








CASES BY AGE








CASES BY RACE/ETHNICITY




CASES BY SEX



SUMMARY

Over the past two weeks leading up to October 6, 2024, Bridgeport has seen a steady decline in daily COVID-19 cases compared to previous data. In late September, daily cases fluctuated between 1 and 16, with a notable decrease toward early October, where several days reported fewer than 10 cases. The daily case counts in early September were higher, peaking at 24 on September 1, showing a downward trend in recent weeks.

The 7-day incidence rate has also dropped, from a peak of 58.67 cases per 100,000 people in late September to 39.11 cases per 100,000 in early October. This indicates some relief compared to the higher rates seen in August and early September, where cases per day were higher, and the incidence rate exceeded 50.

The positivity rate remains at 13.6%, the same as the previous report, suggesting continued community transmission, although at a lower intensity. In terms of age, children under 5 and adults 65+ still show the highest incidence rates, with the 65+ group reaching nearly 100 cases per 100,000 in late September.

Monthly case counts in September totaled 263, which is slightly down from August's 297 but still elevated compared to earlier summer months. This overall reduction points to some control over the recent wave of infections, though continued vigilance is necessary.

In conclusion, while the last two weeks have seen a decline in daily cases and incidence rates, Bridgeport continues to experience moderate levels of COVID-19 transmission, especially in higher-risk groups. Public health measures, including vaccination, remain essential to sustaining this downward trend.


