John Marshall Lee 30 Beacon Street Bridgeport, CT 06605 Municipal Governance.

Mr. Lee came forward and read the following statement into the record:

Good evening City Council members, (August 5, 2019)

City of Bridgeport City Council Regular Meeting August 5, 2019

As you attend tonight's public comments, do you miss the young people who were selected to sit at your side for several months? What did they learn from the experience? It was your opportunity to engage with them, answer questions, explain issues and perhaps suggest how Bridgeport governance really operates. To what purpose is government directed? Who has power when the voting booth closes? How does government serve the citizen taxpayer? What are citizen rights?

It is fun to encounter one or more of these "youth Council" members in public. They lived the experience, see you on the street, recognize you and ask follow-up questions. Real interest. Lots of energy.

Do you remember listening to Myron Dukes, a "returning citizen" after serving 24 years and eight months in NY State? Do you remember that he respectfully and with energy spoke to you on two occasions in March? He told how he was forced to exit from City Hall Annex by uniformed members of the Police Department on February 23 when he tried to attend a free City program featuring Black History Month, hip-hop creators and music, anti-violence programming as well as food and drink. No explanation was provided to him on that day initially nor when he returned to talk with officers. No explanation yet!!

We spoke to the City Council subsequently attempting to discover why and how his rights to free assembly were abridged. He filed two complaints with the City Clerk looking for explanation. Each was turned down with no official party indicated as reviewer or decision maker. Mayor Ganim and Chief Perez were each addressed in the second complaint as were the names of three officers, apparently on duty at City Hall that Saturday. Was this normal staffing? Who directed the personnel in blue uniform?

We pursue that question again today as civil rights for all are important. And City responsiveness to issues like this presented to the Council and pursued with due speed, may avoid greater expense later as in the case of Linda Lee's van. Remember, after twice denying any responsibility for the way her van was processed, an attorney entered her representation. Lo and behold, she promptly got the value sought but earlier denied by the City. And taxpayers of the City were now taxed with paying his fees of several thousand dollars in addition.

At least one member of the City Council seems to know more about this "banning" situation. On Face book the member has talked about banning Myron Dukes. Words like "stalking" and "harassment have been used. I directed a letter to Chief Perez last week with questions and still await a response.

What secret campaign is going on to deny an answer to the question that Dukes asked nearly six months ago? Who provided a photograph of this "returning citizen" to one or more officers with instructions to exit him from a City event even if there was no provocation? Do we have a very expensive Police Force executing the wishes of a powerful few, afraid to provide public reasons for their misuse of City resources?

And speaking of photographs, Face book is an environment and platform ideal for promoting ideas and images, letting people follow your words and actions. Subject to the rules of Face book, freedom of expression flows broadly. However, it is a public platform and thus when a Council person in June is mentoring City youth and the next month is seen recording party attendance with a local woman, a former "returning citizen", now currently serving a sentence for embezzling \$2.5 Million of Connecticut Medicaid funds, one wonders what message a "youth Council" member walks away with? What storyline to what audience was intended by such a photo? What do the youth see communicated?

Civil rights available to all with Bridgeport's uniformed force for public safety enforcing all of the rights for all of the people is our goal. What can you do? Help that train gain and maintain momentum. Time will tell.

The residents need help. Every Monday, they take 10 homes from Bridgeport residents. More people are being forced out of their homes.

Another resident who is the President of a local organization came forward and said that the conveyances of property on town records are being done improperly and this needs to be investigated.

The Office of Planning and Economic Development is submitting this item in furtherance of <u>Plan Bridgeport</u> Goal 1.1, which requires that the City "Improve Usage of Transit and Alternative Modes of Transportation."

Both Associate City Attorney Tyisha Toms and I will attend the Ordinance Committee meeting to discuss the matter in greater detail and to answer any questions that the Council may have.

Resolution Amending Chapter 12.16 of the Municipal Code

WHEREAS, in furtherance of <u>Plan Bridgeport</u> Goal 1.1, which requires that the City work to "improve usage of transit and alternative modes of transportation," the City's Office of Planning and Economic Development ("OPED") proposes to implement a fifteen month pilot program (the "Pilot Program") to allow for the safe and orderly operation of shared mobility devices (e.g., bicycles, electric bicycles, electric scooters) within the city;

WHEREAS, a Shared Mobility Device ("Device(s)") is a traditional bicycle, electric/pedal-assist bicycle or electric scooter that is part of a Shared Mobility System, which is a system that provides bicycles, electric/pedal-assist bicycle or electric scooters for a short-term rental for point-to-point trips and such devices may be locked and unlocked without the requirement of a rack or other docking station; and

WHEREAS, such shared mobility devices are found throughout the country and the world, and provide an economic and alternative mode of transportation for many, particularly within cities;

WHEREAS, a private pilot program between "BIRD," a California-based scooter-share company, and the University of Bridgeport, was conducted within the city during the 2018-2019 school year and was deemed successful;

WHEREAS, working interdepartmentally and studying best practices nationwide, OPED has developed a comprehensive policy and regulatory document outlining the terms and conditions and the application process pursuant to which the Pilot Program will be administered;

WHEREAS, the Pilot Program will run from September 4th of 2019 to November 30th of 2020, during which time OPED and other departments within the City will be able to gather data regarding the usage of the shared bicycles and scooters, the extent of consumer demand, the incidence of accidents or injury, the performance of participating companies, the equitable distribution of bikes and scooters throughout the city's neighborhoods, the broader community and business feedback, all so as to ultimately make informed recommendations as to whether the pilot operation of such devices ought to be continued, and if so, pursuant to what parameters;

WHEREAS, for all the reasons cited above, it is in the City's best interest to establish the Pilot Program;

WHEREAS, Device Providers may apply to participate in the Pilot Program by submitting an application, thereby agreeing to the terms and conditions thereof, and paying a one-time nonrefundable registration fee in the amount of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to OPED, which shall be applied to a dedicated fund to provide future bicycle infrastructure improvements;

WHEREAS, implementation of the Pilot Program will require amendments to the City's Code of Ordinances Chapter 12.16 – STREET AND SIDEWALK USE REGULATIONS.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED: By the City Council of the City of Bridgeport that, effective upon publication, the Municipal Code of Ordinances, Chapter 12.16 – STREET AND SIDEWALK USE REGULATIONS is hereby amended as follows:

Chapter 12.16 - STREET AND SIDEWALK USE REGULATIONS

Sections:

12.16.010 - Street and highway grading requirements.

- All grades of highways shall be made and mapped in reference to some fixed point or base in the city.
- B. No street shall be laid out by the city unless at the same time a grade of such proposed street shall be duly established by the common council.
- C. No street shall be accepted by the city until the same has been brought to a grade duly approved by the common council, which grading shall be certified to by the city engineer.

12.16.020 - Use by animals.

No person shall cause or permit any animal or vehicle to stand upon or across any sidewalk so as to hinder or impede travel thereon nor upon any crosswalk; nor leave unattended any animal used for riding or driving, whether attached to any vehicle or not, unless such animal shall be securely fastened; nor fasten any animal to any tree or leave it so that it injures any street; nor ride or drive any animal on any street at a greater rate of speed than seven miles an hour.

12.16.030 - Playing in streets.

Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, nNo person shall ride any vehicle propelled by the feet, or any cart or wheelbarrow upon or along any sidewalk. No person shall coast, slide, fly kites or play ball or any other game in any street.

12.16.040 - Obstructing travel on public ways.

No person shall loiter or idle upon any highway, sidewalk or bridge, or upon any fence or structure adjacent thereto, so as to hinder travel thereon.

(Prior code § 27-14)

12.16.050 - Fences.

- A. No hedge, shrubbery or full board fence shall be permitted at a height of more than four feet on any corner lot within a distance of twenty-five (25) feet from the corner point of the fence line on the street sides of such lot.
- B. Every owner of any lot of land which abuts upon any street shall, when ordered to do so by the common council, cause to be erected and maintained on the line of such lot adjoining the street a suitable and sufficient fence of rails, boards or other materials; and the director of public facilities is authorized to erect such a fence at the expense of the parties interested, when the owner shall neglect to provide the same within the time limited in such order.

12.16.060 - Maintenance of stands on streets and sidewalks.

Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, nNo person shall place or maintain and no person shall permit or suffer the placing or maintenance on or along any street or sidewalk of any cart, wagon, vehicle, box, stand, container, sign or any other article or thing for the purpose of selling, offering for sale, displaying or advertising any article of food, or any goods, wares or merchandise, or advertising any business or amusement or place of such business or amusement.

12.16.070 - Selling from sidewalks.

No person occupying or using any premises adjoining any sidewalk shall use, and no person occupying or using any such premises shall permit or suffer anyone to use, any part of any sidewalk for the purpose of selling or offering for sale, or inducing the sale of any article of food, or any goods, wares or merchandise displayed or maintained on the premises occupied or used by such person.

(Prior code § 27-17)

12.16.080 - Selling to persons on sidewalks.

No person occupying or using any premises adjoining any sidewalk shall sell or offer to sell, from such premises or any part thereof to any person on the sidewalk adjoining such premises, any article of food, or any goods, wares or merchandise or any other thing maintained, displayed or advertised for sale on such premises; nor shall any person occupying or using such premises suffer or permit any other person to do so.

(Prior code § 27-18)

12.16.090 - Use of street or sidewalk in making delivery of goods.

No person in making delivery to any place of any article of food, or of any goods, wares or merchandise or of any other thing, shall deposit and permit any such article to remain upon any street or sidewalk; and no person receiving any such delivery shall permit or suffer any such article to remain upon any street or sidewalk.

(Prior code § 27-19)

12.16.100 - Sidewalk stands—Exceptions to chapter.

Nothing in this chapter shall apply to or forbid the maintenance of any sidewalk stand for the sale of newspapers under any license therefor now or hereafter issued by the chief of police pursuant to the provisions of Sections 12.08.010, 12.08.020 and 12.16.170; nor to any stand in any city-owned park maintained by or the maintenance of which is licensed by the city; nor to any receptacle for the deposit of refuse or rubbish maintained for the use of the public by or with the permission of the city; nor to refuse or garbage deposited for collection by the director of public facilities, provided such refuse or garbage is deposited in such manner and form, in such receptacles and at such places as are approved by the director of public facilities; nor to lawful picketing in any bona fide labor dispute.

12.16.110 - Awnings.

No awning, which is designed to be attached to any permanently erected frame extending over any part of the sidewalk or to any pole or post set in the sidewalk or street, shall be placed over or across any public sidewalk unless a permit for the erection and maintenance of such awning shall be procured from the common council. No part of any awning, when extended over any sidewalk, shall be less than seven feet above the level of the sidewalk.

12.16.120 - Parades.

All street parades and processions bearing banners, or other conspicuous devices, or accompanied with music or any disturbing sounds, except the national guard, the police and fire departments and funeral processions engaged in the burial of the dead, are prohibited, unless permission therefor shall be first obtained from the chief of police. The chief of police may furnish a police escort for any such parade or procession if deemed by him necessary or proper.

12.16.130 - Restrictions on moving buildings through the streets.

- A. Every application for a license to remove a building under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 7(g) of the Charter and Related Laws compilation found on file shall state the name of the owner of the building to be moved, the name of the person who is to move the same, the precise location from and to which the building is to be moved, the distance from the proposed front line of such building to the line of the street, the street or streets through which it is to be conveyed, the dimensions of the building and the nature of the materials of which it is constructed. The director of public facilities, in his discretion, may approve or deny the application for a license.
- B. Every application under this section shall be carefully filed and preserved.
- C. No person receiving permission to remove a building, as provided for in this section, shall be deemed to have permission to remove the same through or upon any street not designated in his application or permit. No such license shall be granted until the applicant has filed a bond, with good and sufficient surety in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00), payable to the city for its benefit and for the benefit of any person who may be specially injured thereby, which bond shall be approved by the city attorney.
- D. Every such license shall have limited therein a certain date before which time such moving is to be completed.
- E. If such building remains upon any street after such date, the director of public facilities in his discretion shall either complete the moving of the same, or, if in his judgment such building as a whole cannot reasonably be moved to its destination, he shall have the power to separate the building into parts, so that he can reasonably remove it from the street. The licensee shall be liable under such bond for any expense, cost, loss and damage sustained by the city. The city shall not be liable to the owner of such building for any damage that may be done by the director of public facilities in removing the building from the street.

12.16.140 - Removal of sod, turf, etc.

No person shall cut or dig up any sod or turf in any street or public square with the intent to remove or carry away the same, or remove or carry away any earth, gravel or street dirt from any street without permission of the director of public facilities.

12.16.150 - Removal of obstructions, snow and ice from sidewalks.

A. Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, eEvery person owning any land upon or adjacent to which there is a sidewalk, paved, concreted or worked, shall keep such sidewalk at all times in a safe and convenient condition for the use of the public, and shall forthwith repair all defects and remove all obstructions in any way endangering the public travel upon the same.

- B. Except as provided in 12.16.250 hereof, eEvery owner or occupant of any land or building, or the owner or lessee of any unoccupied land or building adjoining any sidewalk, shall, before sunset, remove any wood, coal, box, barrel, can or any other thing by which such sidewalk shall be in whole or in part obstructed or rendered unsafe or inconvenient to public travel.
- C. Every owner or occupant of any land or building, or the owner or lessee of any unoccupied land or building, shall keep and maintain any sidewalk adjoining such land and building free from snow, ice or sleet, by which such sidewalk shall be obstructed or rendered unsafe. Whenever such sidewalk shall be permitted to remain covered with snow, ice or sleet for more than six hours after the same shall have been deposited or formed thereon, the director of public facilities may remove such snow, ice or sleet from sidewalk and report the expenses of such removal to the city attorney, who shall immediately collect the same by any proper action against the owner or occupant of the land or building, or the owner or lessee of any unoccupied land or building, adjoining such sidewalk. This section shall not be so construed as to conflict with Section 19-310 of the General Statutes.

12.16.160 - Liability for ice and snow on public sidewalks.

- A. The provisions of Connecticut General Statutes Section 7-163a are adopted, and are set forth in subsections B and C of this section.
- B. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 13a-149 of the General Statutes or any other general statute or special act, the city shall not be liable to any person injured in person or property caused by the presence of ice or snow on a public sidewalk unless the city is the owner or person in possession and control of land abutting such sidewalk, other than land used as a highway or street, provided the city shall be liable for its affirmative acts with respect to such sidewalk.
- C. The owner or person in possession and control of land abutting a public sidewalk shall have the same duty of care with respect to the presence of ice or snow on such sidewalk toward the portion of the sidewalk abutting his property as the municipality had prior to the effective date of the ordinance codified in this section adopted pursuant to the provisions of Connecticut General Statutes Section 7-163a and shall be liable to persons injured in person or property where a breach of duty is the proximate cause of injury.
 - No action to recover damages for injury to the person or to property caused by the
 presence of ice or snow on a public sidewalk against a person who owns or is in
 possession and control of land abutting a public sidewalk shall be brought but within
 two years from the date when the injury is first sustained.

12.16.170 - Duty to clean gutters.

In case the gutter opposite any dwelling house, store or other building, or opposite any lot of ground, shall at any time become obstructed with snow, ice, dirt or anything whatsoever, the owner, occupant or person having charge thereof shall cause such gutter to be cleaned out so that the water may run freely along the same.

12.16.180 - Marking of private streets.

Whenever any street shall be laid out over and across private land by the owner thereof, and until the same shall be accepted by the common council, the person making such layout and the owner of such private street shall maintain at either entrance to such street, and at the intersection of such street with any other street, a suitable sign or notice approved by the director of public facilities and containing thereon the words "private street."

12.16.190 - Prohibitions as to advertising matter.

No person who by virtue of a license granted under this chapter shall occupy a portion of any street with building materials, or by virtue of such license shall erect a fence of any description in any portion of a city street, shall place or cause or suffer to be placed thereon any poster, bill, placard or other printed, written or painted material by way of notice, announcement or advertisement of any event, thing, business or other matter except such as may be required by law. The violation of this section, in addition to any other penalty provided by law, shall be a sufficient reason for the revocation of such license by the director of public facilities without notice.

12.16.200 - Maintenance and repair of motor vehicles on public streets and highways and/or on city-owned or leased property.

