I represent Rodeph Sholom, which means "pursuit of peace". For many years we shared our building with the Church of the Apostles and until very recently with a Brazilian Baptist Mission as well. Our interfaith building and community a testament to that pursuit. The losses in Israel and Gaza since the ceasefire was broken on October 7th, are just heartbreaking. The passing of Resolution 20-23 has had the opposite effect of further dividing us. Aside from being outside the City Council's jurisdiction to begin with, this resolution undermines the spirit of common purpose and unity in our city. It amounted to a conscious targeting of our Jewish community and undermined our feeling of safety and security. I ask the city council to rescind the divisive Resolution 20-23 and instead take steps to unite and heal the city.

From the meetings it has become clear there is a lack of information and gross misconception about what the current cease-fire resolution says. 4 jews were randomly plucked from the audience to change the language that was prepared to be passed. The resolution has nothing regarding HAMAS, rapes, kidnapped children. Thank you to the UN, who corrected some of this language. Nor does it call upon us to end the suffering. It does call for the release of hostages without including why or how they became kidnapped. War was now created in Bridgeport between Jews and Muslims. In Bridgeport Jews and Muslims have worked together for decades in peace. This resolution has resulted in Jewish hate and Islam phobia. Bridgeport is the only one to pass this ugly resolution. CT has no appetite for hate. A new resolution for peace was created by Muslims and Jews. We have no appetite for Jewish hate and support the new task force. She urges the council to support this new resolution and task force.

January 2, 2024 –

**** COUNCIL MEMBER PEREIRA MOVED THE MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 2, 2024 MEETING.**

Councilwoman Maria submitted the following edits to the minutes:

Twice Amended – Voted on unanimously.

- Page 1- Maria Valle is listed as present but was absent for Public Speaking
- Page 4- Maria Valle is listed as present but was absent for the Regular Meeting Aikeem Boyd is listed as an abstention and Jazmarie Melendez is listed as voting in favor. Neither were present for the vote as they were in the Republican Caucus Room engaged in an illegal and secret meeting with Deputy CAO Tom Gaudette, Attorney Rosnick, Attorney August, two rabbis, several members of the Islamic Community Center redrafting the Ceasefire Resolution. The motion identifies 1/3 in favor with 3 abstentions. Only 1/5 council members were present. Pereira is listed as both voting in favor and abstaining. Pereira abstained as she was not present for the November 6th Regular Council Meeting,
- Page 5 - Motion to appoint Jerome Roberts to the Fair Rent Commission.
- Page 6/7 - Every motion and vote states they passed unanimously, however, it is not noted that Aikeem Boyd and Jazmarie Melendez were absent for all those votes as they were engaged in a secret and illegal meeting in the Republican Caucus Room redrafting the Ceasefire Resolution
- Page 7 - the Ceasefire Resolution was already on the agenda, therefore when Councilwoman Vizzo Panicis made a motion to add the Ceasefire resolution, several of us informed her it was already on the agenda. The motion was not seconded or voted on. The fourth paragraph from the bottom is completely incorrect. I made no comments regarding an email to "the committee" requesting to add a ceasefire resolution to the agenda by 2/3 per the City Charter. Adding an item to a regular meeting agenda requires a 2/3 vote per the FOIA, not the City Charter. Once I was recognized, this is where I read my prepared point of order exactly as written. I did not state the ceasefire resolution was before a "committee" improperly. I stated it was before the City Council improperly.

- Page 8- paragraph 7 is incorrect. I did not raise a point of order after many councilmembers spoke. I raised it as soon as we started discussing the Ceasefire Resolution. This is where I referenced that an illegal and secret meeting was held in the Republican Caucus Room with non-Bridgeport residents and unelected or appointed members of the public where we were handed a scribbled fourth draft of the ceasefire resolution just minutes before we started debating the agenda items. I further stated voting on any international policy, conflicts and war was not within the City Council's authority as the CT Legislature grants municipal legislative powers and this was not within those powers and that international policy is strictly within the powers of Congress and the President of the U.S. Paragraph 8 - I did not raise a point of order here. I never made a motion to table. I requested a ruling on whether the ceasefire resolution was properly before the City Council. The mayor ruled that it was properly before the City Council. This should be moved to Page 7 below my statement and point of order once we start the debate on the ceasefire resolution.
- Jeanette Herron Statement made after Dasha's Spell on Ceasefire resolution:

I think when we get on this council that we all represent the community: the whole city whoever lives here, wherever they come from. And as Councilwoman Dasha Spell, said we are a sanctuary city. We are a welcoming city which is the same thing as a sanctuary city many of us voted on this many years ago. We here know that we don't have any say in the federal government this is just to say we support you and the Israeli community because no one deserves to die and you've heard me for years now say if we have a homicide in Bridgeport I say "no one deserves to die no matter who they are or what they've done". Life is very precious and we all know that Many of you have lost people in Gaza and Many Israelis have lost their families as well. This is not taken a side this is showing that were united with everybody to do what's necessary, And Jasmari, I give you a lot of credit for coming on this council on your first day trying to do something to make change in this city.



e. Matter Summary:

As the City Council is aware, Attorney Toms is eminently qualified for the position of City Attorney based upon her education, training, and professional experience as a Bridgeport Associate City Attorney for several years and most recently for approximately two years as an attorney in the Norwalk Corporation Counsel's Office.

What the City Council may not be aware of is that absent adoption of this proposed ordinance amendment, City Attorney Toms will both: (1) be taking a substantial pay reduction from her current Norwalk employment, and (2) be receiving less compensation than that paid to top step civil service Associate City Attorneys.

It is both illogical and inequitable for the City of Bridgeport to pay its top legal officer (a major department head) less than is paid to her direct report subordinates, who she supervises and over whom she has ultimate operational control. Kindly be reminded that this pay disparity was not at issue during my recent tenure as City Attorney, since I accepted and served in the position on a part-time basis and was compensated in accordance with the part-time City Attorney salary set forth in Ordinance Sec. 2.36.010 at subsection *Executive Appointed Officials* at grade 8a.

2.36.010 - Officers' and unaffiliated employee salaries.

A. The following position salaries shall be established for all listed unaffiliated positions in this subsection. Position annual salaries and annual salaries for those acting in any of the positions set forth in this section shall be adjusted in accordance with the negotiated across-the-board increases granted to other city supervisors. The labor relations office shall provide the city clerk with updated ranges set forth in this section, effective as of each July 1, to reflect such across-the-board increases. Salary ranges for any newly created positions shall be referred to the budget and appropriations committee for review. Salary ranges for acting or appointed positions shall fall within the ranges listed below. The full city council shall have the power to approve or disapprove the salary ranges recommended by the mayor and/or budget and appropriations committee. The Mayor may authorize salary increases within the salary ranges established by ordinance. No individual, serving in a position listed below, may receive remuneration from any other city board, commission or authority of the city of Bridgeport, including the board of education, in the form of wages, fee or other emoluments, without express prior approval by the city council. The exception to this section is for a legally awarded pension from the city of Bridgeport or any of the boards, commissions or authorities, including the board of education.
