the City of Bridgeport who receives a passing mark on an open competitive examination shall have 15 percent added to their passing grade in determining his or her order or rank in the eligibility list, said points shall be in addition to any applicable veterans preference points; and,

Whereas, currently, to obtain such credit, an applicant shall have filed proof of domicile on or before the date of examination. To be eligible to obtain said credit such proof must show that the individual was domiciled in the City of Bridgeport at the date of the announcement of the examination and at the date of certification for hire; and,

Whereas, domiciled is defined to be that place where an individual has his/her true, fixed and permanent home and to which whenever the individual is absent he/she has the intention of returning; and,

Whereas, any individual who falsely reports their domicile as the City of Bridgeport, CT, who is domiciled outside the City of Bridgeport, CT, will not receive the preference points, will be prohibited from competing in any future Civil Service examinations and will be subject to the penalties set forth in Section 221 of the City Charter.

Whereas, the Civil Service Commission unanimously voted on October 11, 2011 to change the rule from 10% to 15 percent effective immediately on all competitive exams and requests the City of Bridgeport Common Council to do the same.

Whereas, it is important that employees of the City of Bridgeport be reflective of and come from the diverse communities that they serve; and,

Whereas, fifteen percent should only be added to the passing grades for those who are and have been domiciled in the City of Bridgeport for at least one year; and,

Whereas, the Civil Service Commission may, upon recommendation of the City Council, vote to amend Rule XV of the Rules of the Civil Service Commission.