- A. No person shall make any repairs on any motor vehicle on the public streets or highways of the city except for changing of bulbs and lenses, changing of windshield wipers, installation of air filters, minor repair of electrical wires, changing or replacing of a battery, minor repair and/or maintenance of the interior of a vehicle, the changing of a flat tire, or other repairs of a similar minor nature, provided such minor repairs are performed in an expeditious manner and do not, in any manner, interfere or obstruct access of vehicles on such streets or highways.
- B. No person shall make any repairs on any motor vehicle on any city-owned or leased premises within the city unless having first received permission from the police department.

- C. Any emergency repairs performed by a licensed mechanic, service station or auto repair shop shall be permitted and not be considered a violation of this section, if performed expeditiously.
- D. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be subject to having the motor vehicle he is making repairs on immediately towed from its location by order of the police department at his expense.
- E. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the first offense. Any persons violating the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for a second offense. Any person violating the provisions of this section for a third and any subsequent times, shall be liable for a fine of not less than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and/or up to thirty (30) days in jail.

12.16.210 - Permit to occupy portion of street—Issuance authorized.

- A. Every person intending to erect or repair any building upon any land abutting on any street must receive from the director of public facilities a permit to occupy a portion of such street with building materials or to fence off a portion of the sidewalk in the protection of the public; provided, however, that no such permit shall be granted authorizing or permitting any person to occupy or close more than one-half of the width of the sidewalk upon such land abuts.
- B. Every person intending to use any portion of any street or sidewalk for an entertainment event or block party must receive from the director of public facilities a permit to occupy such street and/or sidewalk for a limited time. No permit shall be granted denying access to any pedestrian sidewalk but the street may be closed to vehicular travel. If such a permit is granted, the police chief and emergency operations officer must be given written notice of said permit a minimum of seven business days prior to said event.

12.16.220 - Permit to occupy portion of street—Fee.

A fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) shall be paid to the director of public facilities for the use of the city for each month or part thereof that any street or sidewalk shall be occupied or closed pursuant to the permit authorized by Section 12.16.210.

12.16.230 - Permit to occupy portion of street—Duty of permittee to provide safe passage around obstruction.

Any person duly permitted to occupy any part of any street pursuant to a permit issued as authorized by Section 12.16.210, while erecting or repairing any building, opening any sewer or making any excavation in any street for any purpose, shall provide safe and convenient passage around or over the same for public travel, and shall be responsible to the city for any damage occasioned by any neglect to do so.

12.16.240 - Permit to occupy portion of street—Display.

Any person occupying any portion of any street under a permit issued under Section 12.16.210 shall, when requested by the director of public facilities or any police officer, exhibit his permit for such occupation.

12.16.245 - Permit to Use City Streets and Sidewalks for the Shared Mobility Pilot Program

A. Permit Required. No person or entity shall operate a Shared Mobility System, as defined by City Ordinance Chapter 10.32.010, for use in the City without first having obtaining approval from the Office of Planning and Economic Development.

B. Filing of application – Fee. Each applicant for approval to operate a Shared Mobility System, as defined by City Ordinance Chapter 10.32.010, shall file an application with the Director of the Office of Planning and Economic Development and pay a one-time, non-refundable fee in the amount of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to the City of Bridgeport. Such applicant fee revenue collected by the Office of Planning and Economic Development shall be deposited and accounted for in a City special revenue account used for the sole purpose of improving the City's bicycle infrastructure.

12.16.250 - Miscellaneous acts prohibited.

The erecting or placing of any building, gate, fence, post, box, cask, wood, brick, stone, non-motor vehicle unattached to any animal, or any other thing upon any sidewalk or street; the placing, hanging or maintaining of any flag, banner, article of merchandise or other thing except awnings and signs over or across any sidewalk or street; the opening or making of any vault or cellar in, upon or under any street; and the kindling of any fire or bonfire in any public street are prohibited without consent of the common council; provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be construed so as to prevent or hinder any person, while in the process of building or repairing any building, from placing in any street materials for such purposes under such conditions and restrictions as may be prescribed in each particular case in a permit issued therefore under this section.

A. Exemptions.

- Nothing in Section 12.16.250, above, shall prohibit the implementation committee of any neighborhood revitalization zone whose implementation plan has been approved by the city council from seeking permission from the director of public facilities to provide trash can receptacles for placement within the public right-ofway, provided the design of the trash can has been pre-approved by the director or his or her designee; the placement of said cans is done by the staff of the public facilities department following the issuance of a written approval for said placement by said director, or his or her designee, in accordance with Section 7-148(b)(H) and City Ordinance 8.68 Littering; and conditioned upon the property owner whose property fronts where the trash can shall be located, being notified in writing ten days prior to the placement of the trash can that the acceptance of the trash can at the location requires that the trash can be emptied by the property owner through private methods. The property owners shall also be given a copy of the Municipal Ordinance 8.60 Unlawful Depositing so that they are aware that if the trash can is not maintained in a manner that does not violate that ordinance, the trash can shall be removed by order of the director of public facilities and civil penalties shall be imposed in accordance with Ordinance 8.60. In addition, nothing in this chapter shall prevent the city health director under the statutory authority granted to all municipal health directors in 19a-206, from issuing orders, requesting the imposition of equitable, civil and/or criminal penalties by requesting such action from the State Housing Court at Bridgeport, if it is found that the failure to maintain the trash can also violated the Public Health Code.
- 2. Nothing in Section 12.16.250, above, shall prohibit the placement of bus station shelters within the public right-of-way by the transit authority authorized to provide bus service to the citizens of Bridgeport who are entitled to such access pursuant to Section 7-148(6)(C)(ii) and Section 7-148(7)(H)(xiii) of the General Statutes of Connecticut, provided that the design and placement of said shelters has been submitted to and reviewed by the public safety and transportation committee of the city council and approved by the full council. The request for such approval shall be submitted to the city clerk for referral to the city council by the director of public facilities, provided the plans for the placement and design of said shelters has been pre-filed with said director a minimum of thirty (30) days before the requested date for submission to the city council; and plans and designs for said shelters have been reviewed by an engineer assigned to the office of the city engineer, with a written recommendation or approval or disapproval provided by said engineer to said director. Following city council approval, the placement of the bus shelters shall not proceed without the issuance of an excavation permit by the public facilities department in accordance with Section 1-148(6)(C)(iii) and (iv) of the General Statutes of Connecticut and City Ordinance Chapter 12.12 Excavations.

3. Nothing in Section 12.16.250, above, shall prohibit the use or placement of a Shared Mobility Device, as defined by City Ordinance Chapter 10.32.010, within and/or on the public right-of-way during the Shared Mobility Device Pilot Program from September 4, 2019 to November 30, 2020. Share Mobility Device users may ride Devices on city streets, off-street bicycle lanes, multi-use paths, and sidewalks; users must dismount upon encountering pedestrians. Devices, while they may be parked on the sidewalk, shall be parked in the following manner: (a) in a balanced, upright position; (b) to allow unimpeded pedestrian travel space on a sidewalk to a width of at least five (5) feet; (c) to allow unimpeded access to entrances to public or private property; (d) to allow unimpeded access to all accessibility ramps; (e) to allow unimpeded access to all bicycles and scooter parking areas, including any stationary fixture designed for the secure attachment of bicycles and scooters or any painted area designated for bicycle and scooter parking; (f) to allow adequate area for unimpeded vehicular travel and parking on public streets; and (g) in an area or location which the City may designate.

Resolution Amending Chapter 10.32 of the Municipal Code

WHEREAS, in furtherance of <u>Plan Bridgeport</u> Goal 1.1, which requires that the City work to "improve usage of transit and alternative modes of transportation," the City's Office of Planning and Economic Development ("OPED") proposes to implement a fifteen month pilot program (the "Pilot Program") to allow for the safe and orderly operation of shared mobility devices (e.g., bicycles, electric bicycles, electric scooters) within the city;

WHEREAS, a Shared Mobility Device ("Device(s)") is a traditional bicycle, electric/pedal-assist bicycle or electric scooter that is part of a Shared Mobility System, which is a system that provides bicycles, electric/pedal-assist bicycle or electric scooters for a short-term rental for point-to-point trips and such devices may be locked and unlocked without the requirement of a rack or other docking station; and

WHEREAS, such shared mobility devices are found throughout the country and the world, and provide an economic and alternative mode of transportation for many, particularly within cities;

WHEREAS, a private pilot program between "BIRD," a California-based scooter-share company, and the University of Bridgeport, was conducted within the city during the 2018-2019 school year and was deemed successful;

WHEREAS, working interdepartmentally and studying best practices nationwide, OPED has developed a comprehensive policy and regulatory document outlining the terms and conditions and the application process pursuant to which the Pilot Program will be administered;

WHEREAS, the Pilot Program will run from September 4th of 2019 to November 30th of 2020, during which time OPED and other departments within the City will be able to gather data regarding the usage of the shared bicycles and scooters, the extent of consumer demand, the incidence of accidents or injury, the performance of participating companies, the equitable distribution of bikes and scooters throughout the city's neighborhoods, the broader community and business feedback, all so as to ultimately make informed recommendations as to whether the pilot operation of such devices ought to be continued, and if so, pursuant to what parameters;

WHEREAS, for all the reasons cited above, it is in the City's best interest to establish the Pilot Program;

WHEREAS, Device Providers may apply to participate in the Pilot Program by submitting an application, thereby agreeing to the terms and conditions thereof, and paying a one-time nonrefundable registration fee to OPED, which shall be applied to a dedicated fund to provide future bicycle infrastructure improvements;

WHEREAS, implementation of the Pilot Program will require amendments to the City's Code of Ordinances Chapter 10.32 – THE OPERATION OR USE OF DIRT BIKES, ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES, SNOWMOBILES, MOTOR-DRIVEN CYCLES, OR MINI-CYCLES.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED: By the City Council of the City of Bridgeport that, effective upon publication, the Municipal Code of Ordinances, Chapter 10.32 – THE OPERATION OR USE OF DIRT BIKES, ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES, SNOWMOBILES, MOTOR-DRIVEN CYCLES, OR MINICYCLES is hereby amended as follows:

Chapter 10.32 - THE OPERATION OR USE OF DIRT BIKES, ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES, SNOWMOBILES, MOTOR-DRIVEN CYCLES, OR MINI-CYCLES

10.32.010 - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this ordinance, shall have the meanings attributed to them in this section:

- "Dirt bike" means a two-wheeled motorized recreational vehicle designed to travel over unimproved terrain and not designed for travel on a highway, as defined in Section 14-1 of the Connecticut General Statutes. "Dirt bike" does not include an all-terrain vehicle, as defined in Section 14-379 of the General Statutes, or a motor-driven cycle, as defined in Section 14-1 of the General Statutes.
- "Snowmobile" means any self-propelled vehicle designed for travel on snow or ice, except vehicles propelled by sail.
- "All-terrain vehicle" means a self-propelled vehicle designed to travel over unimproved terrain that has been determined by the commissioner of motor vehicles to be unsuitable for operation on the public highways and is not eligible for registration under Chapter 246 of the Connecticut General Statutes.
- 4. "Operate" means (1) to control the course of or otherwise use a dirt bike, snowmobile, all-terrain vehicle, motor-driven cycle, mini-cycle, or similar vehicle; or (2) being in possession of a dirt bike, snowmobile, all-terrain vehicle, motor-driven vehicle, mini-cycle or similar vehicle on any street or sidewalk in the city of Bridgeport or on any public property, including but not limited to school property, playgrounds and parks, within the city of Bridgeport, or on any private property, within the city of Bridgeport, without first obtaining the written permission of the property owner if the property is not owned by the operator, passenger, and/or owner of the motorized recreational vehicle, if such dirt bike, snowmobile, all-terrain vehicle, motor-driven vehicle, mini-cycle or similar vehicle is capable of being set in motion by the motive power of the vehicle.
- "Motor-driven cycle" means any motorcycle, motor scooter, or bicycle with an attached motor, with a seat height of not less than twenty-six (26) inches, and a motor having a capacity of less than fifty (50) cubic centimeters piston displacement.
- "Mini cycle" means pocketbikes, miniature (hereafter "mini") bikes, mini cycles, mini sport bikes, mini motorcycles, chopper scooters, and any other similar wheeled vehicle designed to transport one or more persons that is powered by any type of motor.
- 7. "Shared Mobility Device" means a traditional bicycle, electric/pedal-assist bicycle, or electric scooter that is part of a dockless shared mobility rental system ("Shared Mobility System") operating with a valid City-approved application from September 4, 2019 to November 30, 2020 and, for purpose of this Chapter, a Shared Mobility Device is not a motorized recreational vehicle.

- 78. The terms "dirt bike," "snowmobile," "all-terrain vehicle," "motor-driven cycle," and "mini-cycle" shall not be deemed to include any of the following:
 - a. Any registered "motorcycle" as defined in the C.G.S. § 14-1(46); any registered "motor vehicle" as defined in C.G.S. § 14-1(47);
 - b. Any moped that meets Federal Department of Transportation guidelines for use on streets and is approved by the state of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles for use on streets, provided, however, the moped is operated pursuant to all applicable state laws, rules, and regulations and all other city of Bridgeport ordinances;
 - Any wheelchair or similar mobility assisting device utilized by a person with a physical disability or whose ambulatory mobility has been impaired due to age or physical ailment;
 - Any self-propelled snow plow, snow blower or lawn mower when used for the purpose for which it was designed and operated at a speed not to exceed four miles per hour;
 - e. Any vehicle owned or leased by the city of Bridgeport;
 - f. Any vehicle that is used solely for amusement, or as a novelty display item, and is operated during a parade or any other special event that is properly permitted and approved by the city of Bridgeport shall be excluded from this article; and
 - g. Any electric personal assistive mobility device (hereinafter "EPAMD") that is self-balancing, has two non-tandem wheeled devices, is designed to transport only one person, and has an electric propulsion system that limits the maximum speed of the device to twelve and one-half (12½) miles per hour or less; and
 - Any Shared Mobility Device.

For the purposes of Sections 10.32.020 and 10.32.030 of this ordinance, the terms "dirt bike," "snowmobile," "all-terrain vehicle," "motor-driven cycle," and "mini cycle" as defined in this section, shall be collectively referred to as "motorized recreational vehicle(s); a Shared Mobility Device is not a "motorized recreational vehicle."

Resolution Authoring the Office of Planning and Economic Development ("OPED") to administer the Shared Mobility Pilot Program

WHEREAS, in furtherance of <u>Plan Bridgeport</u> Goal 1.1, which requires that the City work to "improve usage of transit and alternative modes of transportation," the City's Office of Planning and Economic Development ("OPED") proposes to implement a fifteen month pilot program (the "Pilot Program") to allow for the safe and orderly operation of shared mobility devices (e.g., bicycles, electric bicycles, electric scooters) within the city;

WHEREAS, a Shared Mobility Device ("Device(s)") is a traditional bicycle, electric/pedal-assist bicycle or electric scooter that is part of a Shared Mobility System, which is a system that provides bicycles, electric/pedal-assist bicycle or electric scooters for a short-term rental for point-to-point trips and such devices may be locked and unlocked without the requirement of a rack or other docking station;

WHEREAS, such shared mobility devices are found throughout the country and the world, and provide an economic and alternative mode of transportation for many, particularly within cities;

WHEREAS, a private pilot program between "BIRD," a California-based scooter-share company, and the University of Bridgeport, was conducted within the city during the 2018-2019 school year and was deemed successful;

WHEREAS, working interdepartmentally and studying best practices nationwide, OPED has developed a comprehensive policy and regulatory document outlining the terms and conditions and the application process pursuant to which the Pilot Program will be administered;

WHEREAS, the Pilot Program will run from September 4th of 2019 to November 30th of 2020, during which time OPED and other departments within the City will be able to gather data regarding the usage of the shared bicycles and scooters, the extent of consumer demand, the incidence of accidents or injury, the performance of participating companies, the equitable distribution of bikes and scooters throughout the city's neighborhoods, the broader community and business feedback, all so as to ultimately make informed recommendations as to whether the pilot operation of such devices ought to be continued, and if so, pursuant to what parameters;

WHEREAS, for all the reasons cited above, it is in the City's best interest to establish the Pilot Program;

WHEREAS, Device Providers may apply to participate in the Pilot Program by submitting an application, thereby agreeing to the terms and conditions thereof, and paying a one-time nonrefundable registration fee which shall be applied to a dedicated fund to provide future bicycle infrastructure improvements;

WHEREAS, implementation of the Pilot Program will require amendments to the City's Code of Ordinances Chapter 10.32 — THE OPERATION OR USE OF DIRT BIKES, ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES, SNOWMOBILES, MOTOR-DRIVEN CYCLES, OR MINI-CYCLES and Chapter 12.16 — STREET AND SIDEWALK USE REGULATIONS which will be addressed under separate resolutions;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: By the City Council of the City of Bridgeport that, effective immediately, the Director or Deputy Director of the Office of Planning and Economic Development is hereby directed, authorized, and empowered to administer the Shared Mobility Device Pilot Program, substantially in the manner described herein, subject to the approval of the Office of the City Attorney, and to execute all documents and do all other things necessary in the furtherance of, and consistent with, this resolution in the best interest of the City.

Introduction of Resolution to City Council -referral to Committee

On behalf of the Mayor, I am pleased to submit the attached proposal for an Amendment to Code Section 3.16.110 - Real property tax relief and maximum -City Program

The Senior Tax Relief Program contained in this section of the Code has been constant for a number of years, and thus has not kept up with the rate of inflation regarding the fixed expenses for Senior Citizens, nor reflect the levels of eligible low and moderate income based upon this regions costs.

In addition, the program is fixed for all eligible income levels, with no progressivity to assist those citizens most economically disadvantaged.

Attached is the proposal, in clean version and redlined format, from the Mayor and I to recommend for consideration. In addition, a fiscal analysis is included which shows that the incremental impact upon future budgets starting in FY2021 would be less than 0.1% of a change to the city budget. Such amount would also be a fraction of normal annual grand list growth per year.

We truly appreciate the Council's review of this proposal and will be available to answer all questions.

3.16.110 - Real property tax relief and maximum -City Program

Each resident qualifying under this article shall receive a tax credit of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) on such resident's <u>annual</u> real property tax bill for his or her principal residence in the city; provided, no such property tax relief, together with any relief received by such resident under the provisions of all applicable General Statutes of the state of Connecticut, shall exceed, in the aggregate, seventy-five (75) percent of the tax which would, except for such General Statutes, and this article, be laid against the taxpayer. For the fiscal year commencing on July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021 and future fiscal years, each resident qualifying under this article shall receive a tax credit in the following amounts, based upon such resident's level of annual household income as defined under state statute:

Household Income from \$1 up to \$20,000: Tax Credit of \$ 1,200

Household Income between \$20,001 and \$43,900: Tax Credit of \$ 900

Household Income between \$43,901 and \$58,000: Tax Credit of \$ 400

3.16.090 - In general.

The city enacts tax relief for elderly real property owners pursuant to Section 12-129(n) of the General Statutes of the state of Connecticut for eligible residents of the city for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1987 and each ensuing fiscal year on the terms and conditions provided in this article. Wherever herein reference is made to the General Statutes of the state of Connecticut, reference shall be to the statutes cited, any amendments thereto or any successor statutes, as may be applicable to this article. All relevant General Statutes of the state of Connecticut are incorporated in this article so far as they may be applicable and in the event of any discrepancy between this article and any General Statute the General Statute shall control and this article shall not be invalid but shall be deemed to be in conformity with that General Statute.

(Prior code § 28-31)

3.16.100 - Eligibility.

Pursuant to Section 12-129n of the General Statutes of the state of Connecticut, any resident of the city who owns real property in the city or who is liable for the payment of taxes thereon under Section 12-48 of the Connecticut General Statutes and occupies that property as his or her principal residence shall be eligible for the real property tax relief set forth in this article provided they meet all of the following conditions:

- A. At the close of the calendar year next preceding the year in which the claim for tax relief is filed and approved such resident shall be sixty-five (65) years of age or over; or the spouse of such resident shall be sixty-five (65) years of age or over; or such resident shall be sixty (60) years of age or over and the surviving spouse of a taxpayer who qualified in Bridgeport under this article at the time of his or her death;
- B. Such resident or his or her spouse has resided in a residence located in the city and has paid taxes to the city for a period of one year immediately preceding July 1st of the fiscal year for which the person shall receive the real property tax relief as set forth in this article; and
- C. During the calendar year preceding the year in which application is made for the tax relief under this article, such resident and his or her spouse together shall not have an income in excess of the maximum income for eligibility for the program of tax relief under Chapter 204a of the Connecticut General Statutes Sections 12-170aa et seq. determined under that chapter and statutes or any amendments thereto.

3.16.110 - Real property tax relief and maximum.

Each resident qualifying under this article shall receive a tax credit on such resident's annual real property tax bill for his or her principal residence in the city; provided, no such property tax relief, together with any relief received by such resident under the provisions of all applicable General Statutes of the state of Connecticut, shall exceed, in the aggregate, seventy-five (75) percent of the tax which would, except for such General Statutes, and this article, be laid against the taxpayer. For the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021, and future fiscal years, each

resident qualifying under this article shall receive a tax credit in the following amounts, based upon the resident's level of annual household income as defined under state statute:

Household Income from \$1 up to \$20,000:

Tax Credit of \$ 1,200

Household Income between \$20,001 and \$43,900: Tax Credit of \$ 900

Household Income between \$43,901 and \$58,000: Tax Credit of \$ 400

(Ord. dated 7/3/06: Ord. dated 6/20/05: Ord. dated 9/4/01: prior code § 28-33; amendment proposed August 2019)

3.16.120 - Application for real property tax relief.

Any resident seeking tax relief under this article, or his or her authorized agent or duly appointed representative, must file an application for real property tax relief under this article, in such form as may be required by the tax assessor, on or before June 30, 1987 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1987 and thereafter on or before June 15th immediately preceding the fiscal year in which the resident seeks such tax relief and shall provide to the tax assessor such documents, including, but not limited to, federal income tax returns or authorization to secure same, as the tax assessor may deem necessary to determine whether or not the resident qualifies for the real property tax relief granted in this article. Once an applicant is determined to be eligible for the real property tax relief granted in this article he or she shall, thereafter, file an application on a biennial basis unless the tax assessor determines otherwise in order to determine if the applicant meets the eligibility requirements of this article.



Sustainable CT Resolution

A municipality must pass a resolution prior to registering to participate in Sustainable CT. The purpose of the resolution is to formally demonstrate the municipality's interest in using the voluntary menu of actions and Sustainable CT resources. The resolution must be passed by the municipal legislative body, except in towns with a town meeting form of government, where a resolution by the Board of Selectmen may be used.

You may use the template below or draft a modified resolution to meet the requirements of registering to participate in Sustainable CT. A modified resolution must at least include the following:

- Statement of intent of the municipality to participate in Sustainable CT.
- Designation of the municipal official or staff position (title only; a name is not necessary to include in resolution) to serve as the point of contact for Sustainable CT, which includes online registration of your municipality.
- The establishment of an advisory Sustainability Team (or modification of an existing committee or team) to promote implementation of Sustainable CT voluntary actions leading towards certification. See Sustainability Team Guidance document for more information.
- Statement that the Sustainability Team will meet within 90 days of adoption of the resolution.
- Requirement for the Sustainability Team to report annually to your municipality's governing body.



SECTION II

RESOLUTION (PLEASE TYPE BELOW)

WHEREAS, rapidly increasing and excessive rents in our city are impacting the poor, minorities, students, families, and senior citizens to the point where they are reaching out to their City Council representatives for relief from what they view as harsh and unconscionable rents; and

WHEREAS, Connecticut law gives any municipality the authority to establish a fair rent commission to receive and investigate rent complaints, issue subpoenas, hold hearings, and order landlords to reduce rents for specific reasons; when a commission finds that rental housing does not meet the local or state health or safety requirements for housing, the commission may suspend rent payments until the housing is brought into compliance; and may order a landlord to stop any retaliation against a tenant who makes a complaint to it; and

WHEREAS, Hartford, Stamford, New Haven and other cities have established fair rent commissions, and all have clear and concise language on their web pages about their fair rent commission, issues it can address, and how to reach the commission to file a complaint; and

WHEREAS, Bridgeport likewise has created under city ordinance Chapter 2.94 (pursuant to and in conformity with Sections 7-148b through 7-148f of the Connecticut General Statutes) its own Fair Rent Commission to assist renters in the city who are struggling with excessive rents; and

WHEREAS, the ordinance requires that the Bridgeport Fair Rent Commission consist of five members, and three alternates, all of whom shall be resident electors of the city, of the five members, at least two shall be landlords and two shall be tenants, among the alternates at least one be a landlord and one be a tenant and the remaining alternate shall be neither; and

WHEREAS, sadly very few of those impacted by excessive rents today know of the Bridgeport Fair Rent Commission, how to reach it to file a complaint, and what protection it can offer; and

WHEREAS, the city web page indicates that the current Fair Rent Commission has only four members and offers no guidance to the struggling renters in the city who believe that their rent is harsh and unconscionable on how to reach the Fair Rent Commission to file a complaint; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Bridgeport City Council that the Mayor and his administration make every reasonable attempt to ensure the Fair Rent Commission has all the required appointments made to it as soon as possible and aggressively reaches out to the residents of this city to help alleviate increasingly excessive rents that can lead to the eviction or displacement of the poor, minorities, students, families, and senior citizens in Bridgeport.

Chapter 2.94 - FAIR RENT COMMISSION

Sections:

2.94.010 - Purpose.

Pursuant to and in conformity with Sections 7-148b through 7-148f of the Connecticut General Statutes, there is created a commission known as the fair rent commission for the purpose of regulating and eliminating excessive rental charges on residential property within the city. This chapter is enacted in recognition of the compelling need for rent stabilization for the duration of a severe housing shortage in the city.

(Prior code § 16-131)

2.94.020 - Definitions.

Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this chapter shall be as follows:

"Commission" means the fair rent commission of the city.

"Housing accommodation" means any building or structure, wholly or in part, containing living quarters occupied or fairly intended for occupancy as a place of residence, and including any land or building appurtenant thereto, except the following:

- A hospital, convent, monastery, asylum, public institution operated exclusively for charitable or educational purposes;
- Any housing accommodations owned and operated by the United States, the state of Connecticut, the housing authority of the city, the city or by any agency or political subdivision of said governmental entities;
- Housing accommodations exempted by Section 7-148b of the Connecticut General Statutes, as amended;
- Any building or structure which contains three units or less at least one of which is occupied by the owner of said building or structure.

"Landlord" means any person who leases, subleases, rents or permits the occupancy of any housing accommodation, including a person who manages a housing accommodation owned by someone else.

"Rent or rental charges" means any consideration, monetary or otherwise, including any bonus, benefit or gratuity, demanded or received, for the use or occupancy of any housing accommodations.

"Tenant" means any person who leases or rents, whether by written or oral lease, any housing accommodation, as a residence for himself/herself and/or his or her immediate family.

(Prior code § 16-132)

2.94.030 - Membership.

- A. The fair rent commission shall consist of five members, and three alternates, all of whom shall be resident electors of the city. Of the five members, at least two shall be landlords and two shall be tenants. Among the alternates at least one shall be a landlord and one shall be a tenant and the remaining alternate shall be neither.
- B. In addition, not more than three of said members and two of said alternates shall be registered members of the same political party. The members and alternates shall be appointed by the mayor and subject to approval by the common council. The commission shall elect from its members a

chairman and a vice-chairman. The common council may, by two-thirds vote, remove any member of the commission for cause.

(Prior code § 16-133)

2.94.040 - Members' terms.

The initial members of the commission shall be appointed for terms which shall commence as of the date of their appointment and end on the date set forth below:

Term	Members	Alternate
Ending one year from enactment of ordinance codified in this chapter	one	one
Ending two years from enactment of ordinance codified in this chapter	two	one
Ending three years from enactment of ordinance codified in this chapter	two	one

Thereafter, each appointment shall be for a term of three years. In the event of the death, resignation or inability to serve on the part of any members of the commission or alternate, a successor shall be appointed to fill the unexpired term of the member or alternate as set forth in Section 2.94.030 of this chapter. If a regular member of the commission is absent, the chairman of the commission shall designate one of the three alternates to act in his place. The chairman shall choose the alternates in rotation so that they shall act as nearly equal a number of times as possible. If any alternate is not available in accordance with such rotation, such facts shall be recorded in the minutes of the meeting.

(Prior code § 16-134)

2.94.050 - Staff.

The commission may employ a director to be appointed by the mayor with the approval of the common council to keep its records, to handle any correspondence, to supervise and direct the administration of this chapter, and generally to perform such other functions as may be assigned by the commission. Additional employees as the commission deems necessary to effect the provision of this chapter may be hired. Upon request, assistance from other municipal agencies shall be reasonably available to the commission.

(Prior code § 16-135)

2.94.060 - Quorum and procedures.

A quorum for any hearings or meetings of the commission shall consist of three members, or their alternates, and shall be empowered to conduct said hearings and render orders and decisions pursuant thereto. The commission shall conduct regular meetings to transact whatever business is before said commission. The commission shall determine the time, date and place of said meetings and shall announce the same at least twenty-four hours in advance of said meetings.

(Prior code § 16-136)

2.94.070 - Powers.

Pursuant to Sections 7-148b through 7-148-e, Connecticut General Statutes, the commission shall have the following powers:

- A. To make such studies and investigations into rentals charged for housing accommodations within the city as it deems appropriate to carry out its responsibilities under this chapter;
- To receive complaints, inquiries and other communications concerning alleged excessive rental charges in housing accommodations within the city;
- C. To conduct hearings on complaints or requests for investigations submitted to it by any tenant or any landlord. One week notice by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid shall be given to the parties involved in such complaint. If any notice is returned without having been delivered, the commission may arrange for service by a deputy sheriff, constable of the city or indifferent person in the same manner as is provided in the General Statutes of the state for services of process in a civil action;
- D. To request the assistance of any department of the city government, including any available records, information or expert witness which the department may have in its employ;
- E. To hire or retain any expert real estate appraisers or other competent experts to advise it;
- F. To administer oaths:
- G. To subpoena witnesses and compel their attendance at said hearings and to compel the production of any books or documents relating to any matter before the commission;
- H. To determine, after a hearing, whether the rent for any housing accommodation is so excessive as to be harsh and unconscionable:
- I. To order a reduction of any excessive rent which is deemed to be harsh and unconscionable (as determined according to standards described in Section 2.94.080) to an amount the commission considers fair and equitable. However, the commission shall not have the power to waive any rent which has become due prior to the filing date of the complaint. In its discretion the commission may make the order retroactive to the date of the tenant's complaint. Such order shall be in effect for a period of one year from its effective date, except if the commission shall, pursuant to a subsequent petition by the landlord or tenant at any time, order that the rent be changed;
- J. To dismiss a complaint;
- K. To continue, review, amend, terminate or suspend all its orders and decisions:
- If the commission determines after a hearing that a housing accommodation fails to comply with the city's housing code laws or any state or city statute or regulation relating to health and safety, the commission may order the tenant to pay the fair and equitable rent, as determined by the commission, to the commission.
 - The commission shall hold such rent in an escrow account, as provided in this chapter, until the landlord makes such repairs as are required to bring the housing accommodation into compliance with such laws, statutes or regulations.
 - If the landlord shall have corrected such violations after the order reducing the rent, and if
 the rent had been reduced solely because of such violations, the landlord may petition the
 commission for the reinstatement of the original rent and for the payment to him/her of the
 rent held in the escrow account.
 - If the landlord shall have corrected such violations after the order for reducing the rent, but the rent had not been reduced solely because of such violations, the landlord may petition

- the commission for an order fixing a fair and equitable rent for such housing accommodation in light of its condition at the time of the landlord's petition, and for the payment to him of the rent held in the escrow account.
- 5. In any case arising under this subsection, upon reasonable determination of the commission, the original rent or such fair and equitable rent as determined by the commission, may be ordered into effect retroactive at the discretion of the commission, to the date of the petition for reinstatement. No such reinstate shall be effective until after a hearing is held by the commission in accordance with the provisions of subsection C of this section:
- M. To deposit into the escrow account rent paid to the commission by tenants when their landlord refuses to accept it or the landlord requests in writing that the commission hold the rent until the complaint or claim can be resolved either through mediation or hearing;
- N. To establish an escrow account with a local bank or financial institution into which it shall deposit all rents or other funds paid to it pursuant to subsections L, M and N of this section. If rent is deposited into the escrow account pursuant to subsection L, such funds shall be released to the landlord if: (1) he shall be successful in an appeal to the court or (2) if the commission shall order such release after petition in accordance with subsection L of this section. If rent is deposited into the escrow account pursuant to subsection M or N of this section, such funds shall be withdrawn from the escrow account and paid to the landlord upon written request from the landlord;
- O. Interest earned on said escrow account shall be awarded to the landlord:
- P. To require the city attorney to institute, and the city attorney shall then institute, an action in any court of equity for either a temporary or final injunction, restraining violation of or directing compliance with any order made pursuant to any provision of this chapter. Such direction to the city attorney shall be written by the chairman of the commission or by his designee upon the majority vote of the commission;
- Q. Attempt through its director, through the process of conciliation and negotiation between a tenant and a landlord, to arrive at a rental agreement which is mutually acceptable to said tenant and landlord before initiating the formal hearing process.

(Prior code § 16-137)

2.94.080 - Standards.

In determining whether a rental charge is so excessive, with due regard to all circumstances, as to be harsh and unconscionable, a fair rent commission shall consider such all factors set forth in Section 7-148c of the Connecticut General Statutes, as amended.

(Prior code § 16-138)

2.94.090 - Procedures.

- A. Pending a determination by the fair rent commission, the tenant shall pay to the landlord the last agreed-upon rent prior to the bringing of a complaint to this commission.
- B. All proceedings shall continue regardless of the fact that a tenant may quit housing accommodation in question and notwithstanding any attempt, successful or otherwise, to evict said tenant. No sale, assignment or transfer of housing accommodation in question shall be cause for discontinuing any pending proceeding, nor shall it affect the rights, duties and obligations of the commission or the parties thereto.

C. Any person aggrieved by any order of the commission may appeal to the superior court, such appeal to be taken within thirty days after the rendering of the order in question. Any such appeal shall be considered a privileged matter with respect to the order of trial.

(Prior code § 16-139)

2.94.100 - Eligibility to file complaint.

- A. Any tenant, except those who live in a building or structure exempt under the definition of "housing accommodation" in Section 2.94.020 of this chapter, shall be eligible to file a complaint with the commission. It shall be a defense to any complaint before the commission that the tenant is in violation of Section 101-26 of the Bridgeport housing and commercial code entitled "Tenant's responsibilities" or is otherwise responsible for damages to the landlord's premises, other than ordinary wear and tear. If the commission finds, after a hearing, that the tenant is responsible for such damages, other than ordinary wear and tear, it shall not make a determination in regard to such complaint until such time as the tenant has paid into escrow with the commission an amount sufficient to pay for such damages, as determined by the commission.
- B. The commission shall not conduct a hearing on any complaint of a tenant who it finds is delinquent in their rent. In addition, the commission has the power to dismiss a complaint if it is determined that the tenant who is bringing the complaint is doing so for the purpose of harassing, annoying or embarrassing the landlord, or is using the procedures of the commission in an attempt to defeat a summary process action.

(Prior code § 16-140)

2.94.110 - Violation-Penalties.

Any person who shall violate any order of rent reduction or rent suspension by demanding, accepting or receiving an amount in excess thereof while such order remains in effect, or any other provision of this chapter or any person who shall refuse to obey any subpoena, order or direction of the commission pursuant thereto shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each such offense. If such offense continues for more than five days, it shall constitute a new offense for each day it continues to exist thereafter. No action shall be taken on any such violation by the prosecuting authorities of the city except upon written complaint of the chairman of the commission or his designee.

(Prior code § 16-141)

STANDARDS BRIDGEPORT FAIR RENT COMMISSION

2.94.080 - Standards.

In determining whether a rental charge is so excessive, with due regard to all circumstances, as to be harsh and unconscionable, a fair rent commission shall consider such all factors set forth in Section 7-148c of the Connecticut General Statutes, as amended.

Connecticut General Statutes

Sec. 7-148c. Considerations in determining rental charge to be excessive. In determining whether a rental charge or a proposed increase in a rental charge is so excessive, with due regard to all the circumstances, as to be harsh and unconscionable, a fair rent commission shall consider such of the following circumstances as are applicable to the type of accommodation: (1) The rents charged for the same number of rooms in other housing accommodations in the same and in other areas of the municipality; (2) the sanitary conditions existing in the housing accommodations in question; (3) the number of bathtubs or showers, flush water closets, kitchen sinks and lavatory basins available to the occupants thereof; (4) services, furniture, furnishings and equipment supplied therein; (5) the size and number of bedrooms contained therein; (6) repairs necessary to make such accommodations reasonably livable for the occupants accommodated therein; (7) the amount of taxes and overhead expenses, including debt service, thereof; (8) whether the accommodations are in compliance with the ordinances of the municipality and the general statutes relating to health and safety; (9) the income of the petitioner and the availability of accommodations; (10) the availability of utilities; (11) damages done to the premises by the tenant, caused by other than ordinary wear and tear; (12) the amount and frequency of increases in rental charges; (13) whether, and the extent to which, the income from an increase in rental charges has been or will be reinvested in improvements to the accommodations.

Whereas; domestic violence among police officers is grossly understated due to the fear of victims of their perpetrators, and

Whereas; domestic violence among police officers can be double that of the general public (1), and

Whereas; at between 24 - 40% of police officers families experience domestic violence in contrast to 10% among the general population (2), and

Whereas; recently five New Haven police officers have recently been arrested for domestic violence (3), and



WHEREAS, The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a federal civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against people with disabilities.¹

WHEREAS, Under the ADA law, people with disabilities are entitled to all of the rights, privileges, advantages, and opportunities that others have when participating in civic activities. \(^1\)

WHEREAS, ADA prohibits public entities from isolating, separating, or denying people with disabilities the opportunity to participate in the programs that are offered to others. 1

WHEREAS, The City of Bridgeport is rightly known as the Park City for its beautiful parks, including two designed by Francis Law Olmstead, Beardsley Park and Seaside Park;

WHEREAS, The City of Bridgeport offers a special discounted seasonal parking permit to its residents to visit and enjoy Beardsley Park, Seaside Park, and St. Mary's-by-the-Sea;

WHEREAS, some residents of Bridgeport, due to real disabilities and/or medical conditions cannot drive, and depend on others to drive them;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRIDGEPORT THAT CHAPTER 12.28, PARK USE REGULATIONS, SECTION: 12.28,040 – PARKING RESTRICTED WITHIN PUBLIC PARKS, IS HEREBY AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

The following regulations for parking of motor vehicles shall be in effect:

A.

There shall be areas within the public parks specifically designated by the board of park commissioners as permit parking areas. Admittance within these areas shall be only by way of a season permit or by a payment of a specific fee for a specified period of time, which fee and specified period of time shall be set by the board of park commissioners.

B.

Season permits shall be issued by the board of park commissioners to owners of automobiles which are registered with the motor vehicle department of the state of Connecticut. and listed with such department as being registered in the eity.

For individuals with current proof of residence in the City of Bridgeport, and with

EITHER

(i) a motor vehicle currently registered in the City of Bridgeport;

--or--

(ii) a documented medical condition or disability that creates a situation wherein the motor vehicle that is the one that they depend on to gain access to the park is not registered at their Bridgeport address (e.g., they are legally blind and are driven to the park by a close friend whose car is registered outside of Bridgeport),

the season permit shall be for a specified period of time for a fee as set from time to time by the board of park commissioners, which shall not exceed fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per year.

For individuals residing outside Bridgeport, a season permit shall be for a specified period of time for a fee set by the board of park commissioners.

This permit shall be affixed to the lower portion of the left front window or left side window vent. Before so doing, however, the owner shall inscribe in ink upon such sticker in the place so designated the registration number of the automobile to which it is to be so affixed. There shall be a two year moratorium on any increases in season permit fees for residents of Bridgeport, until May 6, 1993. Exceptions to the season permit fee shall meet the following criteria:

- 1. Proof of residence in the city of Bridgeport and proper identification;
- 2. Senior citizens sixty-five (65) years or older with proof of residence in the City of Bridgeport
- 3. One exception per qualified senior citizen with current motor vehicle registered in the city of Bridgeport.

 U-upon presenting proper identification, proof of age, and residency, persons meeting all of the above criteria shall be eligible for one free park sticker annually.
- C. Specific areas of the public parks set aside by the board of park commissioners as permit parking areas are designated as tow-away zones, subject to the provisions of the tow-away ordinances of the city.
- D. Parking in any other area within the public parks or during any other period shall be as designated by the board of park commissioners.
- E. Any vehicle parking in the public parks in areas designated as permit parking areas in violation of this section may be assessed as follows: any officer of the police department of the city shall attach to such vehicle a notice to the owner thereof that such vehicle has been parked in violation of a provision of this section. Each such owner, within twenty-four (24) hours of the time when such notice was attached to such vehicle, shall pay or cause to be paid to such police department as a penalty for and in full satisfaction of such violation the sum of one hundred twenty five dollars (\$125.00). The failure of such owner to make such payment within twenty-four (24) hours shall make him liable to the penalties provided in Chapter 1.12 of this Code.





of the neighborhood and runs north from Seaview Avenue to US Route 1. It is in need of sidewalks, stop signs and paving south of Orange Street.

Newfield Avenue is a central arterial road, cutting through the middle of the neighborhood. It runs from Seaview Avenue and northward and terminates at Stratford Avenue. New sidewalks and trees were installed by 2000 and plans were underway to reconfigure it at the junction of Stratford Avenue, linking it with Sixth Street just northwest of Stratford Avenue.⁵

Stormwater runoff – Current drainage conditions

The City of Bridgeport is characterized by several bodies of surface waters with Long Island Sound being the dominant surface water feature for the area. Based on review of the Bridgeport Water Pollution Control Authority (WPCA) 2002 Facility Plan, surface waters which are impacted by the WPCA plant on Seaview Avenue include: Johnson's Creek and Yellow Mill Creek which are tidally influenced. As expected in a densely developed urban area, the ground and surface waters within the Greater Bridgeport area have been degraded.

The City's sewer system is old, extensive and complicated. The oldest parts of the system are in excess of 100 years old. The system was originally constructed as a combined sewer system, i.e. one that conveys both sanitary wastes and storm water runoff. The system discharged these waste waters to nearby surface waters without any form of treatment, until plants were constructed and brought online in 1950 and 1951. The East Side Plant is served by the Johnson's Creek, Yellow Mill East and Yellow Mill West interceptors...




Analysis of Traffic Incidents

Traffic incident reports were provided by the Bridgeport Police Department from January 1, 2000 through May 18, 2005 and were analyzed. Based on this data, a number of intersections emerged as "hot spots." The intersection of Seaview and Stratford Avenues was by far the worst site for accidents; with 99 reports it was more than double any other intersection. One issue that has already been addressed by the resident stakeholders engaged in the NRZ process has been the inadequacy of lighting at this busy gateway, which includes the I-95 overpass. The Stratford and Connecticut Avenue corridors also had high numbers of accident reports at several intersections. Although there are posted 25 and 35 m.p.h. speed limits on these one-way streets, motorists regularly exceed those limits. Moreover, visibility to oncoming traffic is very difficult from several of the cross streets intersecting Stratford and Connecticut Avenues. The following map shows those intersections with 10 or more accidents reported since 2000.

On the other hand, the following retail categories are, generally speaking, not realistic or sustainable in this kind of business district (given its visibility/access, demographics, competition, etc.), and ought not to be pursued:

- "Full-line" supermarker (unless specialty/niche)
- Chain drug store
- Apparel and accessory stores

Strategically, efforts should focus on the following: New construction of 20,000 – 30,000 sq.ft. of retail space, as the existing product is not the sort that is likely to attract new businesses. Efforts should focus on the two blocks of Stratford Avenue between Newfield and Union, so as to create a node of positive energy on which to build – why there? Central is the primary "thru" street (with bus route), so the Stratford-Central intersection represents the neighborhood's best opportunity for changing perceptions and restoring positive image.

Union and Newfield are also key thoroughfares in neighborhood traffic patterns. The presence of important community institutions and retail amenities (e.g. Ralphola Taylor Community Center, Charles Smith Foundation, public library, post office, Bank of America) is significant. The focus of past redevelopment efforts (e.g. strip mall), as well as current ones (i.e. Charles Smith Foundation's plans) should be considered. The Hollister-Stratford intersection, the other beehive of activity in the neighborhood, has less to build on.

Specific retail categories

Supermarket anchor. The industry rule-of-thumb is that 1 person can support roughly 2.5 sq.ft. of grocery store space, so the 7,905 residents in the neighborhood can sustain approx. 19,800 sq.ft. of grocery store space. The neighborhood already has about 10,100 sq.ft. of bodegas, which serve as food stores. This means that neighborhood residents should be able to support an additional 9,700 sq.ft. of grocery store space, however, a 9,700 sq.ft. grocery store were to open in the neighborhood, residents would still do their weekly shopping at a larger full-line supermarket. In other words, such a smaller format, more conveniently located for neighborhood residents, would still not be able to compete with Shaw's (Stratford Crossing) or Super Stop N Shop (The Dock) – it would only draw those shoppers who are just in need of a loaf of bread, a carton of milk, etc. (and in so doing, would take sales from the local bodegas). The exception would be a specialty food market with the capacity to draw from beyond the neighborhood and expand the base of potential customers. An additional option would be a mid sized grocery outlet that such as Krasdale Foods that has the potential to also act as a supplier for local bodegas.

Drug stores - Larger chains (e.g. Walgreens, Brooks) tend to look for: 1. areas with populations of 20,000; 2. one-acre sites at the corners of major intersections. An alternative is *Medicine Shoppe*, a St. Louis, MO-based franchisor of independent pharmacies, with over 900 units across the country; that looks for: 1. Small 1,200 sq.ft. storefronts; 2.10,000 people within 1 mile; and 3."Middle-income" demographics.



of the historic building stock; environmental degradation; and a planning process that has, until recently, disenfranchised local stakeholders. In spite of this, there are significant opportunities to build upon these assets, beginning with the basic idea of a pedestrian-friendly, walkable community, based upon a careful analysis of the neighborhood's physical form and patterns of use.

Neighborhood Main Street

Stratford Avenue is undoubtedly the neighborhood "Main Street," and while it currently functions in tandem with Connecticut Avenue for the purposes of traffic flow, it has been historically, and remains, the principal commercial corridor, as well as an east-west connector of regional significance. The section of Stratford Avenue within the East End proper is just over a mile long. While the neighborhood at its peak supported substantial and continuous mixed-use development along the entire length of this corridor, even spilling over into side and parallel streets, the current demographics and market conditions no longer support historic densities for the entire length of the corridor, as evidenced by the level of blight and abandonment, disuse of upper stories, and vacant lots.

Furthermore, the footprints of older commercial structures and the lack of off-street parking do not always support contemporary patterns of retail development, nor does the condition and level of code-compliance of upper stories encourage easy and affordable residential redevelopment.

Use of Nodes

All of this indicates a need to identify nodes, or areas of focus, for mixed-use redevelopment efforts along the Stratford Avenue corridor, where a combination of preservation, restoration, infill and new development can support a vibrant, pedestrian-oriented, neighborhood center. For Stratford Avenue, the most obvious area of focus corresponds to its intersections with the major north-south connectors to the larger community, especially Newfield Street, Central Avenue, and Hollister Avenue. The core of Stratford Corridor is thus taken to be the roughly 1/3 of a mile section between Newfield and Hollister, which then serves as a collector for traffic, especially pedestrian traffic, from residential areas north and south of Stratford Avenue.

Walkable Scale

The pedestrian scale of this core area and the way in which it potentially functions to connect most of the neighborhood is shown in the analysis by three overlapping circles of ¼ mile radius centered respectively at the intersection of Stratford and Central, the Newfield Street edge of Newfield Park, and the Hollister Avenue entrance to the new Tisdale School. Since ½ mile is, in good conditions, a comfortable 10 minute walk for most people, these circles serve to indicate how walkable a safe, well-designed, well-lit, pedestrian friendly East End could be, including access to the waterfront.

Following the neighborhood analysis diagram, two points indicated for public access to the waterfront (where public "beachheads" could be established amidst current industrial uses) are: 1) at the southern end of Newfield Street, connecting via Seaview Avenue to the end of Central Avenue and the potential future re-connection to Pleasure Beach; and 2) at Johnson's Creek, especially at the eastern end of Trowell Street, which connects Newfield Park to the Johnson's Creek waterfront.
